ALL THE ACTION

HORNCHURCH will be at home to Lowestoft in Monday's Ryman Premier play-off final and that seems a fitting climax to the season. The clubs finished the season in second and third place respectively, both with 83 points.

Lowestoft scraped through their home semi-final against Wealdstone on Wednesday.

Dean Sinclair's penalty in the fifth minute of added time produced a 2-1 victory over a Wealdstone side by then reduced to nine men.

Chris Henderson had given the Trawlerboys a 21st-minute lead but Wealdstone gradually gained the upper hand and it was no surprise when Scott Fitzgerald levelled the scores in the 63rd minute.

Stones might have been the favourites at that stage but they proceeded to shoot themselves in both feet, losing Chris O'Leary to a second yellow card and, shortly afterwards, Sean Cronin to a straight red.

It looked as if they would hang on to force extra time, though the odds would have been stacked against them, but Lowestoft have become notorious for scoring late winners and they did it again.

It was more comfortable for Hornchurch as they beat Bury 3-1 with an outstanding second-half performance.

Bury started brightly and John Sands went close with a header. But Urchins soon had the upper hand. The lively Lewis Smith was twice denied by excellent saves by Marcus Garnham and then fired a shot against the bar.

The visitors almost grabbed the lead three minutes after the interval when Sam Reed's shot was turned on to a post by home keeper Joe Woolley.

He then collected the corner that followed and launched a punt downfield which bounced over Garnham.

Bury scrambled the ball out for a corner which was half-cleared to Smith on the left of the penalty area and he drilled in a low shot to give Urchins the lead.

It was 2-0 five minutes later, Smith this time the provider with a low cross which was turned in by Martin Tuohy for his 31st goal of the season.

Bury pulled one back in the 64th minute with the goal of the night, a long-range drive by Billy Clark which screamed into the top corner of the net.

Hornchurch regained their two-goal lead eight minutes later as Tuohy broke on the right and crossed low for Carl Rook.

Garnham half-stopped his shot at point-blank range but the ball bounced into the net.

Urchins never looked in danger of letting the game slip and it took a goalline clearance to deny Tuohy his second of the night.

Ryman North

LEISTON are the champions after thrashing Potters Bar 6-0 in their delayed final match of the season on Tuesday.

The visitors were always likely to be on a hiding to nothing after the prolonged wait to play the match, which was postponed on Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Danny Smy eased Leiston's nerves with an eighth-minute goal but the hosts had to wait until the last minute of the first half before Joe Jefford made it 2-0.

Any hopes of a comeback by the Scholars were quashed when Leon Ottley-Gooch hit an eightminute hat-trick around the hour mark, and Jefford added the sixth in the 77th minute. But Leiston were not able to score a seventh goal which would have been their 100th in the league.

The other important delayed game took place on Wednesday and Ware were relegated, along with Great Wakering, despite beating Waltham Forest 2-0 at Wodson Park.

When the match finally got under way after several postponements, Forest had managed to raise only nine players, hugely improving Ware's chances of achieving the three-goal win they needed to survive.

Elliot King put Ware ahead after only eight minutes and it seemed as if their task would be something of a formality.

Far from it. It was still only 1-0 well into the second half, when a red card for Ricci Crace cost Ware half their numerical advantage.

Not for long: Forest then had Valentine Lawrence sent off and it was 10-8.

Forest keeper Aaron Omand saved a Jordan Gill penalty and although Ware eventually got a second goal through Lewis Taylor, by then it was the fifth minute of added time and it was too late.

They did climb above Wakering to finish 21st, level on points with llford, but with goal difference also equal llford survive because they scored seven more goals.

The final Ryman League game of the season was played on Thursday and Chatham enjoyed it, winning 4-0 at Redbridge.

Lee Hales opened the scoring with a 19th-minute penalty and Garry Tilley made it 2-0 five minutes before half-time.

Joe Fuller added the third in the 77th minute before Lloyd Blackman wrapped it up with the 4,107th and last goal of the Ryman League campaign.

The first play-off semi-final was also played on Thursday and Enfield Town shook off the disappointment of missing out on the title two days earlier.

They beat Grays 3-1 in a shoot-out after the visitors had fought back from 2-0 down to force extra time.

Town were given the perfect start when a fumble by Grays keeper Tony Tucker allowed Adam Wallace to plant the ball into the empty net with just 38 seconds on the clock.

They were on top for long periods after that and doubled their lead with a thumping header from man of the match Mark Kirby four minutes after the break.

Grays looked a beaten side but were given a lifeline in the 79th minute with a contentious

penalty after a challenge on Joao Carlos. Harry Agombar made no mistake from the spot.

Then, in the 88th minute, Grays were awarded a corner when everyone was expecting a goal-kick and Junior Baker headed the equaliser.

Extra time was almost all Grays, with the hosts now down to ten effective men: having used all their substitutes, an injury to full-back Jordan Mackie left him to be a hobbling passenger at centre-forward.

But Grays missed their chances to win it. There was, however, another cruel blow for the hosts when their other full-back, Danny Barber, was shown a second yellow card for taking too long over a throw-in, even though there was not enough time left for either side to have mounted an attack. Under play-off rules he will be suspended for the final.

So to penalties, and after three successful kicks Noel Imber denied Agombar to give Enfield the edge. When Kenny Beaney fired Grays' next kick against the bar they were in trouble at 3-1 down.

Tucker gave them a lifeline by denying Walid Matata but, in a final irony, Imber clinched victory by saving from Joe Sweeney, who had come off the bench in the 118th minute so he could take part in the shoot-out.

Enfield will be at home in Sunday's final against the winners of the game between Tilbury and Needham Market, which is due to be played at Tilbury tonight (Friday).

Ryman South

BOGNOR are through to the play-off final after an amazing 4-4 draw with Godalming at Nyewood Lane on Tuesday. One save by Craig Stoner earned them a 5-3 victory in the penalty shoot-out and they will host Dulwich in Sunday's final.

The hosts took the lead through Ashley Robinson in the 33rd minute and also hit the woodwork twice before Scott Harris levelled the scores in the 64th minute.

When Brett Cooper put G's ahead in the 73rd minute it looked as if Rocks were heading for a home semi-final defeat for the second successive season.

Within three minutes, however, they were in front again as Terry Dodd ran through to equalise and Robinson converted a cross from Steve Harper to make it 3-2.

Godalming saved themselves two minutes into added time, when Adam Foulser volleyed home, and they went ahead in the seventh minute of extra time with a deflected shot by Warren Harris. Five minutes later, however, Harris was sent off for handling on the line and Robinson completed his hat-trick from the penalty spot.

Despite their one-man advantage Bognor were unable to create any more clear chances and the tie went to a shoot-out.

The first five kicks were converted but Stoner then saved from Ben Andrews and further successful kicks for the home side by Dan Beck and Ben Johnson clinched a 5-3 victory.

Rocks now have the chance to avenge last season's 3-1 semi-final defeat by Dulwich after the south London club edged out Folkestone 2-1 in Tuesday's other contest.

Ryman North

They took the lead on the half-hour when Folkestone keeper Jack Delo failed to hold a fierce free-kick from Kevin James and Ray Powell was on the spot to snap up the rebound.

Apart from a short spell in the second half when Phil Wilson made a good save from a Liam Dickson shot and a superb one from Frankie Chappell's header, Dulwich looked in control.

They doubled their lead on 81 minutes when Frankie Sawyer's devastating low cross provided Powell with a far-post tap-in.

Stuart King found the corner of the net with a low shot to reduce the arrears in the 85th minute but Dulwich held out to book their place in the final.
