INTROCIUCIN 00 00

ABINGDON TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB

"Town" were formed in 1870 and are one of the oldest clubs in the Country. They are also the second oldest club in the Berks. & Bucks. F.A. In the early years only friendlies were played, but before the turn of the century the Oxford and District League was entered.

At this time leagues were changes quickly and within ten years of the turn of the century the Berks. & Bucks. League, West berks. League and the Reading Temperence had all been entered. In 1899 the club amalgamated with local side St. Michaels and at this stage the 'Town' was dropped from the title of the club and not used again until 1920.

In 1909 the club left the Reading Temperence League for the newly formed North Berks. League, in the late twenties the club switched to the Reading & District League. In the 1930's the club purchased the Culham Road ground for £300 from Mrs. G. Herbert Morrel of the Oxford brewing family.

The first stand was erected on the ground in 1928 but this burned down after an Easter Monday fixture shortly after the Second World War, the replacement was erected in 1949.

In 1950 the club changed leagues again - this time joining the Spartan League but after three seasons the club left to join the newly formed Hellenic League

In 1959 the Berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup was won. The Hellenic League Premier Division was also won three times between 1957 and 1960, with the League Cup being won on the year that the club missed out in the League.

The next few years were probably the leanest spell of modern times. In 1965/66 the club was relegated to the First Division of the Hellenic League, but promotion back was won at the first attempt. In both 1970/1 and 1971/2 Town finished as runners-up in the Premier Division. The club was relegated for a second time in 1974/75 but promotion was gained at the first attempt.

The 1980's has seen the club become one of the strongest in the Oxfordshire / Berks. & Bucks. area with clubs from higher leagues regularly being beaten in cup competitions. The Hellenic League was won in 1986/7, the League and cup "double" only being narrowly missed when the club lost in the final to Hounslow. In 1987/88 the club finished up as runners-up to Yate Town.

Season 1988/89 was the most successful in the club's history. At the start of the season the club had switched to the Isthmian side of the 'Pyramid' of football and entered the Greene King Spartan League – which was duly won at the first attempt. Town also finished as runners-up in the berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup only losing to Windsor & Eton in extra time. The average home league gate for the season was 200 !

The ground was improved to the "C" standard set by the Vauxhall League and admission to Division Two South was gained for season 1989/90. That first season in the higher sphere saw the club finish a creditable third and they also reached the final qualifying round of the F.A. Cup for only the second time in their history. The F.A. Challenge Vase was also a relatively "happy hunting ground" and the fifth round was reached for the third time in their history.

1990/1 has again been a very successful time for the Abingdon Town club for not only do they appear in this evening's Final, but also they have gained promotion in this, only their second season in Division two South and may yet this Saturday be the seasons Champions. During the time in the League work has carried on at Culham Road and at the end of January a "B" grading was obtained for the ground to ensure that the hard work on the pitch will be seen in the fruition of a Division One place next season. COLIN FLEET (Goalkeeper) Previously at Oxford United and Chesham Utd., joined Abingdon from Oxford City. Forced his way into the First XI last season, and was voted Player of the Year. An FA XI Rep. player.

BINGDON TO

KURT DOUGLAS (Defender) Hellenic League championship medal with Abingdon in 1986/7. Previously with Thames Utd. and Bicester Town.

BRIAN HOUSE (Defender) Previously with Oxford City, Brian never puts in less than 100% effort. London Spartan League winners medal in 1988/89.

KELVIN ALEXIS (Defender) Now in his sixth season at the club, having previously been at Bicester Town. Has Hellenic and London Spartan League winners medals with Abingdon Town.

JOHN HARVEY-LYNCH (Defender) Club Captain and longest serving player having joined the Club in December 1983. Played on a non-contract basis for Oxford Utd. Reserves. Has Representative honours for the F.A. XI and Hellenic League. Captain of both recent Championship sides.

KEITH APPLETON (Defender/Midfield) In his sixth season at Abingdon. Was Oxford Utd.. Youth Captain, he has also played at Witney and Bicester. Is the side's penalty taker. Hellenic and London Spartan League winners medals.

ROGER CHARLES (Midfielder) Has spent all of his career at Culham Road except for a trial at Bournemouth. Top scorer and Player of the Year two seasons back. Has both Championship medals.

KEVIN CONNELLY (Midfielder) Signed from Burnham in the close season. Previously with Wycombe Wanderers.

PAUL BRADBURY (Forward) Top Scorer despite missing six weeks of the season through suspension. 1990 close season signing from Abingdon Utd. and has previously played for both Oxford City and United.

LIAM HERBERT (Forward) Re-signed in the summer from Bicester Town having won a Hellenic League winners medal in 1986/7. Has also played for Thame U.

DAVID COOK (Forward) Signed from Witney Town as a Central Defender and converted into attack at Culham Road. Last season's top scorer.

KENNY CAMPBELL (Forward) Another close season signing. He has played for Queens Park in Scotland.

MARK ORLANDO (Forward) Youth team player who fought his way into the side earlier in the season, and despite injury has kept his place in the squad.

IAN BARRETT (Midfielder) Summer 1990 signing from neighbours Abingdon United. A tireless and stylish worker in the centre of the pitch.

JAN VARNEY (Utility) Has played in many positions since joining from Hellenic Leaguers Morris Motors.

DARREN HICKEY (Defender) Attacking full-back signed from North Berks League side Clifton Hampden. He has a championship medal from the London Spartan league days. Missed part of last season whilst in Australia.

STEVE JAMES (Midfielder) Has recently broken into the First XI where he has been very effective.

#### ISTHMIAN LEAGUE ANNOUNCES NEW SPONSOR

From next season the Isthmian competition will be known as the Diadora Football League, following the announcement of a £400,000 sponsorship from the Italian sports shoe and clothing company.

The agreement includes championship and goalscoring awards as well as rewards for clubs who are most successful in the F.A. Cup, F.A. Trophy and F.A. Vase. Teams will also qualify for merchandising materials and discounts on the company's products.

The announcement was made at London's Hilton Hotel by the Chairman of Diaco – the company's UK distributors – Sebastian Coe. It officially comes into effect on June 1st. and lasts for an initial two years, with an option to renew for a third. It will be the largest at its level in non-League football.

League Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey says: "Securing such a prestigious sponsorship in a difficult economic climate is extremely pleasing. We are confident that we will play a significant part in promoting the name of Diadora and their products in the UK."

Seb Coe told the news conference: "Diadora is a company that believes wholeheartedly in the encouragement of sport at all levels. We know that non-League football provides the spring board for many of our up and coming young soccer stars."

Among those at the launch was lain Dowie. The former Hendon player who was sold to Luton, and recently transferred to West Ham where he has helped the team win promotion to Division One of the Barclays League.

The details of the sponsorship package were presented to the member clubs at a special meeting last week. they received favourable comment, and work is now being put in hand to provide the clubs with materials in time for the start of next season.

A new sponsor is now being sort for the Isthmian League Cup (currently known as the AC Delco Cup) and the Managers of the Month award – which have been sponsored by HUnting Gate Homes.

The three LOCTITE competitions which have been introduced this season of which tonight's is one, remain in place for next season.

Chairman and Managing Director added: "I think our new sponsors' foresight in supporting community football in such a positive manner should be applauded. Now our clubs can continue to enjoy the best rewards available for football at our level."

#### THE ISTHMIANS AND CUPS

In the total history of the Isthmian League which is currently known as the Vauxhall Football League, league cup competitions are but a recent addition to the competition which is rapidly approaching its 90th. birthday.

Formed as long ago as 1905, it was not until 1974/5 season that a cup competition was instituted and then only as a subsidiary competition to make up the number of fixtures for the clubs in the then Second (now First) Division.

Since that time the League has embraced such competitions wholeheartedly and the introduction of the three LOCTITE competitions this season means that every aspect of the Vau×hall League is now covered.

Tonight's competition is played for between the Associate Members of the League, that is, the clubs in Division Two North and South. Next week Chesham United will take on either Bishop's Stortford or Redbridge Forest in the LOCTITE CUP, the competition for Full Member clubs who all compete in the Premier Division and Division One.

The third LOCTITE competition was the Youth Cup, which was settled last week at Carshalton Athletic where Epsom and Ewell defeated Bromley 4-0.

Introducing ...

#### RUISLIP MANOR FOOTBALL CLUB

The club was founded in 1938 and spent their first season playing in the Uxbridge League finishing in joint first position. They were also finalists in their League Cup competition and won the Harrow Charity Cup.

The club was a founder member of the Middlesex League in 1939, a competition which continued throughout the War and after it, changing its name to the Parthenon League in 1951 when several clubs from outside Middlesex joined. The club remained as members until only 1946 when they left to join the London League, playing in Division One.

Another move occurred in 1947, but this time it was not of League, but of Headquarters when the club moved from Sidmouth Drive to their present Grosvenor Vale ground. The 1947/8 season saw Manor finish as runners-up to Cheshunt in the London League Division One despite leading the table for most of the season. No automatic promotion and relegation existed between the London League Divisions. Only Senior clubs were allowed to play in the Premier Division, a status not awarded to the club until 1950.

Ruislip Manor were London League Premier Division runners-up in 1951/2 behind West Thurrock. The following season Manor finished third in the table. In 1954 the club were losing finalists in the League Cup. No more honours were won in this league and in 1958 they took up the chance to transfer to the stronger Spartan League. They stayed in that competition until 1965, finishing third in 1961/2 and 1962/3. Despite finishing near the bottom of the table in 1965, Manor were accepted into the Second Division of the Athenian League, replacing Histon. The move up was not successful, finishing bottom of the Division, losing 22 of their 30 matches and conceding 104 goals in the process. After coming 14th., 9th. and 12th. in the following seasons, they came bottom again in 1970. However, three seasons later in complete contrast the club managed to avoid defeat in all but two league games and won the Second Division championship ahead of Hampton.

Due to the formation of a new Isthmian League Second Division in 1973, there were only two Athenian League Divisions for 1973/4, Manor competing in the top one. They finished that season in third place behind Boreham Wood and Cheshunt., The 1976/77 season saw them come bottom of the division but with the introduction of another Isthmian Division the Athenian League was reduced to just one division.

Ruislip Manor stayed in the Athenian League until it was disbanded in 1984 when they joined Division Two (South) of the Isthmian League. In 1985 the club finished next to bottom in the League. But in recent seasons Manor have been challenging for league honours. The last four seasons has seen the club finish in a position in the top nine with their best placing achieved last term when finishing fourth behind Yeading, Molesey and their opponents today, Abingdon Town. Their highest points tally of 76 was achieved in 1987 when finishing fifth in the table.

The 1990/1 season has seen the club reach the fourth qualifying round of the F.A. Cup for the first time, beating Hendon and Wealdstone on the way before bowing out 5-2 at Halesowen Town.

As well as reaching the Loctite Trophy Final the club has also reached the Final of the Middlesex Charity Cup.

MICK SIMMONS: (Goalkeeper) Rejoined the Manor last October after playing for Dulwich Hamlet. Mick has also played for Middlesex County F.A. Rep. sides.

RUISLIP MANOR

MARTIN ROWEN: (Full Back) Joined from Wembley in the 1986/7 season after winning County, Youth and Schoolboy honours.

GARY COLLINSON: (Full Back) Enthusiastic and hard working player who spent the first half of the season mainly in the Reserves, but has graduated to the First team since the start of the year.

STEPHEN MURPHY: (Centre Back) "Spud" as he is known played for Manor in the mid-70's before joining Wembley where he made over 500 appearances. Last season he was at Kingsbury Town before rejoining the Grosvenor Vale side this season.

FRED CUMMINGS: (Centre-Back) Joined a the start of the current campaign and a long career that spanned spells at Uxbridge, Hillingdon Borough and Chalfont St. Peter. Has missed only two games this season.

PETER WILKINS: (Midfield) Another ex-Wembley player and a tireless worker in Midfield. 1988/9 Manor "Player of the year" with over 200 appearances to his name.

ANDY SKYERS: (Forward) Has played for the Manor for over a decade, first joining in 1978 where he played in the successful Youth Team. His wing play is a vital part of the Ruislip game.

GARY FARRANT: (Midfield) In his second season with the club having joined from Sunday Football. Is also the teams penalty taker.

STEVE LAWRENCE: (Forward) One of the most skilful ball players in the club, his close control and ability to beat defenders coupled with his finishing power provide a tough job for his marker.

KEVIN QUINN: (Forward) Previously with Walthamstow Avenue, kevin is in his third season at Ruislip. The clubs leading scorer for the last two seasons, he is currently leading the way again with 31 goals in the middle of April. Has also been awarded County honours by Middlesex.

STEVE MOWLE: (Midfield) Signed during the close season, this is his second spell at the club and has also played for Chalfont St. Peter and Harrow Borough.

CHARLIE TURLUNCH: ((Fullback or Midfield) Another player in his second spell with Ruislip. having also previously played for Wembley and Hendon.

TONY WAUGH: (Forward) Played for the club in the 70's and until recently was player/manager at Wembley having also spent many years playing for that club as well.

MARTIN SNOW: (Defender/Midfield) Joined in the close season and his versatility makes him a vital member of the first team squad.

ANDY PALMER: (Midfield) Started the season with the Reserves but forced his way into the first team after many outstanding performances in the Suberban League.

CHRIS BALLS: (Utility Player) Is without a doubt the most versatile player in the club. This season he has played at the back, in midfield and up front as a striker. He also deputised in goal earlier in the season in a match at Harefield after an injury to the keeper. Previously with Chalfont St. Peter.
