THE CARLSBERG TROPHY

Like a butterfly tonight's competition has come through many stages to reach its present form and although tonight is the climax of only the fifth competition we are witnessing the ending of its third title.

Instigated for the 1990/91 season as the "Associate Members Trophy" it initially attracted sponsorship from the Loctite Company for its first two years when the winners were Ruislip Manor and Purfleet. Upon cessation of the Loctite Company's involvement the competition ran in 1992/93 under its forming title of the Associate Members Trophy when Northwood were the winners.

The competition started last season under that title as well, but early in the season the League announced that it was delighted to have secured sponsorship with Carlsberg-Tetley Brewing Ltd. for the competition and its sister, "The Full Members Cup" for initially the 1993/94 season and for the competitions to be renamed the Carlsberg Cup and Trophy.

A highly successful 1993/94 Carlsberg Trophy competition was climaxed at Hendon's Claremont Road Ground where Chertsey Town scored the only goal of the Final against Hornchurch. It was to prove a particularly successful time for Chertsey who days later ensured their promotion to Division One for this season, and then to everybody's surprise except their own, defeated Enfield in the Final of the League Cup.

At the League's Annual Banquet and Ball, League Chairman Alan Turvey was able to announce to the gathering that Carlsberg-Tetley Brewing were to continue their sponsorship once more this season.

It is perhaps fitting that Collier Row, based in the London Borough of Havering, not far from Carlsberg-Tetley's base at the former Romford Brewery and also in the London Borough of Havering are one of the Finalists here this evening. Whilst in a professional sense the eastern extremity of the Metropolitan Police area is also the London Borough of Havering.

Our Carlsberg Finalists Today: **COLLIER ROW**

The Row were founded as a Junior club playing in local league football as "Collier Row Motor Gear". They then progressed into Intermediate football joining the Essex Olympian League, where they enjoyed many years of success. However, their ambition was to progress to Senior football and they took the first steps along this path in the 1980/81 season by joining the London Spartan League as an Intermediate club. The following season, the Essex County F.A. granted the Club Senior status and upon this they became members of the London Spartan League's Senior Division, finishing fifth in their first season.

The summer of 1982 brought Alan Marson to the club from local Isthmian side, Hornchurch, and his enthusiasm both on and off the field brought immediate success to the club in that they were joint Senior Division Champions with Buckinghamshire side Beaconsfield United.

The success of that season continued in 1983/4 when the Premier Division title was won, with only three defeats recorded and the Club also achieved its best performance in the London Senior Cup with a place in the last sixteen. During that cup run Isthmian sides Wembley and Staines were beaten. They also reached the League Cup Final.

A first entry in the FA Vase was recorded in 1984/5 where they achieved a quarter-final place before losing to Wisbech Town. They were runners-up to Burnham in the league and reached the semi's of the league cup. More importantly than both of these achievements, the club laid its plans for gaining entry to the Isthmian League then sponsored by Vauxhall.

The 1985/6 season culminated in the Club's Isthmian ambitions being realised -

they won the Spartan League championship in the final game of the season and their three championships in four seasons were duly recognised.

Collier Row finished ninth in their first Isthmian season in Division Two North, but the highlight was their F.A. Vase run which took them to the semi-finals where they were defeated by Warrington Town over two legs.

A year later they gained promotion to Division One alongside Wivenhoe Town, but the stay was but the shortest one, and relegation back to Division Two North at the first attempt. Their fortunes slumped even further with the league's re-organisation in 1990/91 when, after finishing twelfth in Two North, they were placed in the lower Division Three.

A new team under Matt Ross was put together for the 1991/92 season which finished tenth, and a season later another change of Manager brought Reg Wells to the club and he guided them to promotion to Division Two. The 93/4 season started brightly, but a walkout of players and management in December left the Club in dire straits, and although they fulfilled their fixtures, they were nevertheless, once again relegated. Strangely enough, Row did quite well in the FA Vase where they reached the last sixteen.

This season former Ford United boss Donal McGovern is in charge at the Sungate, and sunnier times are here again. The club has won promotion to Division Two for the 1995/96 season, and today appears in an Isthmian Final for the first time since joining the League.



The Collier Row Players

ALLEN McKNIGHT Former Northern Ireland goalkeeper who is now aged 30. Allen won a Scottish League and Cup "double" with Glasgow Celtic before joining West Ham United. He subsequently spent two years in Hong Kong playing for South China before playing at Exeter City last season.

TERRY BECK 28 year old former Dagenham, Barking and Ford United centre-back who has picked up representative honours with both the London and Essex F.A.'s.

PAUL JEFFREY played for Southend United as a youth but has also had two spells with Ford United totalling six years which were separated by a period with East Thurrock United. Now aged 32.

STEVE MUNDAY back at the Club this season for a second spell. A much travelled player in Essex circles having represented Purfleet, Billericay, Barking and Ford United. This 30 year old can play anywhere in defence or midfield.

GARY HUDSPETH Skilful full-back who played for Watford's Youth team at one stage before giving up senior football for a period. He was persuaded to return to the senior scene with Ford United and is now aged 26.

FRASER McLEAN Strong central defender who was first brought into senior football by Leytonstone Ilford and who has subsequently played for Basildon United and Ford United in the Essex Senior League.

ASHLEY MARSH is a 22 year old Utility player who first played for Collier Row Juniors between the ages of 8 and 16 and has now played over 100 games in three spells at the Sungate Ground, which have been interspersed with two periods at Ford United.

PAUL EVANS Began as a youth team player at Sunderland, and since returning south has played for Ruislip Manor, Barking and Ford United. A competitive mid-fielder who captained Ford United to

victory in last season's London Senior Cup Final.

PERRY CONEY Vastly experienced 35 year old who joined Row this season after eight years with Barking, which included a spell as player/manager. Holds an Essex County Cap and has played for the Diadora League Representative side.

DARREN SOUTHGATE Joined Row for the second time this season. Has had spells at Tottenham, Sheffield United, Southend and Millwall before moving into the non-League game where his most recent clubs have been Billericay and Ford United - the scorer of the winning goal for Ford in the London Senior Cup Final.

DANNY BENSTOCK is a hard working midfielder who has an eye for goal. Age 24, he played for a number of local sides before attracting a five figure fee when joining Leyton Orient from Barking. Has represented London Schools.

STEVE WARNER Made his name with Dagenham before their amalgamation with Redbridge Forest and subsequently joined Dover, for whom he was a member of the Beazer Homes Championship side. Last season played for Billericay.

TONY SIBANDA Strong forward, aged 27 who first played for Row in the 1992/3 season before moving to Hendon, Yeading and then Kingsbury from whom he was signed in November 1994. Twice capped for Zimbabwe.

KEVIN RENDELL Back in football after a two year absence. Helped Billericay to promotion to Division One in his last full season.

PETER SHEA 30 year old forward who helped Grays win the Essex Thameside Trophy against Southend. Also played for Tilbury and Ford United. Joined Row at the end of last season.

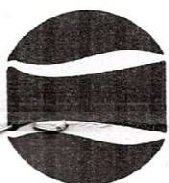

Our Carlsberg Finalists Today: **METROPOLITAN POLICE**

On 6th. July, 1829, Sir Robert Peel formed the Metropolitan Police, the first organised Police Force in the world, with an office overlooking the Thames at Whitehall known as Scotland Yard, a name that has become famous throughout the world, and also became synonymous with the Metropolitan Police. Ninety years later, and in 1919, the Metropolitan Police Football Club was formed and played friendly matches until joining the Spartan league in 1928 and, apart from the war years (1939/45), remained in that competition until 1960.

During that time the "Mets" were League Champions eight times, runners up once and League Cup winners once. In 1960 the mets seeking to enhance their status, joined the Metropolitan League, winning the League Cup in 1969. In 1971 a major step forward was taken when the Mets were accepted into the Southern (now Beazer Homes) League and played in Division One South, under Team manager Vic Rouse, a former Wales and Crystal Palace goalkeeper, until 1977.

In 1977 the Mets were one of the founder members of Division Two of the Isthmian League and finished as runners-up to Epsom & Ewell in that first season, thus promotion to the First Division followed. In 81/2 they missed promotion to the Premier Division by just two points, finishing third. However, in 1984/5 they finished third again - this time from bottom and were relegated to Division Two (South). Ironically in that season they also reached the First Round of the F.A. Cup, and although they lost to Dartford, the match was featured on BBC's "match of the Day" programme

Met's finished 7th. in Division Two South in both the following seasons and in the summer of 1987, Vic Rouse resigned as team manager to be succeeded by former player Andy McElwee, a former Reserve Team manager.

In 1987/88 the club finished as runners-up to Chalfont St. Peter after leading the way for most of the season. Middle of the table positions were gained in the two

successive Division One campaigns of 88/9 and 89/90. Andy McElwee was succeeded by John Rees in the summer of 1990 but several serious injuries coupled with poor league form led to the Mets once again being relegated for the 1991/2 season. This time into the new non-regionalised Division Two. John Rees left the manager's seat and Colin Rose was appointed manager - in his first season they led the table at Christmas, but dropped to 7th. by the final whistle in May.

The club's performance in the 1985/6 season FA Cup has already been mentioned, and prior to this season the only other appearance in the First Round proper was back in season 1931/2 when they lost away to Northampton Town. In fact cup-ties have not been their happiest of hunting grounds. The only time they have won the Surrey Senior Cup was back in 1933, overcoming Dulwich hamlet in the final 2-1. They have also won both the Surrey Charity Shield and the Middlesex Senior Cup when they played at Hendon - but in both cases only a single win in a final can be recorded. In the F.A. Vase their best achievements have been in 1991/2 and again this season when they reached the quarter finals.

The Mets home ground at Imber Court, East Molesey was acquired by the Force for use as a sports ground in 1919. The mainclubhouse opened a year later, although it has been vastly extended. The football facilities have been developed over the years in an attempt to provide the very best for spectator and player alike. The finances for the continual improvement of facilities are mainly derived from a lottery run within the Force.

Season 1993/4 and 1994/5 have been good ones for the Mets. They achieved a place in the First Round of the F.A. Cup for only the third time in their history and finished 8th. in Diadora league Division Two. This season they have been in the top eight for the whole of the season, although promotion will once again not be achieved. Tonight marks the first occasion that the Club has reached a League Cup Final.



The Metropolitan Police Players

IAN PENDRY (Striker) Played for Haywards Heath and Chichester College and Hassocks in the Sussex County League and after joining the service in June '87 established himself in the First Team and English Police sides. He is a Constable in South London.

PAUL CARRUTH (Defender) After representing Scottish Schools he played in the Scottish League with St. Mirren and Queens Park. Prefers the left side and is a good header of the ball. Joined the Service in 1986 and is P.C. in S.W. London.

MARK REED (Midfield/Forward) 27 year old who played for Essex County Schools before graduating to West Ham, Rainham Town and Barking. He is a Detective in the East End.

JIM COOPER (Defender) A very versatile player who also has an attacking flair. His previous clubs include Leytonstone/Ilford, Dagenham, Barking and Aveley. He earned an Essex Senior Cup winners medal whilst with Barking. He is a Constable in East London.

CARL NAYLOR (Defender) Brought up in Halewood, Liverpool and his early football experience was with Merseyside County and then Sunderland Poly. teams. Joined the Service in 1986. Has a B.A. (Hons) degree in accounting and economics and is a Constable in S.W. London.

LEE THOMPSON (Goalkeeper) This is his second season with the Club and was the first member of the Civilian Branch to play for the Mets. He works in the Crime Support Group Office in a West London Police Station.

BILLY MOCHAN (Midfield) Hails from Nottingham, but was brought up in Stenhousemuir, Scotland and played for local sides before joining the Service in 1988. A clever ball player with a deceptive body swerve. He is still single and is a Detective in South London.

GRAHAM TAYLOR (Midfield) The longest and most loyal servant in the side. Played for Surrey and English School sides from 1976/78 and also played for Isthmian leaguers Hampton. On joining the Service he became a regular in the Mets side for

more years than even he cares to remember. He is a Sergeant in central London.

IAN GODDARD (centre-half) Has played in the past for Cambridge City, Haverhill Rovers and the Cambridgeshire County XI. Proud member of the Met. Police Civil Branch and works as an Assistant Identification Officer in Central London. Has previous experience as a Sports Reporter.

MARK ADAMS Born and brought up in West and North West London he first played for Wealdstone and has also played for Hayes, Harrow Borough and Slough Town. He also played in the U.S. Indoor League with New York Arrows. 32 year old who joined the Service in 1990. Has represented the British Police, The F.A XI and the Isthmian League. He is a Constable in North London.

GRAHAM EDWARDS (Striker) Missed a great deal of last season through injury and his pace down the wing was sorely missed. He is currently a Constable in North London.

MARK HELLIER (Goalkeeper) Came into the side last season to replace an injured colleague and has now firmly established himself in the Squad. He is a Constable in Central London.

MARTIN HOWARD (Striker) Very fast heavily built player who played for Ruislip Manor before joining the Service. A Constable in N.W. London.

MARIO RUSSO (Forward) Long time member of the Met's squad, and often found to be their leading scorer over the course of a season.

COLIN ROSE (Team Manager) Has been in the Service for much of the last 20 years and was a regular member of the side until 1985 when he turned to management with the Reserves. Later became manager of the First Team. In his playing days he was a strong tackling defender with a high degree of ball skills. He lives and works in East London as a Detective Constable.

THE DIADORA FOOTBALL LEAGUE

This is the Ninetieth season of The Diadora Football League as we know it today and although it cannot claim to be the oldest competitive competition in the land it certainly can claim to be one of the most innovative. Originally formed for the 1905/6 season, three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of Ilford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon. Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss the subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives of the six clubs present - London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaird as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

Much had been made in those far off days of the re-birth of the modern Olympics in Athens in 1896 and as such Greek names were very much the "in thing", thus Isthmian with its Greek connotations became the name of what was to become the senior amateur league in the South of England. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 87 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions. The latest clubs to be welcomed are Canvey Island already assured of promotion in their inaugural season along with Bedford Town who shortly after these notes were written may have accompanied them into Division Two for next season. Slough Town returned after several seasons in the GM Vauxhall Conference and have challenged strongly for the Championship. The League can boast of three clubs who have gone on to Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Premiership club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and stayed until 1964. The former Maidstone United were also members between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers are now in the Football League Division Two only seven years after leaving our ranks.

The Isthmian League under the Chairmanship of Barry East first embraced professionalism and sponsorship in the early 70's and was the first league to award three points for a win. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the League from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed six years of that sponsorship agreements which at the time was the longest running sponsorship in football.

The league is now completing its term of a sponsorship agreement with Diadora UK which has seen the Italian Sportswear Company gain a share of the UK market and become a high profile advertiser on sports grounds around the country. It was noticeable in the last World Cup that several of the competing countries had chosen the Diadora strip for their players and Company have expressed much satisfaction in the way the Sponsorship has been conducted over the four year term.

During the past decade the league has emerged from the "amateur" tag that it previously had, and now plays a full part each year in the pyramid of football where it provides clubs with both a platform to rise from, and in the case of the clubs at a lower level, a target of membership to aim at. Stevenage at the start of the season were the eighth club to rise to the GM Vauxhall Conference through the Isthmian League as part of the F.A. pyramid system following in the footsteps of Sutton Utd, Wycombe Wanderers, Farnborough Tn, Yeovil Tn, Slough Tn, Redbridge Forest and Woking. They have had a most successful season in the Conference and a top five position looks a likely outcome of their first campaign. Other member clubs Dagenham and Enfield have also been members of that competition but not by way of promotion.

In recent years, member clubs Dagenham and Bishop's Cleeve won the F.A. Trophy whilst Sutton United were runners-up. Southall reached the Final of the F.A. Challenge Vase, and Yeading went one step better and won the competition in 1990. Next Saturday we hope to add to that tally with Oxford City becoming the third Club whilst in membership of the League to appear in a F.A. Challenge Vase Final which is now sponsored by Carlsberg.

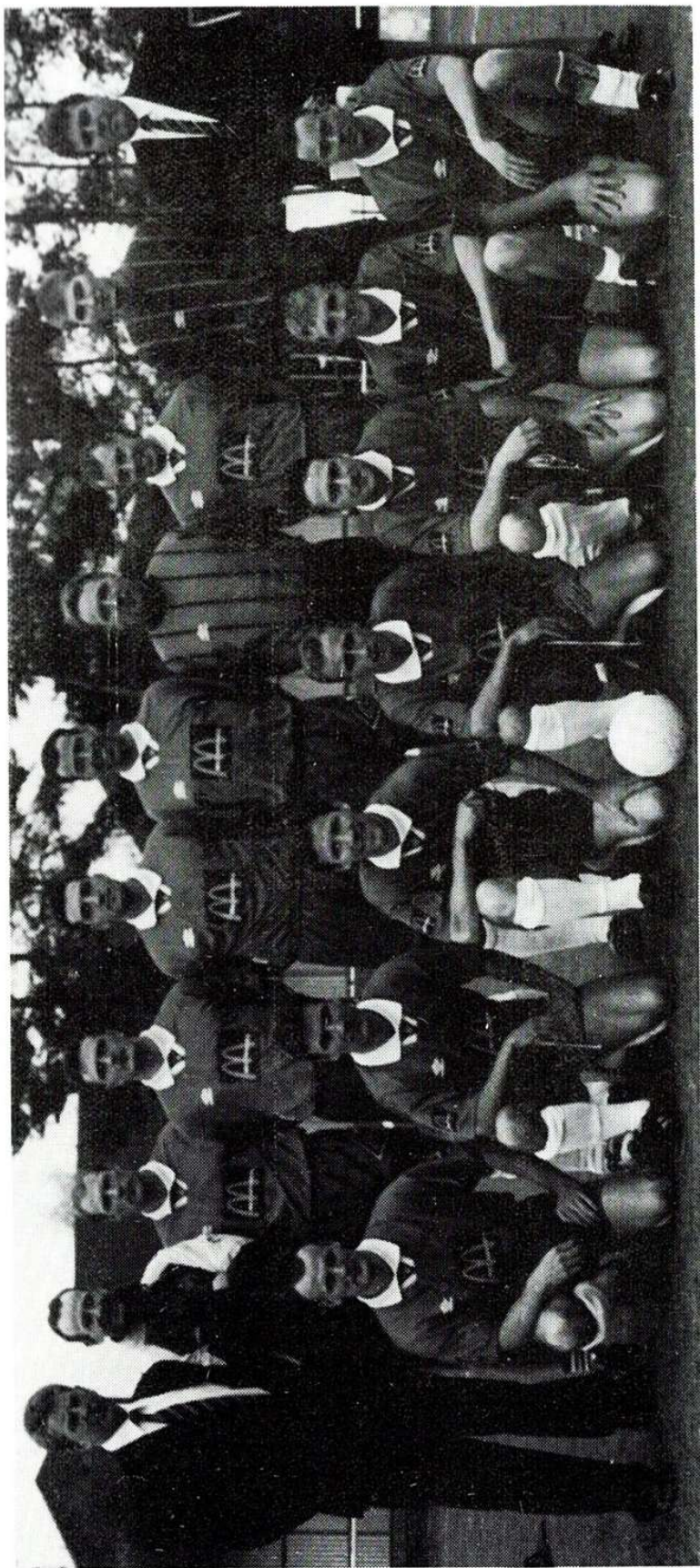
