Marlow Football Club is building for a successful future; there are one or two technicalities to go through, of course, but the club plans to have the sort of facilities promotion requires.


In January of last year MFC directors and shareholders agreed a plan with property company North West Estates (NWE) to safeguard the club's future financial security and provide it with a new FA Conference-standard stadium.

The existing Alfred Davis Ground will be transferred to NWE, and in return a new 1000-seater stadium, a full-size training pitch and a half-size all-weather pitch will be created, along with a capital lump sum that will produce income for the club's future.

The new stadium will be on land NWE owns across the A404, east of the town, and as part of the planned development, there will be new roads and visitor parking, as part of a comprehensive leisure scheme in the gravel pit area.

There's a long way to go before any of this happens but local people support the principle of a move. It is unlikely the move will take place before the beginning of the 2002-2003 season.

NWE and the club are finalising details of the new facilities and are taking part in a Study with Wycombe Council which will lead to Supplementary Planning Guidance for the area It is to be hoped that this will speed up the planning process and allow the "vision" to be realised.





A BRIEF HISTORY OF MARLOW F.C



It was on November 22nd 1870 at the Compleat Angler Hotel on the banks of the Thames that Great Marlow Football Club was formed and so began the history of one of the oldest clubs in the country.

In the last century the Club was a major force in the game and as one of the original entrants in the first F.A Cup competition in 1871/72 contributed a share of the £25 that bought the first trophy. Marlow have the unique distinction of being the only club to have entered every competition since its inception although they were unable to compete once earlier this century. In 1882 they reached the semi-finals where they lost out to eventual winners Old Etonians 0-5 at the Oval. Two Amateur Cup semi-finals and a host of Berks & Bucks Senior Cup wins were among many honours won in this golden age. In 1894 Marlow rejected the opportunity to join the newlyformed Southern League in order to retain their amateur status and allowed Tottenham Hotspur to begin their climb to the top flight.

The Club's ground until 1919 was Crown Meadow, now the Riley Recreational Ground. An enforced move to the Star Meadow meant demotion from the Great Western Suburban League to the Reading League as this ground was unfenced and without the necessary facilities. The Club's long-serving Honarary Secretary Alfred Davis appealed for funds and subscriptions to purchase a new headquarters and contributed much himself. Sadly he died before the opening of the new ground in 1924 which to this day remains home to Marlow F.C and dedicated to his memory. The picturesque grandstand dates from 1930's and was built to celebrate the Club's revival and the Spartan League Division Two championship.

Apart from a war-time break Marlow continued in the Spartan League upto 1965 when entry was gained to the Athenian League Division Two. Promotion to Division One was secured in season 1970/71. Here Marlow remained until 1984 when they joined the Isthmian League, having finished bottom of Division Two in 1985 the appointment of Mike Keen as Manager heralded a rapid rise in status. Promotion to Division One came the very next season and then after just one season in Division One the championship was won after a two horse race with Grays Athletic and along with it promotion to the Premier Division.

Here Marlow found things much tougher and Christmas arrived without a win and from a position at the foot of the table relegation looking very likely. However a late season Houdini act saw them escape and secure their new-found status. When Keen left his assistant Dave Russell took over and brought in Laurie Craker as Coach. Under them good times returned and the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won for the first time this century with a victory over local rivals Wycombe Wanderers and the F.A Cup First Round was reached, also for the first time this century, with an away tie at West Bromwich Albion the reward.

Season 1992/93 saw even more F.A Cup success with progression this time to the Third Round and a tie with Tottenham Hotspur that had to be switched to White Hart Lane where a crowd of almost 27000 saw the Blues give a very creditable performance. The Diadora (Isthmian) League Cup was won to finish the season on a high note by beating Molesey 2-I at Aldershot's Stadium.

1993/94 must rate as the most successful ever with Marlow again reaching the First Round of the F.A Cup where a 0-2 home defeat against Plymouth Argyle was featured on T.V. while in the league a highest-ever position of third was achieved. The Berks & Bucks Senior Cup was won again with a 1-0 win over local rivals Chesham Utd.

At the end of that season Russell and Craker left for Slough Town and took several players with them. A new squad and slow start left a lot to do in the league and a brave late fight failed to see the Blues avoid relegation. In the F.A Cup things were very different. The First Round saw Division Two table-toppers Oxford Utd. defeated 2-0 at Oak Tree Road and the Blues became the first winners of the Littlewoods Pools' Giant Killers award. Another home victory followed over Trophy holder's Woking to secure a place in the Third Round once again and a trip to Swindon where the home side were grateful to progress by a 2-0 scoreline.

Season 1995/96 saw a good start and great finish in the league with a finish in eighth spot but the following one got off to a terrible start from which the Club was never able to recover – and despite victories over virtually all the top sides, relegation was confirmed on the last day of the season.

Russell returned for the following season and with him high hopes but the season proved to be one of under-achievement and a new team of Graham Pritchard and Derek Sweetman took over for 1998/1999 and provided a period of stability which saw finishes in mid-table. Following the departure of Pritchard just before this season Sweetman has taken over the reins with a largely unchanged squad and hopes this will provide a sound base for progress.

DEREK SWEETMAN (Manager) A former Blue who played for many other local clubs. Previously Assistant Manager at Maidenhead Utd and was Joint Manager at Egham in season 1997/8. Has taken over as Manager after assisting for the previous three seasons.

ANDY AUGUSTE 20 year old local lad who was with Wycombe Wanderers and Oxford United as a youth player. Has progressed through reserves into first team squad. Debut 20/02/00.

JOHN BEALE In his first season following a move to the area. As a youngster was on the books of Notts County and has since played at Arnold Town and Stotfold.

JASON BOWLER 23 year old who was out of the game for 18 months prior to last season through a serious illness after spells with Notts County and Cambridge City. England schools under 18 international. Debut 21/10/00.

JIM BRADLEY In his fourth season. Previous clubs are Bracknell, Wokingham and Egham. Voted "Player Of The Year" for 1998/1999. Debut 22/08/98.

FRANKIE BRANNAN Now in his fifth season and was formerly on YTS forms with Wycombe Wanderers and with Chelsea as a junior. Missed most of last season with a long-term injury. Debut 16/08/97.

LEE CARROLL 24 year old who made record number of appearances in Chelsea Youth team. In his 5 years there he was also sub. for a European game. Subsequently spent two years with Northwood. Last season's "Player-Of-The-Year for 1999/2000. Debut 14/08/99.

JAMIE CHARLES Young, left-sided player with pace who was a regular scorer at Flackwell Heath from whom he signed at the start of this season.

KEVIN CHURCHILL-BROWNE 23 year old from Maidenhead who joined last scason. Wa previously with Maidenhead United and Slough Town. Debut 29/08/00.

GARY COCKERILL Experienced goalkeeper who was instrumental in the success of the reserve side last season. Debut 15/01/01.

LUKE EVANS Gained under-18 honours for Wales when with Brentford on schoolboy and

YTS forms. Moved on to Hayes and Maidenhead before joining Windsor & Eton from whom he signed at the beginning of last season. Debut 19/08/00.

GRANT GOODALL Captain of the side and a defender who joined after spending one season with Abingdon Town following his release by Oxford United. Voted "Player-Of-The Year" for seasons 1996/7 and 1997/8. Debut 19/08/95.

JOHN ISAAC 21 year old from Wycombe who was with Flackwell Heath youth and progressed through to the first team. Debut 16/12/00.

JEFF LAMB 21 year old quality left sided player who signed here in 1998 following his release from Wycombe Wanderers. Debut 27/10/98.

STEPHEN MILES Member of the youth team who has impressed since stepping into the first team with his pace and determination. Debut 16/01/01.

DANIEL PEDLEY Returned to the Club two seasons ago after a spell with Chalfont St. Peter. Progressed through the youth set up before moving on to Maidenhead Utd. and Flackwell Heath. Debut 15/04/95.

JAMES PRITCHARD Another product of the Marlow youth set up. Influential in midfield and a regular scorer he moved on to play for Maidenhead United and Flackwell Heath before returning. Last season's "Player Of the Year". Debut 23/12/95.

NICKY RYDER 30 year old who has seen service with Brentford, Hayes and Uxbridge where he was leading scorer in 6 of 7 seasons scoring some 150 goals. Debut 31/10/00.

SAM SHEPHERD 21 year old, son of a former Marlow player who was with Oxford Utd and who spent joined last season after a spell at Chesham. Debut 19/08/00.

JASON TRAVIS 23 year old who signed from Chalfont St. Peter. As a youngster was with Crystal Palace before moving on to Hayes. Debut 06/11/99.

GARY WILTSHIRE Skilful forward and another product of the Marlow youth system who has returned after spells with Chalfont St. Peter, Flackwell Heath and Maidenhead United. Debut 29/11/94

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HEMEL HEMPSTEAD TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB

Hemel Hempstead Football Club was founded in 1885 as Apsley F.C., and originally played their football in the West Herts League. The Club affiliated to the Herts Football Association in 1887, two years after the County Association was formed. At the time, the club enjoyed only moderate league success, but did achieve a run of County Senior Cup victories in the first decade of the 1900's, capturing the trophy in 1905/06, 1907/08 and retaining it in the 1908/09 season.

In 1921 the Club made the move to Spartan league and joined Division One. However, once again they had to look to the County Cups for their honours, winning the Senior Cup for the fourth time in 1925/26 and also for the first time, the Charity Cup in the same season. League success finally came in 1933/34 when they won the Spartan League Division One Championship, plus promotion to the Senior Division. The Charity Cup was again won in 1934/35 and 1951/52. In between these wins the Club changed its name to Hemel Hempstead Town, as well as becoming associate members of the Football Association in 1935.

A major step for the Club came in 1952 when they joined the Delphian League and became full members of the Football Association. The Club stayed in that league for eleven years, but unfortunately without any major success.

However in 1962 the senior side reached the first round of the FA Amateur Cup for the first time ever. Although they lost 1-3 to Tooting and Mitcham, the match was played in front of a crowd of 3,500 spectators - a record to this day.

The following season the Club joined the newly formed Athenian League. Once more, with a change of league came a County Cup success, with the Club winning the Charity Cup. In 1965 they gained promotion to the Premier Division, courtesy of a runners up spot behind Slough Town. Following several seasons in the Premier Division the Club was relegated in 1969.

In 1972 the Club amalgamated with Hemel Hempstead United from the South Midlands League and changed names to become Hemel Hempstead FC. Also, the Club moved to the current ground in Vauxhall Road and enjoyed success in the West Herts St Mary's Cup competition in 1971, 1976 and 1977.

In 1977 the Club joined the expanded Isthmian League, where they have remained ever since, and during that season they won the Herts Charity Shield, while the following year they went on to win the Middlesex Border League Cup.

During the 1980's Hemel Hempstead remained in Division Two of the Isthmian League, although never finishing higher than tenth position. Success was again limited to County Cups with the Club winning the Herts Charity Shield in 1984 and the West Herts St Mary's Cup in 1982, 1983 and 1986. In 1985, the Club's Centenary Year, 2,500 spectators watched Hemel Hempstead entertain Watford at Vauxhall Road.

The 1990's started with another St Mary's Cup victory, and then in 1992 the Club reached the final of the Herts Senior Cup where they met Barnet FC. The game was played at St Albans' Clarence Park ground where Hemel Eventually lost 4-1 as superior fitness saw victory achieved with three goals late in the game.

In November 1992 the Club was rocked by a damaging fire, which destroyed the clubhouse, and the changing rooms, and was forced to rearrange several matches whilst temporary buildings were erected.

Easter Monday 1993 saw over 1,100 spectators for the local derby with Berkhamsted Town. Both Clubs were heavily involved in the promotion race, but the visitors won 1-0 and then went on to finish two points higher than Hemel and gain promotion. Hemel finished just outside the promotion places in fourth but went on to further success via the St Mary's Cup by beating Tring Town in the final.

In 1993/94 the club again won the St Mary's Cup, and at the same time underwent a major change in club officials and personnel both on and off the pitch.

During the 1995/96 season, the team was managed by Steve Ringrose, and with a young squad, he guided them safely away from the relegation zone. Further more the club reached the Herts County Cup Final and the St Mary's Cup Final, both of which they lost by a single goal.

The 1996/97 season proved to be disastrous for the Club, with five different Team Managers being appointed during the season and the club was in a dire financial situation. Steve Ringrose left following a 9-0 defeat against Leatherhead and he was followed within a matter of weeks by Mark Pearson and Andy MacMahon. Brian Jackson then took temporary control in January, and in February Colin Jones, formerly of Berkhamsted Reserves was appointed Manager. He brought in a number of young players but he could not prevent the club sliding into the Third Division as they finished in bottom place.

During the summer of 1997 new ownership was voted in, headed by local publican Dave Boggins. Cash was immediately injected into the club to improve the ground and clubhouse. A new man was also brought in as first team manager in the shape of Mick Vipond, who had previously been with Leverstock Green. He brought with him his coach from the successful South Midlands League side, Danny Johnson.

In their first season in charge, Hemel the won the third division championship and the club was promoted at the first attempt. Mick Vipond received the Manager of the Year award and after conceding only 28 league goals all season the club finished with the best defensive record in the entire Ryman league. Hemel also had a good run in the F.A Vase and reached the St Mary's Cup final, where they lost with nine men in extra time to Berkhamsted.

For the start of the 1998/99 season, the name of the club changed to Hemel Hempstead Town Football Club. Work was carried out to improve the ground and the old clubhouse was re-opened along with new changing rooms. During December Vipond and Johnson parted company with the club and were immediately replaced by ex-Watford star Neil Price along with Roy Butler as his coach. Within four months Price turned Hemel's season around, guiding the club from 16th in the table to 4th. In a tense finish to the season Hemel narrowly missed out on promotion whilst reaching the final of the South Midlands Floodlight Cup, losing 0-1 at home to Ryman Division One club Barton Rovers.

Price and Butler's first full season in charge ended with Hemel winning the Ryman Division Two Championship with 101 points, gaining the club's highest ever league finish in the process. However, Hemel were refused promotion after Vauxhall Road was not granted the required ground grading for Division One.

The completion of two new stands during the summer of 2000 and the building of a new clubhouse during the following season saw the club gain a Grade B for the ground. Unfortunately on the pitch Hemel could not quite match the previous season's effort and finished sixth in the league at the end of the season. The club did however reach the final of the Associate Members Trophy and can now build for the future under the guidance of new manager Gary Phillips who took over during the close season following the resignation of Price, with the guarantee of being a member of the new Division One North for the start of season 2002/3.



NEWS FROM AROUND THE LEAGUE

Promotion and relegation for end of 2001-2002 Season

When the matter of promotion and relegation was considered at the EGM in December 2000 it was on the basis that one club would be relegated from the Premier Division with three clubs promoted from Division One; a suggestion was been put forward that three clubs should be relegated from the Premier Division and five clubs promoted or an alternative position of two clubs being relegated and four promoted. Since the AGM the Management Committee has been consulted by telephone and the majority are in favour of leaving the matter as originally put forward i.e. that only one club be relegated from the Premier Division and that the usual three clubs be promoted from Division One. This was the proposal at the time of the EGM in December 2000 and was given in answer to a question from The FA Leagues Sanction Committee in February 2001.

Turvey wins overwhelming support

League chairman and managing director Alan Turvey has been re-elected as chairman after beating former Chesham United chairman David Pembroke in a secret ballot at the Annual General Meeting. The vote — which was overseen by the League's legal advisers to ensure impartiallity — was conducted using ballot papers rather than the usual show of hands. Mr Turvey, chairman since 1982, was returned by 47 votes to 8. Speaking to the meeting after being declared the winner, Mr Turvey thanked the clubs for their continuing support and asked for their unity as the League works with the FA and others to restructure the national game.

New Ryman structure approved

The League's Annual General Meeting approved the restructuring of the leagues for the 2002/03 season. The new structure, which has been agreed at an EGM just after Christmas, will consist of a Premier Division of 24 clubs, First Division North, First Division South, also both 24, and 16 in the Second Division. Promotion and relegation has still to be agreed and after taking views from the floor the League's management committee will meet shortly to make some proposals. Meanwhile clubs will have the chance to discuss the national restructuring of the game at a series of informal meetings.

Newcomers start to build

Following their return to the Ryman League, Kingstonian have started to plan for the new season. On the pitch a problem with the watering system has been solved. Parts of the Kingsmeadow surface did not appear to be draining last season. At first this was put down to the torrential rain. It now seems there was a leak in the irrigation system and this has been fixed. New manager Bill Williams has begun working on a squad for the new season after many of last season's team have left. One of the biggest blows is the loss of keeper Steve Farrelly who missed the second half of the season after a near fatal injury. He is now fit again, but the club has been unable to agree terms. Williams has spoken to Farnborough keeper Stuart Mackenzie but the player seems set to stay at Cherrywood Road, where he will be join by former Ks striker Gary Patterson.

Loasby moves into at Leighton

Following the resignation of Craig Johnstone, Leighton Town have named Steve Loasby as their new manager. A Dunstable man with a broad footballing knowledge, Loasby was manager of Toddington Rovers during their successful period in the 1990s. Although he will be appointing a coach and Reserve Team manager as soon as possible, he is also keen to take a fresh look at the local talent within the immediate area. His aim is to create an attractive squad which is capable of being promoted from Division 3 of the Ryman League at the first attempt. Club Chairman Iain McGregor said: "Steve has

the experience to build a side capable of getting the club back up the Ryman League. With his knowledge and ability he will be able to build a structure which will benefit the club in both the short and the long term. This is a most exciting appointment for our club."

Tractor Boys give a helping hand

Next season footballers at Beveree Stadium, home of Hampton & Richmond Borough, will run onto the pitch through a new players tunnel. Instead of the old metal barriers a plastic covered tunnel which will concertina out to the edge of the pitch has been installed at Hampton's ground. This welcome improvement to the club's facilities has been obtained at no cost from Ipswich Town. Ipswich, already regarded as one of the friendliest football clubs among the professional ranks, offered the tunnel to chairman Victor Searle. All the club had to do was find the necessary transport to take it away. General manager Les Rance said " the 'tractor boys' really came through for us. The tunnel has already been installed, it just needs a spring clean to be ready for use - it will improve the access for supporters to the Simpson Stand and the clubhouse while presenting an attractive entrance for the players to enter the pitch. An additional bonus is that it bears the former Ipswich Town sponsor's name Greene King, which just happen to be the brewery that supplies our bar".

Earlsmead visited by Blair and Brown

Just days before the General Election, the Labour Battle Buses rolled into Harrow Borough for a surprise visit by the Prime Minister Tony Blair and Chancellor of the Exchequer Gordon Brown. The visit, part of the party's campaign to shore up one of the most marginal Labour seats in the country was arranged by Harrow West MP and firm Boro' supporter, Gareth Thomas. Club officials had been informed on Sunday evening that a cabinet minister could be visiting on Monday with Mr Thomas but it was not until early evening that the details were finally released from Labour Party HQ as to who the special guests were to be. The more astute may already have been suspicious following visits by Special Branch officers to look over the club. So just a few days after the club's car park was filled with television vans filming the Carlton Television drama Without Motive, starring Ross Kemp, the TV crews were back, although this time from ITN, Sky News and BBC News. Just before 9pm two of the familiar Battle Buses drove into the car park, one containing the ministers and party officials while the other contained members of the press. Harrow's commercial director Jim Hayes introduced the guests to a packed front bar at the club with all three making a small speech. Gareth Thomas did not miss the opportunity to plug "the finest football club in the area!" What followed was a touch surreal as the two ministers wandered into the main hall where Earlsmead was hosting its regular Monday evening Quiz Night. Standing quietly at the back listening to the questions being read out, it was several minutes before the question master stopped and announced their arrival. Tony Blair apologised for interrupting the evening as the politicians went round each table in turn, followed by a swarm of TV crews and photographers, shaking hands with some rather shell-shocked quiz nighters.

New Shots

Aldershot Manager George Borg has continued to strengthen his squad by naming two further additions. Striker Mark Watson has signed after playing at Chesham last season. Watson has previously at Sutton United before joining West Ham for £50,000 in 1995. He also played for Bournemouth and Welling before rejoining Sutton and playing a major part in the Ryman Premier Championship winning side of 1998-99. Last season Mark played for Woking who paid £8,000 for his services before his move to Chesham United. Also joining the Shots is 19 year old John Nutter from Wycombe Wanderers. John is a left sided player at home in defence or midfield who began at Blackburn Rovers before joining Wycombe at the end of last year.

Canvey take another prize

After winning the FA Umbro Trophy and finishing runners up in the Premier Division, Canvey Island were rewarded with some more silverware. To loud applause at the League's annual dinner and dance they were presented with the Barry East Trophy. Named after a former President of the League, it is awarded to the club who has done most to further the name of the Isthmian League in the national spotlight. As well as winning the FA Umbro Trophy, Canvey reached the Second Round proper of the FA Cup. Manager Jeff King was also represented with the FA Umbro Trophy after his side's success over Forest Green Rovers in the final.



At the moment this is a vision, but backed by a skilled and experienced developer with the resources to make it happen. A master plan has been produced and the Wycombe councillors will have to grant planning consent before it starts, though.
