So you can see the increase are 10p on adult ground admission and £3 on season tickets, but this year this includes a seat in the stand. OUR VISITORS - SUTTON UNITED The Sutton United team visiting Loakes Park today shows only a few changes from last season's line-up. Sutton's major new signing is left-back John Sparrow who, although still only 26, has considerable experience playing in the Football League. A former England Youth and England Schoolboy, Sparrow made his name at Chelsea playing in the side that won promotion to Division One in 1976-77; also in that team were England star Ray Wilkins and the former Wanderer Kenny Swain. Sparrow made 69 League appearances for Chelsea before joining Exeter City in 1979 and remained with the Devon Club until being given a free transfer earlier this year. Another new signing is Steve Galloway, a tall coloured striker who joined from Bromley where he scored 18 goals last season. Aged 20, he has also played for Dulwich Hamlet. One player returning to Sutton is Steve Bangs. He began his career there as a schoolboy in 1973 making 136 appearances for the Club before joining Carshalton in 1977. There is a doubt about Captain John Rains availability following an ankle injury sustained in pre-season training. If he is fit it is expected that he will play up-front following his successful conversion from a defender to a forward last season which led to him scoring no less than 25 goals. Uncertainty surrounds the playing future of Sutton's Assist-

ant Manager Larry Pritchard. Wycombe fans will remember that Larry, who will be 39 in October, broke his arm towards the end of last season and missed the two Hitachi Cup Final matches.

It is interesting to note that although both Sutton and Wycombe have played in previous Dylon Charity Shield matches today is the first occasion on which either has qualified in their own right. In 1980 Sutton were invited to play Enfield - winners of both the League and League Cup in 1979-1980 - as the losing Hitachi Cup Finalists, and last year faced Leytonstone & Ilford (who had also done the "double") as League runners-up. Wycombe's win at Slough in 1981 was made possible because Slough were also holders of the League and League Cup titles from the previous season, whilst runners-up Enfield had left to join the Alliance.

JOHN BOWLES NON LEAGUE COLUMN - 1

Despite a close season fire at Barking it will be business as usual when the Essex club begins its Servowarm Isthmian League programme. The fire at Mayesbrook Park caused damage estimated at £100,000 but the Dressing Rooms were saved, as was one of the large bars. Barking were adequately insured and are expected to recover rebuilding costs.

Chesham United, another club hit by fire near the end of last season expect to have their new stand in operation by September 30th. It will be smaller than the old one and will have improved dressing room facilities.

Molesey start the season under completely new management after the tribulations of 1982 - 83 when they were threatened with extinction and had to call in the trustees. They now have a new set of officials and a new manager in Arthur Evans, who previously spent 10 years at Epson and Ewell. He succeeds Peter Howell, who resigned for business reasons. However Molesey have met another setback. Their application form to enter the F.A. Vase arrived too late at the Football Association.

Corinthian-Casuals are to share the Molesey ground this season, having recently played the first leg of what could be a unique double - appearing at Hampden Park and Wembley in the same season. Casuals took part in a goalless match against Scotland's Queens Park on July 29th as part of the Surrey Club's Centenary Celebrations. They are hoping for a Wembley visit in the Final of the F.A. Vase on April 29th 1984.

Two well known faces will be missing from the football scene this season. They are Corinthian-Casuals Chairman Bill Wickson and Geoff Dell who has given up as Secretary of the Athenian League after 18 years. Bill resigned for personal reasons. Geoff's successor will be Brian Hitchings who in turn is succeeded as Secretary of the Essex and Herts Border Combination by Brian Daniels, a former Football League Referee.

News in brief: Maidenhead United are planning to sell their ground and move to a new site on the outskirts of the Town. Southern League Hillingdon Borough went into liquidation during the summer and a new club Hillingdon F.C. has succeeded them.

Alan Humphries, the Woking Coach, has returned for a third spell at Leas Road, this time as General Manager in overall charge. They too plan to sell up and move headquarters. Former Chelsea centre half John Dempsey, who won 19 Republic of Ireland caps, and had a spell as manager of Maidenhead United has been appointed Manager of League of Ireland Club Dundalk.

The Alliance Premier League has a new points system. Away wins will be worth three points, home wins two and drawn games one point.

Jeff Blockley, the former Arsenal and England defender has been appointed manager of Leicester United, the Southern League Club which has changed its name from Enderby Town. Ex-Maidenhead chief Barry Watling has taken charge of Bromley. His assistant is Dave Cook from Tooting and Mitcham.
