CLUB CHAT

IT IS with very great pleasure that we welcome back to Gander Green Lane this Bank Holiday afternoon the officials, players and supporters of our arch-rivals for the Vauxhall-Opel League championship last season, Yeovil Town.

I'm sure no-one who was in the 5,348 crowd — surely a modern-day record for a semi-pro League game — on the occasion of our last crucial meeting at the Huish in April will forget the highly-charged atmosphere of that evening for a long time to come. Whilst, ultimately, Yeovil's 2-0 success was not enough to deny us the title, it did set the scene for a thrilling — and exhausting — finish.

This season they are even more determined not to make any mistake and manager Gerry Gow has strengthened the side further with several experienced signings: defender Phil Ferns, who played more than 200 Football League games for Aldershot, Bournemouth, Wimbledon, Charlton and Blackpool; Don Gillies, who starred with Gow in Bristol City's side of the '70s; Walthamstow's speedy Danish striker Carl Zachhau; and midfielder Ricky Chandler, a £4,000 signing from Bath who also has Bristol City experience.

Yeovil will not, however, have it all their own way as I know Wycombe are equally anxious to return to the GM-Vauxhall Conference and Harrow have made similar noises. As a 'dark horse' bet it might be worth watching Bognor, who greatly impressed when they won 2-0 here in a preseason friendly and have hit four goals in both their first two League games, away games at that.

THE VAUXHALL CHARITY SHIELD

The rematch between Sutton and Yeovil today is to contest the Vauxhall Charity Shield, which under a further extension of the GM-Vauxhall Group's generous sponsorship of non-League football has replaced the Dylon Charity Shield this season.

The Charity Shield traditionally matches the previous season's League champions with the Cup (i.e. AC Delco Cup) winners, but as Sutton United won both in 1985/6, Yeovil as League runners-up were invited to compete, with Sutton having home advantage.

This is, believe it or not, the fifth consecutive season in which we have contested the Charity Shield, and the sixth season out of the last eight. In 1980 we competed as Cup runners-up, since Enfield had done the 'double'; in 1982 we competed as League runners-up, Leytonstone-Ilford having done the double; and in 1983 and 1984 we competed as Cup winners. Then last year, we contested the Shield as champions for the first time, playing the Cup winners, Wycombe, on this ground but going down 3-1. We have only lifted the Shield once out of those five previous times — in 1984 when we won 3-1 at Harrow.

As the title suggests, the proceeds of today's game go to a deserving charity, and you will be pleased to hear that last season's fixture raised almost £600 for ASBAH, the Association for Spina Bifida and Hydrocephalus. We are delighted to welcome to the ground this afternoon Mr Douglas Jack, Appeals Director of ASBAH, who will be presented with a cheque for that amount.

This year's chosen charity is the Motor and Cycle Trade Benevolent Fund and we are pleased to welcome also their director, Mr Geoffrey Atkinson.

BARNET, Saturday 30 August

Barnet's ground is at Underhill, at the foot of Barnet Hill, and easily accessible by car or tube for travelling fans.

BY CAR: Approaching by the North Circular Road from Kew Bridge, turn left at the third set of traffic lights past Brent Cross, i.e. into the A598 Regents Park Road, signposted to Finchley and Barnet. Then just keep going, right through the centre of Finchley (a bit of a crawl on Saturdays) and up Whetstone High Road, having now joined up with the A1000. When you go under a railway bridge, turn left almost immediately past it; you'll see the ground ahead. From Central London, head up the Finchley Road through Golders Green and just keep going! Allow 1½ hours plus for Saturday traffic.

BY TUBE: Dead easy – get the tube all the way from Morden to High Barnet, which is 1/4 mile away; look for the ground to your left as you near the station. Journey time 1½ hours approx. Single fare £1.50 but for £2 you can buy a One Day Travelcard and stop off anywhere else you like on the way or way back, then get the bus home from Morden free.

SIX YEARS AGO - Harrow Borough 1 Sutton United 2

Bank Holiday Monday six years ago, 25 August 1980, was one of those occasions Sutton supporters remember with most relish as we defeated Harrow Borough on their own ground, eliminating them from the Hitachi Cup at 1st Round stage. It was an especially well-earned victory for two reasons: firstly, U's had made a patchy start to the League programme, drawing 1-1 at Harlow, losing 0-3 at Staines and then winning 3-1 at Leytonstone (all the early games were played away due to pitch refurbishment). Secondly, Sutton had team problems with Paul McKinnon having departed for Malmo ten days earlier and John Rains and Larry Pritchard having been injured at Leytonstone. But Roger Wyett and Martin Clark deputised well, and Micky Joyce and Graham Dennis got the goals that nicked it. Sutton's rather unkind reward was further away ties at Dulwich and Enfield, our eventual conquerors!

GENERAL MOTORS / VAUXHALL GROUP

After four successful seasons under the Gola banner, sponsorship of the Alliance Premier League has from this season onwards been taken over by the General Motors Group and their UK subsidiary, Vauxhall Motors. As a result the League has been retitled the GM-Vauxhall Conference.

The sponsorship, which will run for two years with an option on a third, will be worth almost £1½ million including promotional support through GM-Vauxhall dealers, with whom it is intended that clubs establish a local link. In this respect Sutton United have started one jump ahead of existing clubs in the League, having enjoyed Vauxhall-Opel sponsorship last season in the former Isthmian League and already established a fruitful relationship with the local GM-Vauxhall dealers, Jack Brabham of Worcester Park.

Besides sponsoring these two leading semi-pro leagues, the GM Group are deeply involved in other aspects of football including the GM School of Excellence at Lilleshall.

Cash awards alone in the first year of GM-Vauxhall sponsorship of the Conference will be worth £100,000, of which £44,000 (£2,000 per club) will be shared out amongst member clubs early in the season. The main championship prizes are:

Champions	£5,000
Runners-up	3,000
3rd Place	2,000

In addition there is a monthly goal jackpot worth $\pounds 2,500$ in each of the eight months of the season. This will be awarded for the highest **average** number of goals per game scored during the month, although the League will have power to vary the criteria should weather conditions severely reduce the number of games played. These awards are:

Highest scorers	£1,000
2nd highest	750
3rd highest	500
4th highest	250

GMAC CHALLENGE CUP

GMAC, the financing subsidiary of the GM-Vauxhall Group, are this season sponsoring a new knockout tournament for senior clubs in the Pyramid which replaces the old Gola League's Bob Lord Trophy and the Vauxhall-Opel League's AC Delco Cup (of which Sutton are the holders). Clubs taking part are all those in the GM-Vauxhall Conference, the Vauxhall-Opel League Premier Division, the Southern League Premier Division and the Multipart League. The latter three Leagues will each stage a qualifying round to produce 14 participants apiece, who will go into the 1st Round proper alongside the 22 GM-Vauxhall clubs, giving a total of 64. The competition will be regionalised until quarter-final stage.

Total value of the sponsorship is £10,000, main prizes being:

Winners	£2,500
Runners-up	1,500
Losing semi-finalists	1,000 each
Losing quarter-finalists	500 each

GOLA MANAGER OF THE MONTH

Although withdrawing from the main sponsorship of the League, Gola are retaining their link with the competition by sponsoring the 'Manager of the Month' awards, which have previously been undertaken by Mackenzies Whisky. The awards are:

Manager of the Month: £100 plus £50 worth of Gola merchandise.

Manager of the Season: A 'Golden Boot' trophy to keep.

BASS CHARRINGTON

As in previous seasons, Bass are sponsoring a cash award and cup for the highest individual scorer in the GM-Vauxhall-Conference.

ABOUT OUR VISITORS

FORMED in 1923, Yeovil Town FC started life in the Southern League, Western Section, winning the championship in their first season. This success was repeated on three subsequent occasions, and in 1959 they became founder-members of the Southern League Premier Division. Yeovil then enjoyed a 20-year unbroken run at that level, a feat matched by only Weymouth and Telford, and during this time they won the championship twice, in 1964 and 1971, finished runners-up on seven occasions and lifted the League Cup four times.

In 1979 Yeovil were founder members of the Alliance Premier League, but after comfortably holding their own for three seasons they began to struggle, and in 1983 and 1984 their status was only preserved because no Isthmian League club wished to take their place. In 1985, despite the highest average attendance in the League, 1,297, they again finished in the bottom three and this time were relegated to the Vauxhall-Opel League to be replaced by Wycombe.

Last season, of course, our two clubs fought out a tremendous battle for the VOL title which we eventually won by four points, but only after going to the Huish in April and losing 2-0 in front of a phenomenal crowd of 5,348. Once again Yeovil's support throughout the season was magnificent, and virtually all their home league matches were watched by four-figure crowds.

As cup fighters Yeovil have a formidable reputation, being one of only four non-League clubs to have reached the fifth round proper of the FA Cup. That was in 1948-49 season when victories over Romford, Weymouth and Bury took them to a fourth round home tie with Sunderland. Yeovil won 2-1, the most famous game to date on their sloping Huish pitch, and their run was only ended by Manchester United, who won their fifth round tie 8-0 at Old Trafford. They have reached the third round proper nine times in all, most recently in 1979-80, and beaten Football League opposition on twelve occasions, more than any other non-league side. Their 37 appearances in the competition proper is also a record.



In charge of this afternoon's game is Mr MICHAEL BROWN, who was last here in November when we played Wokingham. - **GERRY GOW**, manager: Took over the reins two years ago after a lengthy Football League career as an aggressive midfielder with Bristol City, for whom he made nearly 400 appearances, Manchester City, Rotherham and Burnley. Appeared in the 1981 FA Cup Final for Manchester City, who paid Bristol City £185,000 for his services.
- **DAVE WALTER, goalkeeper:** Tall and highly promising 'keeper signed midway through last season from Western League Torrington for £2900, a Western League record.

U's can count themselves very unlucky not to have taken at least a point from the reigning League champions in this thoroughly entertaining GM-Vauxhall clash last Tuesday night, although must shoulder the blame for not making more of their chances. The game was played at a furious pace throughout with no holds barred yet no incidents of nastiness, which enhanced the enjoyment. Certainly Sutton gave as good as they got and both Paul Thornton and Mike Cornwell were unlucky not to get on the end of crosses as Enfield found their defences stretched, while at the other end one-time Sutton youth player Paul Harding should have scored, but fired wide.
