Welcome to ... BROMLEY

Bromley Football Club was founded in 1892. They kicked off playing at Glebe Road, Bromley, in the South London League and finished up champions in season 1893/94. That same season Bromley won the Kent Junior Cup and were pulled as a team on a cart through the streets of Bromley by their supporters.

In 1895 Bromley joined the newly-founded Southern Suburban League and finished bottom of the table. The following season Bromley joined the London League second division, joining such clubs as Queen's Park Rangers, Fulham and Brentford and they showed what they were made of in such company by walking away with the League Championship.

A split with the professionals in 1904 saw the club included in the Spartan League. Bromley celebrated their inclusion by winning the Spartan League Championship. Bromley joined the Isthmian League from 1908 until 1911 when they won the League Championship twice. During the summer of 1919 the club received notification that it had been admitted into membership of the Athenian League, a giant step forward. The same season they reached the semi-final of the F.A. Amateur Cup, losing out to Dulwich Hamlet at Wimbledon 2-1. The Athenian League Championship was taken during season 1923/24, but apart from winning the Kent Amateur Cup the following seasons were lean.

In 1983, a new ground was opened at Hayes Lane by Sir Stanley Rous, and the Amateur Cup was won again, but the war years interrupted the club's progress.

After the war, the club started its golden period. 1945/46 saw the club win the London Senior Cup and three Bromley players were capped by England, namely Eric Fright, Cyril Martin and Tommy Hopper. In 1949, Bromley won the first F.A. Amateur Cup Final at Wembley in front of 96,000, when Romford were beaten 1-0, with a goal from Tommy Hopper. 1952 saw the club elected into the Isthmian League and the runners-up spot was achieved in the first season. Then, the club went one better the following season by winning the Championship. The title was won again in 1960/61, but then a barren period in terms of success followed.

In more recent times, Bromley were relegated to the First Division, before rejoining the Premier Division in 1979/80 and then finishing runners-up to Leytonstone/Ilford. Relegation followed, however, and the club spent two seasons in Division One.

The instigation of management duo Trevor Ford and Colin Powell brought about an instant improvement in the club's fortunes. Promotion was achieved at the first attempt in thrilling style in 1985/86. The club somehow won five games in the last eight days of the season, the crucial winning goal in the last game coming six minutes from time, to clinch the runners-up spot. The last qualifying round of the F.A. Cup was also reached.

1986/87 started badly, but the club improved to a respectable mid-table position. 1987/88, however, proved to be the best season for well over twenty years. Never considered as title contenders at the start of the season, the club finished runners-up to Yeovil Town. 3,500 turned up at Huish at the end of April for what turned out to be the title decider, as Bromely went down 3-0. The semi-finals of the Kent and London Senior Cups were also reached, whilst, in the F.A. Cup, Bromley went out to Sutton United before the Surrey club went on to great things in the competition.

LEE ACKERS (defender): Lee represented Surrey Youth and Kent Schools before playing for Dulwich Hamlet, Carshalton Athletic and Croydon. Joined Bromley last season.

GRAHAM BRENTON (midfielder): Last season's 'Player-of-the-Year', Graham always gives 100%. He was once a professional with Northampton Town and spent the summer of 1988 playing professionally in Finland.

TONY BURMAN (striker): Tony came to Bromley in the summer of 1988 from Leytonstone/Ilford, where he spent one season. Made thirty appearances for Charlton Athletic in the Second Division before moving to Dartford, where he was top scorer for seven years. On his day Tony is a devastating striker.

MATT CARMICHAEL: Has played in many positions for the club, but is usually a striker. Joined Bromley from Wycombe Wanderers halfway through last season and made an instant impact, scoring three times in his first two games. Has represented both the Army and Combined Services teams and also played for Salisbury. Was once on Brentford's books.

BRIAN CLAY (defender): Joined Bromley in the summer of 1988 and has also played for Ashford Town and Tunbridge Wells.

TIM COLLINS (midfielder): Tim started at Bromley before moving to Fisher Athletic, but returned to Hayes Lane last season.

PAUL EDWARDS (defender): Club captain, Paul is in his second spell at Bromley, having rejoined the club in 1984 after eight years with Dulwich Hamlet. Bromley's 'Player-of-the-Year' in 1986/87.

BRIAN FRAMPTON (defender): Brian is Bromley's longest-serving player, but his career has been dogged by injury, particularly in recent seasons. Joined Bromley in 1979, having played for Coburg F.C. in Australia.

CURTIS HAYES (goalkeeper): Curtis joined Bromley in early 1988 from Greene King Spartan League side Metrogas and made fourteen appearances last season, including eight clean sheets.

GARY HEWITT (midfielder): Gary's previous clubs are Dulwich Hamlet, where he gained a London Senior Cup winners medal, and Gravesend & Northfleet. A fine crosser of the ball, Gary is in his third season at Hayes Lane.

GODFREY JACOBS (striker): Godfrey joined Bromley in the summer of 1986 after three seasons at Fisher Athletic. Godfrey's greatest asset is his electrifying pace, and he was leading goalscorer in 1986/87 with 18 goals.

PAUL LOUGHLIN (striker): Has risen through the ranks from youth team through reserves and into the first team at Hayes Lane, Bromley being his only club. The zenith of Paul's career so far was his hat-trick against Worthing in 1987. Always bustling with energy, he often pops up with important goals.

NEIL LUFF (midfielder): Another ex-Gillingham player, Neil has also played for Welling United and Enfield.

PAUL MCMENEMY (striker): Signed last season from West Ham United, he is the nephew of former Southampton and Sunderland manager Lawrie.

NEIL MISSEN (midfielder/striker): Neil started his career with Arsenal and Millwall before moving to Bromley in 1984. Has also played for Greenwich Borough in the Kent Legue.

RONNIE MURROCK (striker): One of the success stories of Bromley's tremendous 1987/88 season, Ronnie was top scorer with 25 goals, including a hat-trick in the 4-1 drubbing of his old club, Fisher Athletic, in the G.M.A.C. Cup. Rejoined Bromley in 1986 after three years at Salter Road and spent the summer of 1988 as a professional in New Zealand.

JOHN ROLES (defender): Once a professional with Portsmouth, John joined Bromley in the summer of 1984 from Sutton United, and has been a regular fixture at left-back ever since.

ALAN SCOTTING: Alan is a committed player, who has attracted the interest of several professional clubs. Was on professional terms at Gillingham, and has also had spells at Charlton and Arsenal. A firm favourite with Bromley supporters.

PETER SHAW (defender): Player/coach, Peter made over 250 Football League appearances at Charlton Athletic, Gillingham and Exeter City. Started his playing career in non-League football with Staines Town and joined Bromley in 1987.

NEIL WICKENS (defender): Neil was an apprentice at Gillingham and also had spells at Millwall and Brighton. Represented England at youth level and was signed during the summer of 1988 from Sheppey United, where he was voted 'Player-of-the-Year'.

IAN YOUNG (midfielder): Ian joined Bromley in 1985, having previously been on professional terms at Gillingham.

G.M. Conference News

The G.M. Vauxhall Conference set a new opening day attendance record with a total of 16,709 spectators watching the matches. The aggregate representa a 47% increase on the corresponding day last season. No fewer than 10 of the 11 Vauxhall Conference matches commanded gates in excess of 1,000. Yeovil Town attracted the largest crowd of the day with 3,106 watching the club's return to Conference football.

Millwall have joined the hunt for Barnet's 23-year-old midfielder Robert Codner by matching the £100,000 bid made by F.A. Cup holders Wimbledon last week. Codner, who guested for the First Division club in their 2-2 draw with Brighton last Tuesday, is currently negotiating personal terms with manager John Docherty.

Enfield have completed substantial ground work costing £50,000 at their Southbury Road Stadium. The work, which includes the construction of terracing along the entire north side of the ground, attracted an £18,000 grant from the pools funded organisation The Football Trust.

Stafford Rangers central defender John Cockerill last week joined Grimsby Town for a fee of £21,275. The 27-year-old player, brother of Southampton midfielder Glen Cockerill, joined Stafford last season and made a total of 45 Conference appearances for the club. Cockerill, who lives only 400 yards from Blundell Park, will maintain his family's connection with the Fourth Division club. His father was a former Grimsby Town player.

Northwich Victoria have signed Hyde United's prolific goalscorer Malcolm O'Connor for a club record fee of £10,000. The 26-year-old striker, Hyde's leading marksman last season with 34 goals, scored after only 11 minutes of his Vauxhall Conference debut at Kettering.

Barnet midfielder Edwin Stein has resumed training at Underhill following the last night of his fringe theatre production of "Archangels Don't Play Pinball" by Dario Fo. The 33-year-old player, who performed as a transvestite, old lady and policeman in the production, had trained with Leyton Orient during the play's run at London thetres in Pimlico, Maida Vale and Islington. Stein, who three years ago attended the Mountview Theatre School, commented: "I've been acting since I left school but have taken it far more seriosly lately." He added: "Since returning to the club, I've become well versed in Shakespeare with the players performing their own version of classics such as Romeo and Juliet!"

Kettering Town have signed much travelled striker Ernie Moss from former Conference champions Scarborough. The 39-year-old player renews his acquaintance with Poppies manager Peter Morris, whom he previously played under in Mansfield Town's promotion winning side of 1976/77. The move to Rockingham Road represents the eleventh in his career. Moss, with 234 goals in 749 Football League appearances, has played for no fewer than ten clubs with spells at Chesterfield, Peterborough, Mansfield, Chesterfield, Port Vale, Lincoln City, Doncaster Rovers, Chesterfield, Stockport, Scarborough and Rochdale.

Chorley recorded their highest league gate for 15 years when a crowd of 1,834 saw them lose 3-2 to Conference favourites Barnet on the opening day of the season. The attendance, almost four times higher than last season's average gate, saw the Magpies score their first ever Conference goals courtesy of new signings Shaun Allen and Brian Ross.
