ntroducim 00

The name of Redbridge Forest is a comparatively new one to semi-professional circles have been set-up only at the start of the 1989/90 season as a successor to the Leytonstone Ilford and Walthamstow Avenue clubs.

However the pedigree and lineage was inherited into the Redbridge Forest title and it took but two years for the club to lift its first Championship trophy – The Vauxhall (Isthmian) Football League at the end of the 1990/91 season.

With that title came the achievement of the immediate ambitions of the club to enter the GM Vauxhall Conference. Much had to be done to achieve that position, not just on the field of play, although of course that was of paramount importance.

Having previously been rejected by the Conference on the grounds that their former home at Walthamstow was not up to standard, the club realised the asset and moved in with Dagenham Football Club on a long term sharing arrangement.

The Victoria Road ground has been renovated at Forest's expense to make sure that the ever more difficult standards set by the Conference could be attained, which obviously will benefit both sets of clubs supporters, although inevitably some of the changes, especially segregation if it happens will disappoint some followers of both clubs.

In John Still, the club feels once again that it has the Manager whom most clubs would like to call their own, and indeed with his track record over the past decade with Leytonstone Ilford (where the club was Rothmans Non-League Team of the Year in 1982), Dartford whom he steered into the then Gola League and Maidstone United who under his guidance progressed into the Fourth Division of the Football League itself, hus been second to none.

On returning to Redbridge Forest for the start of the 1989/90 season he immediately steered the club to success in today's Isthmian Charity Shield competition, and although the ensuing season was one of disappointment, he certainly made up for that season last year when not only did the club win the League Championship, but they also reached the semi-final stage of three cup competitions, albeit without actually appearing in a final !

The club can still look over it's shoulder at a glorious past, which far from being a weight upon it's back, is but a spur to further glory. As a successor to the historic amateur titles of llford, Leytonstone and Walthamstow Avenue as well as a glorious decade of Leytonstone llford, the club whether it be in the FA Amateur Cup, League or County Cup honours or indeed the F.A. Challenge Cup itself, the three clubs all as independent bodies had glowing records.

Most of the glorious past was achieved as members of the Isthmian Football League. In the cases of Ilford and Leytonstone that is three quarters of this century and fifty years in the case of Walthamstow Avenue.

Nearly forty years ago the performance of Walthamstow Avenue in holding Manchester United to a draw in an FA Cup tie at Old Trafford is still remembered with affection by older supporters - and rightly so.

Ilford, the oldest of the three names were founder members of the Southern League (1894) and played a big part through former Treasurer George Clarke in the foundation of the Isthmian League (1905). Leytonstone joined the league just two years after its inception (1907) and Walthamstow joined the league in 1939, but played only two games in the competition before the outbreak of War, thus having to wait seven years to complete a full championship, which incidentally they won !

Each club had it's golden period, in Ilford's case it was the twenties when the Isthmian League was won twice and so was the Amateur Cup. Leytonstone dominated the early post war years and also won the Amateur Cup twice, and were denied a place in a third consecutive final only at the last hurdle – the semi-final stage. Walthamstow after taking the Amateur Cup in 1952 had several golden years which included the F.A. Cup game with Manchester United, whilst Leytonstone Ilford have won the championship of the League twice during the eighties, and with fortunes fluctuating wildly, have also won Division One twice as well !



<u>KEVIN FOSTER</u> (Goalkeeper) Joined the club in September 1990 from Wealdstone after training for part of the summer with the club. Was the regular choice at Wealdstone. Lives in Chelmsford, and has also represented that club.

PAUL WATTS (Defender) Signed for Leytonstone Ilford in 1986 from Barking for a then club record fee of £3,500. Since that time, Paul has made over 300 appearances for Redbridge Forest and has won several full England 'caps' at the semi-professional level in the left back position.

<u>KEITH BARRETT</u> (Central Defender) Joined Redbridge Forest in the summer of 1989 from Wycombe Wanderers. Originally one of the Barking side of the late 1970's which won the Isthmian League, Keith also played for many seasons with Enfield and won many England semi-pro 'caps'.

KURT DAVIDSON (Forward) In his second spell at the club after having first joined during the 1983/4 season. Played either side of his first spell with the club for Billericay Town where he was a great favourite. Really hit the headlines though with Dartford. Re-joined in the summer of 1989. Leading scorer in the 1990/1 championship winning season.

TONY PAMPHLETT (Central Defender) Much of Tony's career has been spent with two clubs, Dartford and Maidstone. He signed for Redbridge Forest at the start of the 1990/t season and once again the Manager-Captain partnership again flourished as it had done at the previous clubs.

ANDY HESSENTHALER (Midfield/Forward) Came to prominence playing for Corinthian in the Southern League and was signed by Peter Taylor whilst he was boss at Dartford. Andy gained a semi-professional international cap for England in the 88/9 season against Italy. Joined Redbridge in the 1990 close season. Is an artexer by trade.

<u>STEVE CONNER</u> (Defender) Played for East Thurrock and Tilbury before also being spotted by Peter Taylor at Dartford. Like Hessenthaler, Steve gained his first semi-pro international cap in the same England match, he has been a regular member of the side ever since. He joined Redbridge in the 1990 close season. Assistant bank manager by profession.

<u>ROBBIE GARVEY</u> (Midfield) Robbie also joined the club from Dartford where he spent the 1989/90 season, previously with Grays Athletic. Robbie who is a tanker driver scored many vital goals in the Championship winning side of the 1990/1.

<u>TOMMY WILLIAMS</u> (Forward) Exciting prospect who led John Still into paying a four figure fee to secure his services from near neighbours Leyton-Wingate towards the end of the 1990/1 season. Previously with Southgate Athletic.

JASON BROOM (Midfield) signed for a four figure transfer fee from Essex Division Two North neighbours Billericay Town just before the transfer deadline in March 1991. His tenacioùs play made him an instant success at the club and he will develop well in the rigours of the GM Vauxhall Conference.

<u>COLIN SOWERBY</u> (Forward) A new signing to Redbridge Forest this summer, a considerable transfer fee was paid to Dartford for this exciting forward's services. Scored on the first day of the season at Telford United. Has also played for Tilbury.

PAT JACKMAN (Defender) In his second spell at the club, Pat originally joined from Kingsbury Town in 1986, but after a season moved on. He played last season for Bishop's Stortford where he attracted interest from several league clubs. He re-signed during the summer when the club paid £6,000 for his services from their Hertfordshire neighbours.

<u>BOBBY MAYES</u> (Midfield) Was a member of the successful Wivenhoe Town side of the last couple of seasons who was persuaded that his future lay in South rather than North Essex by manager John Still, and who was attracted by the thought of playing in the GM Vauxhall Conference. A silky player who looks to be at home equally in midfield or up front. <u>MERVYN CAWSTON</u> (Goalkeeper) Joined the Club at the end of 1989 and since he got into the team has settled in well. Made a career for himself in the Football League during the late 70's and early 80' and played almost 200 games for Southend United. Also played for Norwich City, Newport Cty., Gillingham and Stoke City.

<u>NOEL ASHFORD</u> (Midfield) England semi-professional international was sub in the recent game v. Italy at Kettering, Noel joined the club in 1989 from Maidstone as part of the deal that took Warren Barton to Watling Street. Another of the highly successful Barking side of the 79/80 season Noel also followed Manager McCluskey to Enfield and won a string of honours with that club before also playing for Barnet and Wycombe.

DAVE JACQUES (Defender/Midfield) Generally speaking a 'one Manager' player for John Still over the past decade or so, first played for Leytonstone before the club amalgamated with Ilford. Was part of the Leytonstone Ilford side that won the Isthmian League in 1982 and then joined Dartford where he played in the Southern League winning side. Was at Maidstone in 1988/9 and gained a Conference winning medal. Is the only player to have won a winners medal in each competition.

PETER DALEY (Defence) Started his career at Anfield as a teenager, but moved firstly to Tranmere Rovers and then on to Southend United. For much of last season he played in the Beazer Homes League with Chelmsford City. Will undoubtably challenge for one of the defensive positions.

<u>TERRY SULLIVAN</u> (Midfield) Most useful player to have in any club, as he can be relied upon to give an all action display; wherever he is used. Now the senior member of the side, but watch the years fall away as Terry gives yet another 100%.

#### THE ADT HEALTHQUEST/TESCO ROADSHOW

Under the banner "being active is fun" the ADT healthquest/Tesco Roadshow is currently touring the country until the end of October 1991.

It is set during that time to visit 16 sites nationwide, where it will remain for between three and five days. The sites that have been chosen this year are: Lytham St. Annes where it participated in the Guardian Royal Exchange Charity Weekend and at the sites of Tesco stores at Glasgow, Edinburgh, Kingston-Upon-Hull, Cambridge, Bishop's Stortford, Cheshunt, New Malden, Eastbourne, Plymouth, Truro, Bristol, Swansea, Aylesbury, Birmingham/NEC and Stratford-Upon-Avon.

#### THE CHARITY SHIELD MATCH

August 17th. marked the start of the 87th. season of competition under the banner of the Isthmian League which this season is sponsored by Diadora, the Italian Sportswear Manufacturers. Strange then to recount that this is only the fourteenth Charity Shield match played. The competition was not formally instigated until the 1978/79 season when as can be seen from the listing below the Enfield club became the first winners, defeating Dagenham 2-1.

Traditionally the game is between the League Champions and the League Cup winners although there have been occasions when because a club completed "the double" it has been necessary for the League runners-up to be involved.

As a forerunner to the competition an Annual match had been played for almost twenty years, dating back to 1960 between the Champions and a selected representative side, perhaps a little unfairly labelled "The Rest". That match had its origins back in the mists of time when London Caledonians took on "The Rest" even prior to the First World War back in 1912. However, the idea of such a match could not have appealed greatly to the early officials of the League, for they dropped it after only one playing and the gap of nearly fifty years happened before it was again played.

To get back to the Charity Shield, this is the first time that it has been staged here at Woking, and indeed it is the first time that the club has appeared in the match, they do so of course due to their being the current League Cup holders.

From Redbridge Forest's point of view this is the third time they have appeared, prior to today they appeared in 1982/3 season when as "double" holders of the previous season they met and defeated runners-up Sutton United at the old Granleigh Road, Leytonstone ground. Then in 1989/90 they played at Bishop's Stortford, as Champions where again they won the Trophy on offer today.

Previous results however, have a habit of counting for nothing in such matches, although it is fair to say that in past matches the League Champions have generally been in the ascendancy. Will today prove to be the exception to the rule ?

With a history going back over 80 years it is not surprising that the League has, and indeed still does involve itself in playing representative matches against other leagues, associations and touring sides. Perhaps the most romantic stories surround the Nigerians who toured this country in 1949 playing a number of matches against League and various club sides in bare feet. One shudders at the thought of one of those unprotected feet being trodden on by one of the football boots with their heavy leather toecaps and nail in studs, which were almost lethal once they had worn down some. The Isthmian League side which played those Nigerian tourists were successful by a 5-1 scoreline.

PAST GLORIES

The tourists must have been impressed with what they encountered, and obviously told their neighbouring states in Africa for it was not long before first the Gold Coast and then the Ugandans paid these shores a visit. Both played the Isthmian League representative side, with the Gold Coast receiving a 10-1 drubbing. The Ugandans however, must have been reasonably satisfied with their 2-2 draw.

In 1958 the South Africans came over for a two month tour of Britain and Ireland playing seventeen matches. They were a much stronger side and listed Wales, England and Northern Ireland amongst their opponents. They also played a combined Isthmian and Athenian League side and it is interesting to note a couple of Woking and a couple of Leytonstone names in the line up. The combined League side were defeated 5-2 on the ground of Bromley and the team page from that programme is illustrated alongside.

On a regular basis from the Second World War until the early seventies the Isthmian and Athenian Leagues played each other, and there was great rivalry between them. Illustrated also is the programme from the 1966 encounter where many clubs now thought of as regular members of this league, were still members of the Athenians. Clubs like Hayes, Leyton, Hornchurch and Eastbourne Utd. all provided members of the Athenian line-up. The Isthmian team provided such legendry names as Ted Powell, Rod Haider, Charlie Townsend and Larry Pritchard.

The League still plays representative matches and last season played both an F.A. XI and the Combined Services. Similar matches are planned for this season, the F.A. XI game is at "home", at Aylesbury on 11th. December whilst we play away at the Military Stadium at Aldershot on 4th. February.



Introducing 00 00

Woking f.C. were formed in 1889 and played at Wheatsheaf Common and four other grounds before moving on to their present Kingfield Sports Ground in 1923. They started their competitive career in the West Surrey League and having won the Championship four times in 1895/6, 1897/8, 1904/5 and 1907/8, they were elected to the Isthmian League in 1911 and have been members continually ever since. Their highest placing was in 1956/7 when they finished as runners-up to Wycombe Wanderers despite scoring over 100 goals.

In 1980/81 they finished bottom of the Premier Division but survived relegation due to Enfield and Dagenham's leaving to join the Alliance Premier League, no teams being demoted that year.

They have been more successful in cup competitions however and in 1958 they won the last FA Amateur Cup Final to be televised live when they defeated liford 3-0 before a 70,000 crowd at Wembley. At this time "cardinals" forward line featured England Amateur Internationals, Charlie Mortimore, Geoff Hamm, Reg Stratton and Roy Littleton. Twenty years later Woking attracted national attention when reaching the Second Round of the FA Cup and holding Third Division promotion outfit Swansea City to a 2-2 draw at the Vetch Field. Sadly they lost the replay 5-3 after extra time before a capacity 6,500 crowd. The following season they reached the semi-finals of the F.A. Trophy, losing to the eventual winners, Dagenham. On the local front they have won the Surrey Senior Cup on five occasions and been runners-up thirteen times.

The early 1980's were traumatic times for the club as they were relegated from the Isthmian premier Division in 1983 to Division Two (South) in 1985. Their fortunes however, improved and after narrowly missing out on an immediate return to Division One, they made no mistake in 1986/7 when they scored 110 goals in their 38 League games. They were third in Division One in 1988 and in 1989 a home draw in their last game against Lewes, cost them promotion. Home form cost them dear as of their total 82 points 49 were collected away from Kingfield.

Woking began last season as favourites for a promotion spot and after two near misses they did not let down their ever growing band of supporters a third time. They were runners-up in the Vauxhall League First Division and so promoted with Wivenhoe Town.

Last season was dominated by the club's magnificent achievements in the F.A. Challenge Cup where they defeated West Bromwich Albion on the Midlanders home Hawthorns pitch. Their reward for the win was be drawn at home to Everton, but as everyone knows, the game was switched to Goodison Park and in that magnificent stadium, the club lost by only a single Kevin Sheedy goal.

Trophies did however come their way and after defeating Kingstonian in the Surrey Senior Cup, they won the League Cup against Carshalton to qualify for this afternoon's match.

In the League itself they finally finished fourth in their first season back in the Premier Division after almost a decades absence. Now they have their sights firmly set on the Championship this season and have been installed as joint favourites this week alongside Kingstonian and Sutton United at 4/1.



TIM READ (Goalkeeper) Cost a club record £7,000 fee when signed from Worthing at the start of last season, having caught the eye with a spectacular performance against Woking previously.

LAWRENCE BATTY (Goalkeeper) Summer acquisition from Brentford. Previously with Fulham. A 27 year old whose first team chances were limited in league football.

STEWART MITCHELL (Full-Back) Joined Woking from Windsor in the summer of 1989. Consistent player who has also played for Hendon, Slough and Maidenhead Utd..

DENIS PARKER (Full-Back) Signed in the summer from Bishop's Stortford. Quick defender who also played for both Rainham Town and Redbridge Forest, is the brother of England's Paul Parker.

ADIE COWLER (Defender) Now in his second spell at Woking having re-joined from Addlestone in season 1985/6. Versatile player who normally plays as a sweeper. Is the present Club Captain.

ANDY RUSSELL (Central Defender) Dominant player who signed for the "Cards" two years ago from Wycombe Wanderers. Aged 26, he has also played for Bracknell Town.

BRADLEY PRATT (Defender) Joined towards the end of the 1989/90 season after playing in New Zealand. A towering defender who has also played for Farnborough Town, Camberley, Brackhell and Egham Town.

TREVOR BARON (Defender) Signed from Windsor & Eton in 1986. Strong centre-back who scores his fair share of goals, he has also played for Slough, Marlow, Chertsey and Burnham.

LLOYD WYE (Defender) 24 year old left-sided defender. Now in his seventh season at Woking having progressed from the Youth side. Has captained Woking on a number of occasions.

MARK BIGGINS (Midfield) Talented player who cost Woking £2,000 when he signed from Windsor & Eton. Stylish player who has also played for Hanwell, Feltham, Maidenhead and St. Albans City.

PAUL BARROWCLIFF (Midfield) Signed towards the end of last season from St. Albans City. Skillful player who has also played for both Harrow Borough ... and Hayes.

DERECK BROWN (Midfield) Signed at the start of the 1990/1 season from Hendon. Aged 28, his other previous club was with Wembley.

ANDY PARR (Forward) In his second spell at Woking, having re-joined from Chertsey Town. Capped as an England schoolboy, was with West Ham as a junior. Tireless worker.

PAUL MULVANEY (Forward) A 28 year old who joined from Bracknell Town two years ago. Has also played for Cheltenham Town in the GM Vau×hall Conference.

RICKY WALKES (Forward) Summer signing from neighbours Hampton. Tall commanding player who has also played in the Greek First Division.

GEORGE FRIEL (Midfield) Just signed on a two year contract after this release from Reading. Progressed through the Reading ranks to score nine goals in twenty first team appearances last season. Aged 20.
