THE DIADORA FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Diadora Football League as we know it today was originally born over 80 years ago when three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of llford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon. Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss he subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaird as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

The six clubs that formed the League on that inaugural season were London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 87 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions.

Personalities in those early days were all important, and none more so than Henry Huband who was Hon. Secretary and Treasurer for the first thirty years until 1935 and then President until his death in 1952. In fact, in many Isthmian boardroom's from the older clubs in the competition, his portrait which was presented to clubs after his death still looks out over the modern day running of clubs. During those years, the Isthmian League as far as the South of England was concerned also had a vice-like grip on the Amateur Cup with too many to name winners and finalists drawn from its ranks.

The League can now boast of three clubs who have gone on to embrace Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Premier League club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and were members until 1964. Maidstone United who sadly went out of business at the start of last season, were also members of the Isthmian League between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers are now in the Football League only six years after leaving our ranks.

The Isthmian League under the then Chairmanship of Barry East first embraced professionalism and sponsorship in the early 70's when Rothmans, Berger Paints and Servowarm all took turns at being the league's main sponsor. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the league from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed two three year sponsorship agreements which were attractive and rewarding for all parties concerned.

The league is now entering its second two year agreement with the Diadora organisation which has seen the Italian Sportswear Company gain a share of the UK market and become a high profile advertiser on sports grounds around the country. We all hope that the extension to the agreement will be as successful and fulfilling as the previous two seasons.

It is during the past decade that the league has emerged from the "amateur" tag that it previously had, and now plays a full part each year in the pyramid of football where it provides clubs with both a platform to rise from, and in the case of the clubs at a lower level, a target of membership to aim at. In recent years, member club Southall reached the Final of the F.A. Challenge Vase, whilst Yeading went one step better and won the competition in 1990.

Chesham United performed really well in their first season in their first season in the Premier Division of the Diadora League (1991/2) finishing in fourth place on the same number of points as Sutton United. They also won the Berks. & Bucks Senior Cup 5-1 against Windsor & Eton. Gerald Aplin was appointed manager after working as advisor to several previous managers. In his first full month in charge in April 1992, he was to be awarded the Manager of the Month honour for his teams performances - a bright start indeed to his managerial career.

Last season however, was Chesham's most successful. They became League Champions for the first time and gained 98 points and 30 wins in the process, the best record for any of the top 200 clubs in England. In fact, in Britain only Glasgow Rangers had a better record. During the season the Manager was named as Manager of the Month on three occasions. He ultimately was also named as Manager of the Season. They also retained the Berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup.

The club declined the opportunity to move to the GM Vauxhall Conference as the cost of the work required was much greater than expected.

The earlier history of the club stretches back to 1878 when it was first known as Chesham F.C. and later Chesham Town. The town had another club, Chesham Generals, and the two clubs merged in 1917 to form Chesham United. The current club's nickname is "The Generals" reflecting those earlier days.

Chesham Town were founder members of the Southern League in 1894 and a founder member of the Athenian League in 1912. Chesham Generals competed in the Spartan League from 1909 to 1914 and won the championship in 1913/14. Chesham United played in the same league after the First War, winning its First Division in 1922,23 and 25 and the Premier Division in 1933. United were elected to the Corinthian League in 1947 and moved to the Athenians in 1963. Later the club was promoted to the Isthmian League where it won promotion to the First Division. In 1968 United reached the final of the F.A. Amateur Cup at Wembley, losing 0-1 after missing a penalty in front of 55,000 spectators.

They reached the first round proper of the FA Cup in 1976, losing 0-2 to Brentford. In 1980, they progressed to the Third Round where 5,500 people saw them lose 0-3 to Cambridge United here at Meadow Park.

The club suffered a serious set-back in 1983 when their grandstand burned down. The club was forced to play at other grounds during the rebuilding. In 1987, amid press revelations of the club folding and serious debt of over £100,00, the club was relegated to the Second Division.

Appeals were made in the Bucks Examiner and the sports editor Lyndon Berry met local businessmen with a view to rescuing the club. Within one season, the new board had reorganised the club and Chesham won the Second Division (North) Championship. In 1991 Chesham won the First Division title. The Premier Division exploits have already been detailed.

The facilities at Meadow Park are constantly being upgraded and planning applications have just been approved for further substantial ground improvements.

ANDY ADEBOWALE Midfielder. 26 year old. who joined Chesham from Bishop's Stortford in 1991. Started playing only as a 20 year old and is eager to play at the highest possible level.

GARRY ATTRELL Skilful elusive winger who joined Chesham from Marlow, but who also played at Slough, Maidenhead, Windsor & Eton, Farnborough and Burnham. An engineer by trade, who is married with two children.

MICHAEL BANTON Centre-forward who signed from Barnet in 1990. An accountant, he was born in Cape Town, S. Africa and is 26 years old. Previously with Windsor & Eton and Hellenic in SA. The holder of a South African amateur Cap.

MICKEY BARNES 6'5" uncompromising central defender who signed from Barnet in 1990. Played in the League for both Reading and Northampton making over 40 appearances in all before a knee injury made him switch to the less rigorous non-league game.

NASSEM BASHIR Energetic and skilful midfield player who joined the club during the summer of 1992. He played for Reading before joining Slough Town. At 23 years of age he is still capable of moving into League football.

STEVE BATEMAN Central Defender now 28. Joined Chesham from Harrow in 1989 and is a former Everton Youth team skipper. His honours include Vauxhall and Diadora Leagues, FA XI, Herts. County XI Middlesex County XI.

GARRY COBB Midfield or Full Back, 25 year old Gary is capable of both which first caught the attention of Luton Town. He then moved on to Fulham after playing on loan at Northampton and Swansea. Joined United last season.

DARREN COLEMAN 22 year old who joined the club in the summer of 1992. Has Middlesex Under 18 honours. Joined as a central defender, but his stamina and vision have turned him into a midfield player.

LEE COSTA Outstanding talent who captained Wales schoolboys and youth teams. Was at Old Trafford for three seasons as a pro, but an undetected, but now fully corrected pelvic injury did not allow him to fulfil his enormous potential. Has attracted the attention of many major League clubs.

MARK DAWBER Joined Chesham from Staines Town in December 1989. His previous clubs include Woking, Staines and Wycombe Wanderers. A flying winger who is equally comfortable up-front or in mid-field.

TONY HOPKINS Left Back, aged 22. Played for Newport County before moving to Aldershot. On their closure he joined Hendon in March 1992 and transferred to Chesham almost a year later. Still has the ability to play full-time.

ANDY LOMAS Born in Hartlepool, the clubs 28 year old 'keeper joined from Barnet in 1990. Is amongst the top three British non-League keepers. and last year set a record by saving eight consecutive penalties in competitive matches. Has FA and League honours and his wife is the UK number one ladies table tennis player.

IAN MITCHELL 21 year old centre forward who was a Welsh Schoolboy star who delayed his entry into professional soccer to complete his University education. The club believe that with his blistering pace and superb first touch, his rise will be meteoric

BARRY RAKE Joined Chesham from Slough in January 1992 and this 24 year old forward made an immediate impression. Previously with Millwall, he has rep. honours with the Vauxhall League and has attracted lots of Football league attention in recent months.

CHRIS TOWNSEND Striker who joined the club from Gloucester City in march 1992. He also has had spells with Southampton and Bath City. A prolific scorer, he netted 41 times for Chesham last season. Has played for the Welsh semi-pro team.

DAVE WEBLEY 28 year old striker who played for Merthyr in the Conference where he was a prolific scorer. A Nigel Clough like touch sets up as many goals as he scores and he also made many appearances for the Welsh semipro side.

ANDY YORK The "Welsh" connection also extends to Andy York who hails from South Wales. He has previously played for Ebbw vale and Exeter City. A Steelworker who could make the top grade with his error free neat footballing style. Superb at right or centre back.

TODAY'S VISITORS MARLOW

Founded in 1870, Marlow are one of the oldest Football Clubs in the country. In the last century, known then as Great Marlow, they were a major force in the game, and were one of the original 15 entrants to the first FA Cup in 1871, contributing a share of the £25 that bought the first trophy. Recent research for a new definitive history of the FA Cup has shown that Mariow are the only Club to have entered every single year of the FA Cup competition. For many years it was thought that one other Club shared this distinction. In 1882, Marlow reached the semi-final, losing to the eventual winners, Old Etonians, 5-0 at The Oval. Two Amateur Cup semi-finals and a succession of Berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup wins were among many honours during this golden period.

In 1894, Marlow resigned from the initial membership of the Southern League, wishing to retain their amateur status, and Tottenham Hotspur gained entry in their place.

The club's ground up to 1919 was Crown Meadow, now the Riley Recreation Ground. An enforced move to the Star Meadow, now built over as the Spring Gardens Estate, meant demotion from the Great Western Suburban League to the Reading League, as the Star Ground was unfenced and had no facilities.

Hon. Secretary Alfred Davis appealed for funds and subscriptions to buy a new headquarters and contributed much himself. Sadty he died before the official opening of the new ground in 1924, but it was dedicated to his memory, and still bears his name: the Alfred Davis Ground. The picturesque grandstand was built in 1930, and celebrated the Club's revival in fortunes and the Spartan League 2nd. Division Championship in 1929.

Apart from a break during World War Two, Marlow remained in the Spartan League right up to 1965, when they joined the Athenian League Division Two, gaining promotion to Division One in 1970/71. Marlow joined the Isthmian League in 1984, finishing bottom of Division Two in their second season, but then, under the management of Mike keen, began a rapid rise in status.

Promotion to Division One in 86/7 and promotion again in the next year to the Premier Division, and the Championship after a neck and neck battle with Grays Athletic. A dramatic Houdini act at the end of season 88/9 amazingly kept Premier Division status after relegation had looked certain.

Mike Keen left to concentrate on his sports business and his assistant, Dave Russell, then still playing, took over, bringing in exprofessional Laurie Craker as coach.

The Club has flourished under their management and gained much respect. In 88/9 they were semi-finalists in the Clubcall Cup; 90/91 they achieved 7th. place in the league and a superb Berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup win the first for 91 years - beating Wycombe Wanderers; a year later they rose to a final 6th. position in the league despite bad injuries.

They also made their first appearance this century in the First Round proper of the FA Cup, meeting West Bromwich Albion at The Hawthorns in front of 11,000 people.

Last season there were even better things. Coming through some hair raising earlier rounds, to meet Tottenham Hotspur in the third round at White Hart Lane with a crowd of almost 27,000. a brave showing, some incredible goal mouth misses and a 5-1 eventual defeat, not a true reflection of the game, brought the club much credit. It was however, a poor season in the league, with a very disappointing home record, finishing 15th. but a fine winning of the Diadora League Cup Final against Molesey on the ground of Aldershot Town ended a memorable season and ensured Marlow a place in tonight's Charity Shield match.

The club sponsors for a second season are local Ford Main Dealers, Platts of Marlow.

The Marlow Players

TREVOR BARON Re-signed during the close season having first played for the club in 1979. Moved on to Burnham, Windsor & Eton, Slough and Woking where he was for seven seasons. He made his debut in 1979.

GARFIELD BLACKMAN Joined mid-way through last season, having previously played for Northwood. Debut 1992.

TIM BUZAGLO Signed towards the end of last season from Woking where he was a prolific goalscorer during his six seasons, netting over 150 times. He made his debut for Marlow earlier this year.

PAUL BYRNE Broke into the first team squad last season after progressing through the Reserves. Previously with Flackwell Heath. Debut 1992

JOHN CAESAR Last season's "Player of the Year" having netted 20 times during his most successful term. He was signed from neighbours, Flackwell Heath and made his debut in 1992.

ANTHONY DELL A member of the Division One championship side who moved to Slough for 2½ years before returning after a short spell here at Chesham. He made his debut in 1985.

COLIN FERGUSON Signed last season from neighbours, Burnham with whom he spent seven seasons after some time with Reading Youth and Maidenhead. His debut was in 1992.

KENNY GLASGOW Re-signed from neighbours Flackwell Heath during the 91/2 season. He originally made his debut for Marlow in 1986.

STEVE HOLMES A former apprentice with Blackburn Rovers who went on to play for Enfield in the GM vauxhall Conference. Signed last season and made his debut in 1993. **DAVID LAY** A former apprentice at Reading who made his debut in the Division One championship side after signing from Dunstable. Prolific scorer who has gained League representative honours. He made his debut in 1987.

MARTIN MALINS Another apprentice at Reading who arrived via Wokingham Town to sign in the latter part of the last season only for a foot injury to hinder his progress. His debut was earlier in 1993.

RICHARD MIKURENDA A defender/Midfield player who was signed four years ago from Wycombe Wanderers. Now in his fourth season since his debut in 1990.

KEVIN MITCHELL Another to join last season after making over 600 appearances for Windsor & Eton. Has represented the F.A. and also played for Woking, Reading and Slough. His debut was earlier this year.

STEWART MITCHELL Hails from the North east where he played for Gateshead. Arrived via spells with Windsor & Eton, Slough, Maidenhead, Hendon, Woking and Basingstoke to sign just before the start of the season.

JOHN REGAN The fist player to join Marlow for a fee when he signed from Hounslow in 1989. He also played for Wycombe Wanderers and Chalfont St. Peter. he made his debut in 1989 and has made over 200 appearances for Marlow since that time.

MARK WATKINS Previously with Harrow Borough, St. Albans and Tring Town. A speedy forward who has gained representative honours for the Herts. F.A. and Diadora League. he made his debut in 1989.

DAVE RUSSELL (Manager) Now in his seventh season having assisted Mike Keen in winning the championship of Division One. A former apprentice with Arsenal who also played for Wycombe, Slough Town, Maidenhead Utd. and Burnham.

LAURIE CRAKER (Coach) Joined up with Marlow in 1989 after having played for Chelsea and Watford. Has a vast non-league knowledge.

The Isthmian Charity Shield The Season's Traditional "Opener"

Established in season 1978/79 the Isthmian Charity Shield match is now the established opening event of the Diadora Football League season. Originally the match was sponsored by Dylon Dyes and was known as the Dylon Isthmian Charity Shield. ADT Healthquest were the sponsors in 1991 at Woking, whilst a season before Atcost the builders assisted the League by sponsoring the game at Kingstonian, on a ground they had been responsible for building.

This is the first time that the event has come to Meadow Park, the home of the current champions, Chesham United Football Club and generally speaking it is the League Champions who come out on top in such matches - but not every time.

Athletic on Sutton United's ground by a handsome 5-1 margin. Woking in fact, are the only club as can be seen from the list of winners, to have won the Charity Shield match two years running.

The list of winning includes names League Endsleigh Insurance Football newcomers. Wycombe Wanderers as recently as 1987/88 and we pay tribute to the Wanderers rapid rise to the ranks of the Football League, may their inaugural season prove to be as successful as the last one.

No doubt there has been much rivalry between our competing teams and the Wycombe club over the years, probably often not so friendly either, but I doubt that

> they would begrudge their County neighbours the success they have had. Indeed, I am sure that Wycombe's success has been a spur to the ambitions of both Chesham and Marlow and a goal for which to aim at themselves.

> In the three years that Yeovil were members of the competition they played in the Charity Shield match twice, once as AC Delco Cup winners and once as

As recently as two years ago, Woking, then League Cup winners defeated the champions, Redbridge Forest at Kingfield. Last year however, they upheld the champions tradition by beating Grays champions. Both matches were well attended which helped to swell the funds that were distributed to charity after the match - for that is what the evening is really aimed at. The Diadora Football League has over the years under other titles, especially its original one The Isthmian League been responsible for much contact with other footballing bodies, be they leagues, touring teams or associations. They also, as far back as 1912 introduced a Champions v. The Rest of the League match and recently, the writer, purchasing a large collection of programmes from his former club - Ilford, acquired several programmes from the 1930's where such representative matches were played on the club's former ground at Lynn Road, a much favoured venue by the Isthmian League, along with Champion Hill, Dulwich for the staging of such events.

The illustration of the centre of the 1937 programme has amongst it some of the pre-war "legendary" England Amateur International players such as Lester Finch of Barnet and Jim (Senior) from Lewis Walthamstow Avenue and Mervyn Griffiths of Ilford the Welsh International who was for so many years the constant footballing companion of the late Sir Stanley Rous. From an officials point of view the name of one of the linesmen is also significant. Sydney Donaldson joined the Isthmian League as Referees and Fixture Secretary in 1943 and stayed with the competition until his death in

1968, rising through the offices of Hon. Secretary and Chairman to become the League's President. The team from the earlier 1931 programme for the similar match is just as interesting with the also legendary Edgar Kail of Dulwich Hamlet and England fame amongst the Isthmian League players, Lewis was even then in the Athenian side as was one L. H. Compton of Hampstead (later Hendon) F.C. surely a relation of Dennis and Leslie Compton who were later to both play for Hendon and the Arsenal - as well as England at cricket

The current Diadora League handbook has the records of the results of those matches and from the listings we find that the 1931 match resulted in a win for the Isthmians by a 7-2 margin whilst in 1937 the Isthmian side once again had the upper hand, but this time by only 4-0.



Who knows, perhaps the producer of the Isthmian Charity Shield programme for the year 2050 may have a copy of tonight's programme to refer to when he writes his notes - I'd like to think one copy will survive that passage of time.
