CLUB CHAT

WELCOME KINGSTONIAN

After a hectic month of ten league games which, in the main, have gone as well as we could have hoped, we take a break over the next week to begin our FA Cup campaign and, tonight, take part in the annual Isthmian Charity Shield game that pairs last season's Ryman League champions and League Cup winners. This year it has the added attraction of being a local derby, and we have great pleasure in offering a warm welcome to everyone who has made the short trip from Kingsmeadow tonight. We last met here in April, a thrilling 3-3 draw which ended our mathematical hopes of the title, although K's had to wait a little longer to clinch it themselves, but they have been here twice since, winning the Surrey Senior Cup against Woking after a replay. We must congratulate them on a more than satisfactory start to their Football Conference career, which was given a huge kick start when they beat Hereford in their opening game, and the Ryman League officials here tonight, who we also welcome, can take justifiable pride from the current Conference table which shows the last four sides to have gone up from our league as champions, Hayes, Stevenage, Kingstonian and Yeovil, all in the top ten after Saturday's games.

SEEKING TO IMPROVE SHIELD RECORD

Although this is the first time since 1986 that we have featured in this annual game it is our seventh appearance in all, and we are looking to improve a fairly desperate record which has seen us win just once, at Harrow in 1984. In all except that last encounter, a rain swept 5-1 thumping by Yeovil, which was on the August Bank Holiday Monday, we played the game as a pre-season fixture rather like the FA Charity Shield, but in the last few years it has become a midweek fixture once the season has started, which may not be the ideal situation, if for no other reason than it can be difficult to find a midweek date to suit two sides who, under normal circumstances, will be playing in different competitions. Having said that, with the Conference season having started a week earlier than the Ryman League this year, it might not have been any easier to organise it for pre-season. For all that, the fact that tonight's game is a local derby should ensure that it is both well supported and competitive, and league chairman Alan Turvey has kindly contributed an article to tonight's programme in which he explains how charities will benefit from the game. Should the scores be level after 90 minutes tonight, extra time and, if necessary, penalties will decide the destination of the Shield.

NERVE ENDS FRAYING

As Kingstonian found out last season, a side doing well in the Ryman League can attract good crowds, and on a less than glorious afternoon weatherwise it was good to see nearly 900 people in the ground for Saturday's game against Hampton. I can't believe that any of them would have gone away feeling anything other than well entertained, but those with allegiances might also have had mixed feelings. Hampton fans will have been disappointed that their hopes of an unexpected point vanished so near the end, while our own supporters, though relieved at three points and an extended lead at the top of the table, must be wishing that we didn't make quite such hard work of some of these wins as it doesn't do the nerves much good! We played so well for an hour that the first shot Gareth Howells had to deal with was the penalty with which Hampton began their comeback, and while it was frustrating to see the two goal lead evaporate, I do feel that Barry Blackman's late goal only gave us what a largely fluent and entertaining performance deserved – congratulations to Barry on scoring his first league goal for us at such an opportune time, and to another Barry, Laker, who is in line to make his 100th appearance for us tonight.

UP FOR THE CUP

As mentioned in Saturday's programme, we are entering a phase of the season in which the fixture list depends on our progress, and that of other clubs, in cup competitions, and we visit St. Leonards on Saturday looking to take our first step in this season's FA Cup. We hope as many of you as possible will make the trip to the Sussex coast for what is a tricky tie. On paper we will start as favourites, particularly after a 5-1 pre-season win on the same ground, but St. Leonards have made enough of a start in the Southern Division of the Dr Martens League to suggest that we will need to be at our best – Saturday's 4-1 defeat of Yate was a particularly good result. Any replay will be here next Tuesday, and decided on penalties if necessary.

At present there are no changes to the timings for the Centenary Dinner-Dance on Saturday evening, and it will be a case of coming back as quickly as possible and hoping for a clear run up the A21, not the quickest of roads the other side of Tunbridge Wells. If there are any late alterations we will announce them tonight.

FRIDAY NIGHT IS FOOTBALL NIGHT

A reminder that we visit Dulwich next Friday in the Ryman League the game having been brought forward a day due to England's European Championship qualifier on the Saturday. We haven't bothered with travel details to a reasonably local and frequently visited ground, but do check if you're going by train, for any amendments to the timetable now the winter schedules have started. If you do want details of how to get there, they were in the Heybridge programme.

FROM THE MANAGEMENT

GOOD EVENING everyone and welcome to our near neighbours from Kingstonian as we take a break from league and major cup action for what will hopefully be an enjoyable game. To me it's no surprise that Kingstonian are doing well in the Football Conference, as they looked a strong side in winning our league last season and, from the few games I've seen in the Conference this season they look capable of more than holding their own.



I'm sure a lot of our supporters were scratching their heads on Saturday wondering how we'd thrown away our two goal lead, and they weren't the only ones. Although it came right in the end with Barry Blackman's late goal, I wasn't happy afterwards as to me it's ridiculous to dominate a game that much and then let the opposition back in. In my opinion it was the second consecutive game in which we'd played well to open a two goal lead, but missed some good chances before taking our foot off the pedal, and if you give a side a sniff of being able to get back in the game they'll take it, as Hampton did aided by some poor defensive play on our part. As with the previous game here against Boreham Wood it seemed to take their equaliser to rouse us back to our earlier form, but I told the players afterwards that they can't expect to just turn the pressure on and off like that, and the time to relax is when you're three or four up, not two.

On the positive side, though, I did think we played very well in the first half, and it was nice to see the winner come from a near post corner, which we work on a lot as it's difficult to defend, but the delivery isn't always of the quality it was for that one. It's also nice to see the decisive goal scored by a substitute you've put on ten minutes earlier in an effort to change things around a bit and find a winner.

Staying positive, we've now had a month of the season and, apart from a couple of disappointments at home, you've got to say that things have gone pretty well so far. We've 23 points from 10 games, which keeps us well on track for our target of 84 points which I don't think will be far away from a winning total, although without a crystal ball I can't say for certain that it will be enough.

On Saturday we make our first appearance in this season's FA Cup, and like all other clubs we will be hoping for a good run for financial purposes. It may not be an advantage to have beaten St. Leonards easily in a pre-season friendly, as we will have to guard against complacency.

It will also be difficult on Saturday as it will be a rush for the spectators, players and officials to get back for the Centenary Dinner in the evening. The most important thing on the day, though, is that we progress in the FA Cup, and if it means we're slightly late back then so be it. To have played the game on Sunday would have meant that none of the players could go to the dinner, while St. Leonards is a long way to go on a Friday night, and after all Saturday is football day. That said, the following week we play at Dulwich on a Friday, but the players were happy with that, and ultimately it's up to them.

Enjoy tonight's game.

ABOUT OUR VISITORS

KINGSTONIAN F.C.

HISTORY

The Kingstonian club that we know today came into existence in 1919, but the club's history dates back to the formation of Kingston & Surbiton YMCA in 1885. After being known as Saxons and then Kingston Wanderers, they adopted the title Kingston on Thames FC in 1893. Internal disputes in the early 1900s led to the club splitting, and in 1908 Kingston Town and Old Kingstonians played as separate clubs before remerging in 1919.



The newly formed club began life in the Athenian League and at a new ground in Richmond Road. The Athenian League title was won in 1924 and 1926, and three years later K's accepted an invitation to join the Isthmian League, replacing Civil Service FC.

The 1930s saw Kingstonian enjoy some of their most successful times, with an FA Amateur Cup coming to the club in 1933. In the final K's played Stockton, and after a 1-1 draw at Dulwich had to travel to their opponents' territory for the replay at Darlington. Despite conceding an early goal, they came back to win 4-1. The following season came the Isthmian League championship, and this was repeated in 1937.

Subsequent years proved less successful, with runners-up spot in 1948 and 1963 K's best efforts, but in 1960 they did seem set to regain the Amateur Cup when they led Hendon 1-0 at Wembley with three minutes left, only to concede two late goals and force a hasty change of ribbons on the cup.

In 1967 K's won the Surrey Senior Cup for the 9th time, but after a barren spell they were relegated from the top division of the Isthmian League in 1979. They regained their place six years later but only after Leatherhead, who had originally finished second to Farnborough, had three points deducted.

1988 saw Kingstonian leave Richmond Road, and they had to spend a season and a half lodging at Hampton before moving to a new ground at Kingsmeadow in August 1989. The ground is on the site of the old Norbiton Sports Ground that housed Kingston Town in the early 1900s, and K's celebrated the move to new surroundings by finishing fourth in the league and reaching the quarter-finals of the FA Trophy.

The 1990s saw Kingstonian's name feature in the FA Cup, most notably in 1994 when they beat Brighton at Kingsmeadow, their only win over Football League opposition, although they gave a good account of themselves against Plymouth a year later. In 1996 they won the Guardian Insurance Cup, then last season produced a storming run in the second half of the season to win their third championship and with it promotion to the Football Conference. They followed this up by beating Woking 2-1 in a replay and achieving a 10th Surrey Senior Cup success.

IN CHARGE

GEOFF CHAPPLE guided Kingstonian to the Ryman League title last season, his first at Kingsmeadow after a 13 year stay at Woking which had seen them climb from Division Two of the Isthmian League to the Football Conference, win the FA Trophy on three occasions and reach the 4^{th} round of the FA Cup in 1990-91. He has also managed Windsor.

ON THE PITCH

Goalkeeper **JEROME JOHN** has become a favourite with the crowd after some outstanding performances helped K's to the title last season. A junior with West Ham, he joined K's from Altrincham. Also at Kingsmeadow is **SIMON BROWN**, recently signed on a month's loan from Tottenham, where he is currently fourth choice keeper.

Wing back **TARKAN MUSTAFA** scored on his debut for Kingstonian after signing in August from Barnet, where he made 11 senior appearances. He was previously with Kettering and Wimbledon.

COLIN LUCKETT was originally signed from Millwall in 1994 as an attacking full back but he has more recently converted to midfield and has scored some important and spectacular goals. He is approaching his 200th appearance.

One of the key members of last season's championship success was **MATT CROSSLEY** who was ever-present and voted Player of the Year by the supporters. He was signed at the start of the season from Wycombe, where he won a Conference championship medal in 1994 and featured in two FA Trophy wins and a Wembley play-off success.

A more recent signing is Leeds born centre back **SIMON STEWART**, who joined from Fulham at the start of the season. He played three games for Fulham having previously been with Sheffield Wednesday and Shrewsbury, and had a spell on loan at Woking last season.

The centre of defence was further boosted in the summer with the signing of MARK HARRIS, who has played over 300 Football League games, mainly for Swansea. He first joined Crystal Palace from Wokingham, and had spells with Burnley, Swansea and Gillingham before spending last season with Cardiff.

Another player with considerable Football League experience is **GARY PATTERSON**, who was signed from Wycombe at the start of last season. He began his career with Notts County, and then won a Division Three championship medal with Shrewsbury.

GEOFF PITCHER is a midfielder who is in his second spell with the club after rejoining from Colchester at the start of last season. An accurate passer of the ball, he has also played for Watford.

A great future is predicted for GAVIN HOLLIGAN, an 18-year-old striker signed from Walton in the summer, and he has already been on target in the Conference.

The goals of **DAVID LEWORTHY** were a key factor in K's title success last season, with 30 in all games after his signing from Rushden & Diamonds. After playing in the Football League for Tottenham, Portsmouth, Reading and Oxford, where he won a League Cup winner's medal in 1986, he subsequently played for Farnborough before joining Dover for what was a record fee for a non-league player. The longest serving member of the squad is fast and skilful striker EDDIE AKUAMOAH, who was signed in August 1993 from Carshalton. The club's leading scorer two seasons ago, he represented Great Britain in the 1996 World Student Games in Japan.

The find of last season was striker **SCOTT CORBETT**, who established himself in the squad after graduating through the reserves.

Attacking midfielder **KEVIN RATTRAY** was with Geoff Chapple at Woking, and joined K's a year ago after spells with Gillingham and Barnet.

JOE FRANCIS, a central midfielder, was added to the squad in March from Hayes. He has previously played for Bromley and Enfield.

K's squad also includes two players signed from Welling at the start of last season. Defender WAYNE BROWN had been with the Kent club for ten seasons, and utility player DANNY SMITH five, although he had a spell here on loan in March 1997. He was a junior with Tottenham.

SUTTON UNITED GROUND REGULATIONS SUMMARY

Sutton United reserves the right to prosecute or eject any person who within the Club premises is deemed to behave in any of the following ways: entering the field of play; using obscene language; being under the influence of alcohol or drugs; making vulgar gestures; using terms of racial abuse; taunting opposing team supporters or entering any area reserved for opposing supporters; transferring to the stand or enclosure without paying. The Club may, at its discretion, bar anyone guilty of such offences for a period of up to FIVE YEARS. This also covers any person guilty of such offences at games involving the club away from home, or any game under the overall jurisdiction of the F.A.

In addition, the Club reserves the right to prosecute or eject any person whose behaviour within the Club premises is deemed, at the Club's discretion, to: bring the Club or game into disrepute; interfere with the safety or comfort of other spectators; impede in any way the activities of the club, including the progress of any match; be in breach of any one of these Ground Regulations. The Club may, at its discretion, bar anyone guilty of such offences, for ANY period.

Any person barred shall be liable to civil action for trespass should they attempt to enter the ground during the period of their ban. He or she has the right of appeal for reconsideration of the term after a period of twelve months has elapsed. Such application must be in writing to the Board of Directors, whose decision will be final and binding. Only one such appeal is permitted.

It is forbidden: to bring bottles, metal cans, glasses, banners or other similar articles into club premises — such items may be confiscated; to consume intoxicating liquor anywhere other than in such bars licensed for that purpose; to cause unnecessary noise, such as that from radios and whistles; to climb the floodlight pylons, stands or other buildings and structures within the ground; to obstruct any gangways, access ways or emergency exits.

DID YOU KNOW? Sutton and Kingstonian are the only two clubs to have had their grounds used as a neutral venue for the Charity Shield. Slough's 2-0 win against Aveley in 1990 was at Kingsmeadow, while two years later, Woking hammered Grays here.

SUTTON IN THE SHIELD

Despite making a record six appearances in the Charity Shield, we have won only once. We first competed at Enfield in 1980, a repeat of the previous season's League Cup Final. Goals either side of half-time by Steve King and John McCombe gave Enfield the lead, and although Paul McKinnon pulled one goal back on his last game before joining Malmo, it was not good enough. Two years later, Micky Joyce gave us an early lead at Leytonstone, but then we lost 'keeper Dave Collyer through concussion and stand-in Micky Stephens was beaten three times in seven minutes either side of half-time, with Joyce pulling back a consolation goal. A year after that Terry Glynn scored the only goal for Wycombe at Loakes Park, and when Dave Silman gave Harrow an early lead at Earlsmead in 1984, it looked to be a fourth successive defeat, but two goals from Steve Galloway and one from Paul McKinnon meant that at last the Shield came to Gander Green Lane. It was on its way out again in 1985, back to Loakes Park as Paul McKinnon gave us an early lead but Declan Link equalised before half-time, and in the second half Simon Read and Neal Stanley added further goals. A year later we were here again, this time against Yeovil on a rain-swept Bank Holiday, and Carl Zacchau's hat-trick underpinned a 5-1 win that was the biggest winning margin in the match until Woking equalled it in 1992 and Chertsey then beat it two years later. Lenny Dennis scored our goal.

BY CAR. M25 anti-clockwise to junction 5, then take the A21 to Hastings – quite fast to Tunbridge Wells but likely to be slower after that. On the outskirts of Hastings turn right opposite Do-It-All store into Junction Road (watch out here as you see the store quite late), then right again at a Tjunction onto The Ridge, going back over the A21, and continuing across two roundabouts onto the B2093 towards Ore, St. Helens and Fairlight. After about two miles turn right, opposite a cemetery, into Elphinstone Road and the ground is along here, next door to, but before, Hastings Town F.C.

BY RAIL. The closest station to the ground is Ore, but there is no direct service from London or any public transport from the station, so with it still being a mile to walk it's probably better to use public transport, or a taxi, from Hastings. The quickest services are half hourly from Charing Cross at 10 or 40 minutes past the hour, calling at Waterloo East two minutes later, London Bridge five minutes after that, and taking just over an Services from hour and a half to Hastings. Victoria to Hastings are at 47 minutes past the hour (calling at Clapham Junction 6 minutes later and East Croydon a further ten minutes later, and taking two hours) or at 17 minutes past the hour, changing at Lewes and taking two hours ten minutes (same pick ups at Clapham Junction and East Croydon). If you do go to Ore, the hourly connection from Hastings is at 31 minutes past, taking six minutes. Return from Hastings on the Charing Cross line at 11 or 52 minutes past, and on the Victoria line at 23 minutes past (direct) or 43 (change at Lewes).
