THE DIADORA FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Diadora Football League as we know it today was originally born over 80 years ago when three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of Ilford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon. Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss he subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaird as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

The six clubs that formed the League on that inaugural season were London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 85 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions.

Personalities in those early days were all important, and none more so than Henry Huband who was Hon. Secretary and Treasurer for the first thirty years until 1935 and then President until his death in 1952. In fact, in many Isthmian boardroom's from the older clubs in the competition, his portrait which was presented to clubs after his death still looks out over the modern day running of clubs. During those years, the Isthmian League as far as the South of England was concerned also had a vice-like grip on the Amateur Cup with too many to name winners and finalists drawn from its ranks.

From next season the League will also be able to boast of three clubs who have gone on to embrace Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Premier League club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and were members until 1964. Maidstone United who sadly went out of business at the start of last season, were also members of the Isthmian League between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers will next season be competing in the Football League only six years after leaving our ranks.

The Isthmian League under the then Chairmanship of Barry East first embraced professionalism and sponsorship in the early 70's when Rothmans, Berger Paints and Servowarm all took turns at being the league's main sponsor. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the league from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed two three year sponsorship agreements which were attractive and rewarding for all parties concerned.

The league is now concluding its first two year agreement with the Diadora organisation which has seen the Italian Sportswear Company gain a share of the UK market and become a high profile advertiser on sports grounds around the country. Earlier in the season the league announced a two year extension to the agreement which everyone concerned hopes will be as successful and fulfilling as the last two seasons.

It is during the past decade that the league has emerged from the "amateur" tag that it previously had, and now plays a full part each year in the pyramid of football where it provides clubs with both a platform to rise from, and in the case of the clubs at a lower level, a target of membership to aim at.

In recent years, member club Southall reached the Final of the F.A. Challenge Vase, whilst Yeading went one step better and won the competition in 1990.

Welcome today Dorking

Dorking's origin is very nearly lost in the mists of antiquity. The club was founded as long ago as 1880, and claims to be the second oldest in Surrey - Reigate priory have been granted seniority.

Back in 1910 Dorking surprised everybody with an interest in local soccer, when they fought their way through to the Surrey Senior Shield Final, only to lose to the strong Old Kingstonian side (now Kingstonian F.C.) 3-0.

In 1922 they became founder members of the Surrey County Senior League, their ground being situated in Pixham Lane. Epsom Town and Farnham United Breweries proved to be the strongest sides in the league during the first few years, but Dorking weren't to be denied for long and won the championship in 1928/29 and 1929/30.

The 1930's and early 1940's were a lean period for the club, but in 1948/49, they won the Surrey Senior League Charity Cup, and became the first ever winners of the League Cup.

Once Leatherhead left the Surrey Senior League at the end of the 1949/50 season following four successive league championship wins, Dorking looked to take over number one spot and their results prior to this time suggested they could do this. However other clubs claimed this right before Dorking did win the league championship and not only that, they completed a league and cup "double" by winning the League Cup. They also became the first side from the. Surrey Senior League to defeat a professional side in the FA Cup, defeating Folkestone Town 3-1.

Dorking's success really coincided with their moving from Pixham Lane to their present Meadowbank Headquarters at the beginning of the 1953/4 season.

In 1956/57 Dorking joined the Corinthian League, and though they failed to win any honours during their seven year stay, they did win the Surrey Senior Shield in the 1959/60 season by defeating a strong Sutton United side 3-0, they again reached the final the following season.

Dorking joined the Athenian League in 1963, and this was the start of another barren spell for the club, which led to the merger with Southern league club, Guildford City in 1974. They went under the title of Guildford and Dorking United - Guildford second name change, they were known as Guildford United between 1921 and 1927.

The amalgamation was not a success, and after two Southern League seasons the club collapsed, and another club named Dorking Town was formed in 1977. After completing the former club's fixtures for the 76/7 season, they joined the Surrey Senior league for 1977/78 for a single season before moving back into the Athenian League.

The club joined the Isthmian (now Diadora) League at the start of 1981/82, finishing ninth. Another name change occurred for the start of the 82/83 season when the present Dorking title was adopted.

After two seasons of finishing in third place (86/7 & 87/8) the club won promotion to Division One in 1988/89 with 109 goals scored and 100 points obtained.

1989/90 saw the Chicks challenging for a place in the Premier Division at the first attempt, and finally finishing sixth, as well as reaching the final of the Surrey Senior Cup.

Last season Dorking reached the fourth qualifying round of the F.A. Cup, but this season they "broke through" to the competition proper before losing to Plymouth Argyle in the First Round on a Sunday at Meadowbank in front of a capacity crowd of 3,200. This season has also seen the "Chicks" achieve promotion to the Premier Division of the Diadora League where after a long season's battle, they are runners-up to Hitchin Town.

The Dorking Players

PETER MILLS (Goalkeeper) Works fro British Telecom. Experienced player who joined at the start of the season. Previously with Sutton United and Tooting & Mitcham Utd.

DAREN BIRD (Defender) Joined towards the end of last season from Kingstonian, and made his debut at Aveley in March. Started his career with Cranleigh in the Parasol League in 1984.

TONY WELCH (Defender) The Club Captain. An assistant manager with AMEX. Hard working all rounder who can play anywhere on the field. Joined last season, his previous clubs include Staines Town and Tooting & Mitcham. Has represented Middlesex F.A. and was a youth player with Millwall for three years.

GRAHAM MARRINER (Midfield) Roofer by trade. Started his career with two years at Portsmouth. Moved on to Gravesend and then joined Bognor Regis Town where he played over 400 games. Joined Dorking earlier this season.

NEIL ROBSON (Midfield/Forward) Plasterer by trade. Joined the club in September 1990. Formerly with Sutton United and Epsom & Ewell. Also played at Schoolboy level with Wimbledon and Bristol. Gained Vauxhall Premier Division and Surrey Senior Cup honours with Sutton United.

PHIL GRAINGER (Forward) Accountant by profession. Has been at Dorking for five seasons after moving south from Hull City and his honours include Division Two South and Surrey Senior Cup runners-up medals. Scored 37 times last season, equally the club single season record.

STEVE LUNN (Forward). Pipeline tester by trade. Has been at the club for nine years apart from a short spell with Walton & Hersham. Was with Crystal Palace for four years at junior level. Has won several honours including representing the FA Amateur Eleven. Currently the club's top goalscorer.

MATTHEW HANLAN (Forward). Bricklayer by trade. Joined the club last season after spending seven years at Sutton United. Will be remembered for his goal for Sutton against Coventry City in the FA Cup. Was also with Wycombe Wanderers for a season. He is lethal in front of goal.

CAREY ANDERSON (Forward) Clerk at the MOD by profession. Joined the club in September 1991 from Leatherhead and causes opposing defences all sorts of problems. Likes to get forward to score goals. Was a member of Southampton and Crystal Palace juniors and also the Fulham squad in 1989. Represented the Surrey County FA in 1982 at youth level.

CHRIS LEWINGTON (Midfield) Painter and decorator by trade. Experienced player previously with Whyteleafe. Also had a long spell at Dulwich Hamlet where he was their leading appearance maker.

KEVIN DUFFELL (Defender) Works as a representative for a photocopier firm. Joined at the start of the season. Previously with Epsom & Ewell and Tooting & Mitcham.

TONY RAINS (Player/Assistant manager) Project manager with an insurance firm. Joined Dorking at the start of this season after some 13 seasons at Sutton United. Has represented both the F.A. and league Representative sides and was a member of the Sutton side on their visit to Wembley in the FA Trophy Final of 1981.

JOHN RAINS (Manager) Joined the club at the start of last season after spending 13 years at Sutton, making over 700 appearances for that club. Captained the Sutton side which visited Wembley in 1981 and which also reached the final of the Anglo Italian Tournament. On gaining his coaching badge he assisted both Worthing and Epsom before coaching the Reserves at Sutton. Was the William Hill Manager of the Month award winner in September 1992.

Tooting & Mitcham Utd

Tooting & Mitcham United F.C. was formed in 1932 when two clubs who were local rivals, Tooting Town and Mitcham Wanderers, decided to amalgamate, the idea first being seriously discussed for the first time at a Christmas match in the London League during the 1930/31 season. Tooting were originally formed in 1887 as Tooting Graveney, playing their first matches on a pitch on Figges Marsh; they won the South Western Cup in 1898 and 1900 before gaining entry to the Southern Suburban League. In 1914 they became members of the Athenian League but played only one match before the competition was suspended during the Great War. Tooting Graveney did not re-form after the war but a new Club, Tooting Town, came into being in 1919 and joined the Southern Suburban League before transferring to the London League two years later in 1921.

When they moved to Sandy Lane, which was purchased by Tooting Town in 1922, some financial problems arose due to the close proximity of the Mitcham Wanderers Club whose ground in Streatham Lane was only a few hundred yards away. Mitcham had been formed in 1912. At first they played at Cranmer Green in Division Three of the Wimbledon League and enjoyed considerable success in local football before joining the London League in 1922 when they were granted senior status; they took the Premier Division Championship in 1929 and were runners-up in 1930. In the following season, 1930/31, they reached the Surrey Senior Cup final, only to be beaten by two goals to nil by Kingstonian at Plough Lane, Wimbledon.

On amalgamation, Tooting and Mitcham • United remained in the London League but moved upwards into the Athenian League in 1937, however, they found it hard to settle down in a higher grade of football and finished in a low position in the table in their first two seasons. Although their league form might have been disappointing, it was compensated for by a first win in the Surrey Senior Cup in 1938 when Dulwich hamlet were beaten 2-1 at Selhurst Park. Wartime brought a first win in the London Senior Cup when in 1943 they defeated Dulwich Hamlet 5-4 on Millwall's ground. Tooting have since won the London Senior Cup in 1949, 1959 and 1960. They have won the Surrey Senior Cup on eight occasions, including a hat-trick of successes between 1976 and 1978.

Tooting were Athenian League champions in 1950 and 1955 and were invited into the Isthmian League in 1956. They immediately proved themselves good enough by winning the championship in 1958 and 1960 as well as reaching the F.A. Cup Third Round in 1959 where they lost 0-3 to Nottingham Forest, the eventual winners after a 2-2 draw at Sandy Lane, having defeated Bournemouth and Northampton Town in previous rounds. The club has a fine record in the FA Cup with five first round appearances two in the second round and their best ever run when they beat Swindon in a third round replay before losing to Bradford City at Valley Parade.

During the 1980's Tooting enjoyed only moderate success in the League, generally occupying a mid table position, but season 1988/9 was disastrous for the Club and it resulted in relegation in the first time in their history.

The 1991/92 and 1992/93 season have seen the Club finish in mid-table positions.

The Tooting Players

LEE ORKNEY (Goalkeeper)

Signed for the club in January from Dorking. Played for Walton & Hersham last term and before that was a t Hampton for several seasons.

IAN YOUNG (Defender/Midfield)

Signed for the club in December from Margate. Has previously played for Bromley, equally at home in the back four or in midfield.

BRIAN FRAMPTON (Defender)

Summer signing from Margate where he spent three seasons. Before that he had a ten year spell at Bromley including a well earned testimonial.

DAVID TAYLOR (Defender)

Signed for the club four seasons ago from Croydon. A very consistent and commanding central defender whose former clubs include Dulwich Hamlet and Hayes.

RALPH COWAN (Defender)

Rejoined the club in December after a short spell at Dulwich Hamlet. A dominating figure in both penalty area's; last seasons supporters Player of the Year. Has also played for Lewes.

JOHN MYATT (Midfield)

Last seasons young Player of the Year. he joined the club midway through last season from Crystal Palace, where he was captain of their Youth Team. He also had short spells at Crewe, Watford and Wycombe.

MICKY STEPHENS (Midfield)

The Club Captain - he is in his third season at Tooting after joining from Sutton United, where he made over 500 appearances. Was an England non-League international in his Sutton days and made his Sutton debut against Tooting in an FA Cup tie in 1977.

BOBBY DENNINGTON (Defender/Midfield) In his second season at Sandy Lane, having joined the club from Bromley and scored on his league debut against another former club, Leyton-Wingate. His uncle played for Tooting in the sixties.

MARK TOMPKINS (Forward)

Joined the club in the summer and has previously played for Fisher Athletic and Dulwich hamlet. Unselfish player who has formed a good partnership with fellow striker John Collins.

JOHN COLLINS (Forward)

Leading marksman for the club for the past two seasons and was one of the leading scorers in the Diadora League the past season. Joined Tooting from Wealdstone three years ago, and has also played for Dulwich.

PAUL LOUGHLIN (Midfield/Forward) Competitive player in his third season at Sandy Lane. He joined the club from Bromley where he spent ten seasons. Also had a loan spell at Croydon. Missed much of last season through a nasty knee injury.

TIM HOPE (Forward)

Recently promoted to he first team squad after some good performances in the reserves where he has been a regular scorer.

NOEL FRANKUM (Midfield)

Hard working player who joined in the last close season from Kingstonian. Has also seen service with Burnley and made some appearance in their Central League side.

DAVID GABRIEL (Midfield)

Longest serving player at the club, joining from Corinthian-Casuals in 1987. Started life at Sandy Lane in the Reserves as a forward before switching to full back and then to midfield.

PETER SHAW (Player/Coach)

Now in his second season at the club. A very experienced defender who enjoyed a distinguished Football League career at Charlton Athletic and Gillingham. He has also played for Bromley and Staines Town.

TREVOR FORD (Manager)

Took charge of first team affairs at the beginning of last season. A former Tooting player who made over 500 appearances for the club, playing in virtually every position including goalkeeper. Was a member of the 1976 team which reached the fourth round proper of the FA Cup. Has also managed at Bromley and Margate. Round by Round The Full Members Cup Competition 1992/93
