# THE CARLSBERG CUP

The curtain finally comes down on the 1994/95 Diadora League season with tonight's playing of the Carlsberg Cup Final. The competition, originally known as the Full Members Cup and also at one time sponsored by the Loctite company is now five seasons old and tonight gives us our second all Division One final (the previous one was 1992/93).

It is also the third time that a North West London club has staged the final, previously the honour has fallen to both Hayes and Hendon - Harrow complete the trio of "H's" this evening.

Unfortunately the two year sponsorship of the competition by Carlsberg-Tetley Brewing Limited comes to an end this evening, but their Managing Director Mr. Mike Titmus announced after the Carlsberg Trophy match between Metropolitan Police and Collier Row on Tuesday evening that the Company will continue to have links with our competition next season - the format of the link has still to be decided upon, but in any case we can consider it excellent news and look forward to an ongoing relationship.

The Carlsberg Trophy Final became the second of our two League finals to go first to extra time and then penalties, following on from the League Cup on Monday evening. The victors at Boreham Wood on Tuesday after the penalty "shoot-out" were Metropolitan Police 4-3, this coming after a 1-1 draw after extra time. Incidentally, the League Cup resulted in a victory for Aylesbury United by 7-6 after also playing a 1-1 draw after extra time.

# Our Carlsberg Finalists this evening..... BOREHAM WOOD F.C.

Boreham Wood Football, as it is now known, was formed in 1948, following the amalgamation of Boreham Rovers and Royal Retournez.

The Club progressed through the Mid-Herts. League and into the Parthenon League, where it finished Runners-up on three occasions, and Champions once. The next step was to join the Spartan League and again success followed with two runners-up spots in seasons 1963/64 and 1965/66. They then moved on once more, this time to the Athenian League. The status of the Club grew during their Athenian League days and they won the Premier Division Championship by nine points in season season 1973/74.

An application was made to join the Isthmian (now Diadora) Football League in 1974/75, and in 1976/77 the Club won the Division two Championship, by sixteen points. After five seasons in the Premier Division, Boreham Wood were relegated for the first and only time in their history at the end of the 1981/82 season. During the following two seasons the Club finished sixth and fifth, and on each occasion missed promotion by just five points. Boreham Wood have reached the First Round proper of the FA challenge Cup on two occasions. In 1973/74 they played Southend

United at Roots hall, losing 3-0 and in 1977/78 they drew 0-0 with Swindon Town at Meadow Park , but lost the replay 2-0 at The County Ground.

In their own domestic County F.A. competitions in Hertfordshire, the Club has many successes, winning the Senior Challenge Cup, the Charity Cup, the Junior Cup, the Intermediate Cup and the Intermediate Charity Cup.

The Club's Youth Team has done particularly well during the past two seasons, winning the Southern Counties Floodlit Youth League Championship and Cup in 1992/93 and finishing Runners-up and winning the Cup again in 1993/94. Several players have now progressed through from the Youth Team and the Reserves and are now part of the First Team squad.

The 1994/95 season has seen the Club reemerge as a force in Diadora League Division One. They have won the Championship and are looking forward to once again taking up residence in the Premier Division for next season.

In Chairman **Phil Wallace** the Club has a leader who is determined to see his Club. successful both on and off the field. The reader may remember that recently he was linked with the vacant Chairman's position at Leyton Orient Football Club.

The Club is managed by Bob Makin who joined the Club a couple of season's back with the remit to bring success back to Meadow Park. Bob had his fair share of success whilst a player gaining Championship medals with Enfield in the Alliance Premier League, Barking and Leytonstone llford in the Diadora League and Dartford where he played in their Trophy semifinal side. Bob has also played for Chelmsford City. He is assisted by Alan Carrington who, during his playing career was best remembered for his sterling performances in the colours of Hayes. He later assisted both John Still and Ted Hardy at Levtonstone llford and renewed acquaintances with Bob Makin soon after he joined the Club.



MARTIN TAYLOR (Goalkeeper) Experienced and highly rated 33 year old 'keeper in his third season at the club having joined from Bishop's Stortford. Previously with Jyderup (Denmark), Hendon and Woodford Town.

**BARRY FOX** (Defender) Experienced player who joined Wood from Grays Athletic last season. Now aged 28, he spent many years with his former club having begun his career at Millwall. **STUART MCLEAN** (Midfield) Joined the Club during the last close season from Leyton where he was Club Captain. He was previously with Leytonstone/llford, Cheshunt, Gravesend & Northfleet and Dartford.

**GARRY NISBET** (Central Defender) Aged 31 this tall commanding central defender joined the club from Collier Row where he was Club Captain during the close season. He has also represented Eton manor, Barkingside and Walthamstow Pennant.

**BILLY HARRIGAN** (Central Defender) The Club Captain who was appointed upon his arrival from Bishop's Stortford in the summer of 1994. He was the captain of the Bishop's Stortford side that won the Division One Championship last season. Has also played for Walthamstow Avenue, Leytonstone Ilford, Chesham United (on loan) and the Middlesex Wanderers

**DOMINIC GENTLE** (Midfield/Forward) Now in his third season with Wood having joined from Cockfosters F.C. Made rapid progress through the Reserves and established himself as a first team regular last season. Aged 23, he was the leading scorer last season.

JASON SHAW (Midfield) An attacking and creative midfield player who joined during last summer from harrow Borough where he was Club Captain. He began his career with West Ham United and also played for Redbridge Forest and Dartford.

SCOTT ASHENDEN (Wing Forward) 21 year old

attacking player who joined in the summer of 1994 from Hendon. His only other previous club was Southend United for whom he made his debut against Swindon in November 1992. His ambition is to return to the full-time professional game.

**DAVE HATCHETT** (Utility Player) The Club's longest serving player, this 30 year old is now in his tenth season with Boreham Wood after joining from Enfield. Since his debut in August 1985 he has made almost 500 appearances, scoring over seventy goals. He can play in midfield or defence and has also deputised as goalkeeper on occasions. Has been voted "Player of the Year" on no less than six occasions.

MARC LIBURD (Wing Forward) 21 year old who joined Boreham Wood in 1992/93. He started his career as a Youth Trainee at Watford and has also had a spell with Millwall. For a time this season was on loan to Endsleigh league side Peterborough United.

**ANTHONY (JUNIOR) SAMUELS** (Forward) Now age 28 this experienced striker joined Boreham Wood in October 1994 from Leyton. He previously played for Leytonstone Ilford, Bromley and Collier Row. He was also a trialist at Stoke City and in the 92/3 season was "Player of the Year" at Leyton.

**TONY JOYCE** (Defender) 23 year old who joined the Club in November 1994. He began his career with Queens Park rangers and has also played for Aldershot, Woking and Stevenage Borough where he was a regular in their Diadora League Championship winning side of 1993/94.

The other members of the Boreham Wood first team squad not listed in their line-up for today's match are: Dean Samuels, Steve Heffer, Neil Jordan, Paul Jordan,Nick Ironton, Andy Pask and Kevin Wilson.

# Our Carlsberg Finalists this evening... STAINES TOWN F.C.

The accepted date of the formation of the present club is 1892, although there is evidence of organised football in the area almost fifteen years previously. Three years later they merged with the St. Peter's Institute club and under later names the Club won various honours. The Club named at one time embodied that of one of the Town's major manufacturing companies, the Lagonda car concern but later the Staines Town name re-appeared although the club appears to have ceased activities by 1935. Towards the end of the Second World War the name of Staines Vale was used - perhaps because of county suspension for "Town" but the "Town" name once again emerged after the War.

During those pre-war years a number of various grounds were used but the club's present home at Wheatsheaf Lane was purchased in 1951, and the club have now been in residence for over forty years.

With the Club having made so many starts under so many names, it is perhaps not surprising that it has also competed in many leagues, in the early days they were obviously of a very junior nature, but in 1905 they joined the Great Western Suburban League where the best position they achieved was runners-up in 1912.

After the First War they again played in a number of junior leagues, but once more achieved Great Western Suburban League status before joining the Spartan League where they remained until resigning in 1935.

The post war club appears to have started its career in the Middlesex Senior League which became the Parthenon League in 1951. Two years later they turned their eyes westward and became founder members of the Hellenic League of which they were runners-up in 1956.

They renewed their acquaintance with the Spartan League in 1958 and lifted the Championship two years later. Staines moved to the Athenian League in 1971 and after winning the second division at the first attempt and being runners-up in Division One two years later, they were elected to the new Second Division of the Isthmian League ( the current equivalent being Division One). Only two years into their Isthmian career, they were promoted to the Premier Division, but were demoted on ground grading in 1984. However five years later they again won promotion to the Premier Division only for it to be lost in 1993 - their first actual relegation in 63 years.

In the national cup competitions the club has fully played its part without any real glory times although as Staines Lagonda they reached the last sixteen of the FA Amateur Cup in 1923/4 whilst in its replacement, the F.A. Trophy they have never passed beyond the second round stage.

In county cups, the club has competed in both the Middlesex and London Senior Competitions the former, they were winners of last season, when they also completed a "double" by winning the Middlesex Senior Charity Cup. The latter has seen them reach the final twice, without ever lifting the trophy itself.

This is the first Isthmian Final of any description that the club has reached, although they have thrice been a beaten semi-finalist in the League Cup

They have the distinction of winning the European Amateur Cup-Winners Cup (Barassi Cup) in 1975 when defeating Banco di Roma over two legs. The first being in front of 70,000 in Rome's Olympic Stadium.

The Staines Town mascot this evening is Sam Bartlett.



STEVE BATTAMS (Centre Back) A member of the Youth side, initially signed at the end of last season, who was added to the First Team squad after a string of fine performances. A Surrey Youth Representative player.

**STEVE BEEKS** (Midfield) Began at Egham Town, then moved on to Aldershot, where he appeared in the Football League. Subsequently played for Woking and Sutton United before joining Staines in January 1992. He has represented Surrey Youths and Middlesex F.A. and is a professional soccer coach. Was 1993/94 season's top scorer with 26 goals.

**STEVE DARLINGTON** (Forward) First made his mark with Hounslow where he stayed until the merger with Feltham. Also helped West London Schools to the last eight of the English Schools F.A. Cup. Subsequently played for Chalfont St. Peter and then Windsor & Eton. Joined Staines in January 1994 and is a favourite with the Wheatsheaf Lane crowd. Recently called into the Diadora League Representative squad.

PHIL GRAINGER (Forward) Originally joined the club on a month's loan from Sutton United after having loan spells with Yeading and Purfleet also last season. However, he had made his name as a prolific scorer in Dorking's promotion side the previous season. Began his career with Goole Town, Hull City and Winterton Rangers and has represented both English and British Universities.

MARTYN LATHAM (Defender/Midfield) After playing for the Under 18 (Sunday) side progressed through the Youth and Reserve sides and by 1991 was a regular member of the First team. Has a Middlesex Senior Cup winners medal and has also played for Kingsbury Town, Camberley Town and Walton & Hersham whom whence he returned to Staines in October 93. Has Middlesex County honours

**STEVE LIVEY** (Defender) Has played for a host of clubs including Wimbledon, Addlestone, Kingstonian, Egham and Leatherhead and is now in his second spell at Wheatsheaf Lane which started in 1990. Has represented Middlesex F.A.

**PAUL LUCAS** (Defence) Signed in December 1993 from Egham Town where he helped the club reach the Surrey Senior Cup and Loctite Trophy Finals in 1991/2. Has previously played for Cobham, Feltham and Hampton and gained both cup winner's medals with Staines last season.

#### The Staines Town Players

**ANDREW MORRIS** (Centre Back) A key member of last season's successful Youth side. Joined the club in 1991/92. Added to the Reserve team squad in 93/4 and made his First Team debut in September 1994.

JOE 0'SHEA (Midfield) Joined Staines as a junior in 1982 and remained until 1988/9. He then moved on and around a variety of Middlesex and Surrey clubs before returning to Wheatsheaf Lane with manager Chris Wainwright in July 1993. Also works with the Club's Junior Sixes' soccer youth development.

**TRENT PHILLIPS** (Goalkeeper) Signed from Walton & Hersham this season after being a regular in Walton promotion side last term. Began with Staines as a junior in 1985 and had a season with Camberley Town in 1989/90. Has also played in the SE Counties League for Fulham.

**CRAIG REILLY** (Midfield) Played Youth football for Fulham and last season captained the Staines Town Youth Team. Has gained a Middlesex County Youth FA 'cap' and featured in the two Staines Middlesex County finals last season.

**DEREK WALTERS** (Left back) Began as a Staines Town youth player back in 1984 but moved firstly to Egham then on to Windsor. Joined Farnborough and helped them re-gain their Conference status before returning to Staines in January of this year.

CHRIS WHEATLEY (Centre-half) Started his career with Staines and was a member of the Middlesex Youth Cup final side, at which time he also represented the county under-18 side. He moved on to Slough Town and then Egham Town where he was captain, as well as being "Player of the Year" and a Surrey Senior Cup Finalist. he moved on to Walton & Hersham and returned to Wheatsheaf Lane in July 1993.

JIM WILLIAMS (Forward/Midfield) Another graduate of the 1988 Egham Town Youth side who during his two years at the club progressed to the First Team. He then played for Bedfont in the Parasol League. Joined Staines in July 1993.

CHRIS WAINWRIGHT (Manager) Joined the Club in May 1993 having previously been in charge at Egham and Walton & Hersham. Previously as a player, he counted Bohemians in Ireland amongst his clubs. Started his playing days at Staines and was the first Club player to sign a contract with the club. He is ably assisted by KEITH BRISTOW and has JUG STEPHEN as his trainer.

#### THE DIADORA FOOTBALL LEAGUE

This is the Ninetieth season of The Diadora Football League as we know it today and although it cannot claim to be the oldest competitive competition in the land it certainly can claim to be one of the most innovative. Originally formed for the 1905/6 season, three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of Ilford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon.' Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss he subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives of the six clubs present - London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaird as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

Much had been made in those far off days of the re-birth of the modern Olympics in Athens in 1896 and as such Greek names were very much the "in thing", thus Isthmian with its Greek connotations became the name of was to become the senior amateur league in the South of England. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 87 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions. The latest clubs to be welcomed are Canvey Island already assured of promotion in their inaugural season along with Bedford Town who shortly after these notes were written may have accompanied them into Division Two for next season. Slough Town returned after several seasons in the GM Vauxhall Conference and have challenged strongly for the Championship. The League can boast of three clubs who have gone on to Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Premiership club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and stayed until 1964. The former Maidstone United were also members between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers are now in the Football League Division Two only seven years after leaving our ranks.

The Isthmian League under the Chairmanship of Barry East first embraced professionalism and sponsorship in the early 70's and was the first league to award three points for a win. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the League from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed six years of that sponsorship agreements which at the time was the longest running sponsorship in football.

The league is now completing its term of a sponsorship agreement with Diadora UK which has seen the Italian Sportswear Company gain a share of the UK market and become a high profile advertiser on sports grounds around the country. It was noticeable in the last World Cup that several of the competing countries had chosen the Diadora strip for their players and Company have expressed much satisfaction in the way the Sponsorship has been conducted over the four year term.

During the past decade the league has emerged from the "amateur" tag that it previously had, and now plays a full part each year in the pyramid of football where it provides clubs with both a platform to rise from, and in the case of the clubs at a lower level, a target of membership to aim at. Stevenage at the start of the season were the eighth club to rise to the GM Vauxhall Conference through the lsthmian League as part of the F.A. pyramid system following in the footsteps of Sutton Utd, Wycombe Wanderers, Famborough Tn, Yeovil Tn, Slough Tn, Redbridge Forest and Woking. They have had a most successful season in the Conference and a top five position looks a likely outcome of their first campaign. Other member clubs Dagenham and Enfield have also been members of that competition but not by way of promotion.

In recent years, member clubs Dagenham and Bishop's Stortford won the F.A. Trophy whilst Sutton United were runners-up. Southall reached the Final of the F.A. Challenge Vase, and Yeading went one step better and won the competition in 1990. Next Saturday we hope to add to that tally with Oxford City becoming the third Club whilst in membership of the League to appear in a F.A. Challenge Vase Final with is now sponsored by Carlsberg.
