

The League Cup, 20 years old - next season

It seems strange now to consider that for the majority of its eighty-eight year history the league has been conducted without a cup competition. In fact as the records shown on the facing page prove, the league cup in one form or another has only been a reality for the last nineteen seasons. In fact for the same majority of its history, there were no awards at all presented in the Isthmian League. In fact the league's motto was "*Honor Sufficit*", which although I am no Latin scholar, suggests that the honour of playing in the Isthmian League was just reward for the clubs and their players. However, as the league expanded it was considered appropriate and now forms an integral part of the season.

The league cup's origins lay in the formation of the Second Division of the then Rothmans Isthmian League when in the 1974/5 season there were just eighteen clubs, and therefore a little bit short on fixtures. It was first named "The Subsidiary Cup" and was played for just between the division two clubs and Tilbury beat Croydon on a two legged final. Strangely enough the two clubs were to battle out the championship of division two the following season with both achieving promotion - Tilbury as champions and Croydon without losing a match.

The competition was opened up the following season to division one clubs, but on the basis of entering if they wished to. By 1976/77 the entry had become compulsory and Hendon were the first winners on this basis, beating the Barking side that was beginning to blossom, and which would take the league championship two years later, with players like the legendary Noel Ashford within their ranks.

For the 1977/78 season the competition was to first attract a sponsor, who in fact stayed for eight seasons. It was the time of the "Japanese Invasion" and electrical giants Hitachi, always keen to be seen to be supportive of our national game lent their name. Dagenham beat Leatherhead in the final at Dulwich 1-0, and the programme which is probably still obtainable shows a Leatherhead team line-up, but the other column is just rows of dots with the heading of Dagenham or Hertford Town - the two sides taking several matches to sort out their semi-final.

The magical Leytonstone Ilford side that swept all before them in 1981/2 made the Hitachi Cup one of their conquests with a 2-0 win over Kingstonian at Boreham Wood on their way to being named "Rothmans Non-League Team of the Year". They also won the league championship and both Essex & London Senior Cups that year.

It was very much the time of the "super teams" for in the next four years Sutton United won the competition three times and Wycombe Wanderers once. The first of Sutton's wins in 1983 heralded the move back to the "double header" final. By the end of the four year period, the sponsor had changed as well. the cup was now known as the AC Delco Cup and formed part of the Vauxhall Motors sponsorship.

Traditionally a Southern League club, Yeovil Town had opted to join the Isthmian ranks upon their demise from the Gola League and for three seasons they were the club that everybody wanted to beat. Not that too many did in 1987/88 as the club did a league and cup "double", culminating in the defeat of Hayes at The Camrose Ground, home of Basingstoke Town.

Proving that favourites can be beaten, Bishop's Stortford beat Farnborough Town the following season and then in 1989/90 the biggest upset of all was Aveley, then in Division Two South 3-0 defeat of Premier Division St. Albans City at Victoria Road Dagenham. Last season Grays Athletic were the supposed "underdogs", again at Dagenham, but it was favourites Enfield who suffered defeat.

THE DIADORA FOOTBALL LEAGUE

The Diadora Football League as we know it today was originally born over 80 years ago when three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of Ilford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon. Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss the subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaird as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

The six clubs that formed the League on that inaugural season were London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 85 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions.

Personalities in those early days were all important, and none more so than Henry Huband who was Hon. Secretary and Treasurer for the first thirty years until 1935 and then President until his death in 1952. In fact, in many Isthmian boardrooms from the older clubs in the competition, his portrait which was presented to clubs after his death still looks out over the modern day running of clubs. During those years, the Isthmian League as far as the South of England was concerned also had a vice-like grip on the Amateur Cup with too many to name winners and finalists drawn from its ranks.

From next season the League will also be able to boast of three clubs who have gone on to embrace Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Premier League club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and were members until 1964. Maidstone United who sadly went out of business at the start of last season, were also members of the Isthmian League between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers will next season be competing in the Football League only six years after leaving our ranks.

The Isthmian League under the then Chairmanship of Barry East first embraced professionalism and sponsorship in the early 70's when Rothmans, Berger Paints and Servovarm all took turns at being the league's main sponsor. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the league from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed two three year sponsorship agreements which were attractive and rewarding for all parties concerned.

The league is now concluding its first two year agreement with the Diadora organisation which has seen the Italian Sportswear Company gain a share of the UK market and become a high profile advertiser on sports grounds around the country. Earlier in the season the league announced a two year extension to the agreement which everyone concerned hopes will be as successful and fulfilling as the last two seasons.

It is during the past decade that the league has emerged from the "amateur" tag that it previously had, and now plays a full part each year in the pyramid of football where it provides clubs with both a platform to rise from, and in the case of the clubs at a lower level, a target of membership to aim at.

In recent years, member club Southall reached the Final of the F.A. Challenge Vase, whilst Yeading went one step better and won the competition in 1990.

Welcome today

Marlow F.C.

Marlow Football Club was founded in 1870 and is naturally proud of its history. They are the only Club never to have missed an entry into the F.A. Cup and in fact contributed towards the cost of the original cup which cost £25. In 1881/82 season they reached the semi-finals of the competition losing out to the eventual winners, Old Etonians, at The Oval by a score of 5-0.

Marlow were a great force in the 1880's reaching the Amateur Cup semi's twice and winning the Berks. & Bucks Senior Cup seven times adding another four victories before the turn of the century.

In 1892, Marlow were one of twelve clubs elected to form the Southern League, but as the league took two years to get going and by then professionalism had spread, they withdrew and joined the Spartan League, allowing Tottenham Hotspur to take their place.

After the Great War and then in the Great Western Suburban League, the Club found themselves homeless as their Crown meadow Ground had been sold and they were forced to move to The Star Meadow. This ground not being enclosed and a lack of funds necessitated a move into local football in the Reading and District League.

Within three seasons the Club had rejoined the Spartan League and won promotion to Division One. Success was not confined to the pitch as in the meantime, a new ground had been purchased and named The Alfred Davis memorial Ground after the Club's much respected former Hon. Secretary and Treasurer.

After a spell in local soccer during the Second World War, Marlow returned to the

Spartan League in 1945 where they played for a further twenty years. They then joined the Athenian league, playing in Division two until 1970/71 season when, despite finishing only third, they secured promotion to Division One.

Marlow joined the Isthmian League in 1984 and saw a dramatic rise in fortunes. Having finished bottom of Division Two South in 1985, the following season they won promotion to Division One and in their first season went on to win the championship.

Having narrowly avoided relegation in their first season in the Premier Division, they have finished the last two seasons in seventh and sixth positions respectively.

Other highlights in this same period were a thrilling 3-2 victory over F.A. Trophy winners Wycombe Wanderers in 1991 in the Berks. & Bucks. Senior Cup Final and a trip to West Bromwich Albion in the First Round of the FA Cup in front of almost 12,000 spectators.

This season has seen inconsistency in the League with the F.A. Cup once again providing the high spot with the Club this time progressing to the Third Round and giving a fine performance before going out to Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane before a crowd of almost 27,000.

The club is sponsored by their local Ford Main Dealers, Platts of Marlow.

Their mascot today is Jermaine Caesar, 7 year old son of striker John. He attends Kingswood First School and plays for Flackwell Heath Under 7's.

GARFIELD BLACKMAN Signed this season with 21 appearances so far. His previous clubs include Northwood and Welwyn Garden City.

PAUL BYRNE Important member of the reserve team over the last two seasons who has progressed into the first team squad. Previously with Flackwell Heath and with 26 appearances to date.

TIM BUZAGLO Just signed from Woking where he spent six seasons and was the club's record goalscorer with over 150 strikes to his credit. Made his debut at Kingstorian and has made six appearances.

JOHN CAESAR A 27 year old signed from neighbours Flackwell Heath and who has made 211 appearances since.

ANTHONY DELL Returned towards the end of last season having been with Slough for two and a half years followed by a short spell with Chesham United. has made 210 appearances since his debut in 1985.

STEVE ELLIS Made his debut in 1983 after progressing through the youth section from the Under 12's. Has made 346 appearances.

PHIL GEORGE First appeared in 1990 after signing from Hayes. His playing experience includes a spell with Hasselt in Belgium. Has made 99 appearances to date.

COLIN FERGUSON 25 year old whose previous clubs were Reading, Maidenhead and seven years with Burnham. Made Marlow debut at Hendon. 39 appearances to date.

KENNY GLASGOW Has made 189 appearances since his debut in 1986. Resigned from neighbours Flackwell Heath last season.

AL-JAMES HANNIGAN In his second season at the club. A former professional with Arsenal. Has played for Torquay and represented Northern Ireland at Under 17 and 19 levels. Has made 101 appearances.

STEVE HOLMES Recent signing who has 18 appearances to date. Previously with Blackburn Rovers as an apprentice and Enfield.

BILLY HUBBICK Made his debut at 17 in 1977 before spells with Maidenhead Town and Wycombe Wanderers. Returned at the start of the 1986/87 season and has appeared 394 times to date.

DAVID LAY A former Reading apprentice who made his debut in 1987 after signing from Dunstable. Has made 324 appearances to date. Gained league representative honours in both the last two seasons.

BRIAN McDERMOTT Recent signing who has wide experience from his time at Arsenal, Exeter, Oxford, Yeovil Town and in Hong Kong. Has made six appearances so far.

KEVIN MITCHELL Signed this season from Windsor & Eton where he made over 600 appearances. Has represented the F.A. and also played at Woking, Reading and Slough. Has made 12 appearances so far.

RICHARD MIKURENDA Joined from Wycombe Wanderers and made his debut in 1990 since when he has made 132 appearances.

JOHN REGAN the club's first ever purchase when joining from Hounslow in 1989. Has also played for Wycombe Wanderers and Chalfont St. Peter and has made 207 appearances to date.

MARK WATKINS After spells with Harrow Borough, St. Albans and Tring Town, he signed in 1989. Has represented the Herts. F.A. and Diadora League and has made 220 appearances since.

Welcome today

Molesey F.C.

Molesey Football Club, formed in 1953 are celebrating their 40th. anniversary this year and are doing so in the best possible way. Not only have they reached the Final of this afternoon's Diadora League Cup competition, but also they have achieved promotion to the Premier Division for next season. In fact, these notes were compiled before Saturday's game, but the league tables elsewhere in this programme may show Molesey as the Division One champions for the 1992/93 season.

the club was originally known as Molesey St. Pauls United and started their life in the Surrey Intermediate . League before achieving senior status and joining the prestigious Surrey Senior League within a couple of years. Winners of the league title in 1958, Molesey gained acceptance into the Spartan League in 1959 and were immediately runners-up in both the league and league cup competitions.

They won the league cup in 1961 and 1962 although the league title continued to elude them. They then endured a lean spell only broken by an appearance in the Surrey Senior Cup semi-final against Sutton in 1966 when over 1200 watched them.

The club underwent a change of management after appearing in the Spartan League Cup Final of 1972 where they were defeated by Bracknell Town, and it was the new incumbent John Sullivan who built the foundations for their successful future.

They entered the Athenian League in 1972 and reached the final of the Surrey Senior Shield in 1975 with a side that included amongst others, Cyrille Regis, although the fans favourite at the time was Frank Hanley

who made a club record 453 appearances for them.

In 1977 Molesey became founder members of the Isthmian League Division Two and after several years of non-achievement the club reached the FA Vase sixth round under the guiding hand of Peter Howell as team boss.

The club's future looked in doubt as recently as 1987 when debts of some £25,000 were reported to members. There were changes at the club on the committee side, led by Gary Mayne who was responsible for bringing in current football chairman, Martin Eede as manager. His efforts have been phenomenal, and not only has the club improved financially, but they have also improved in their status. Rising to Division One of this league in 1990, they also won their first trophy in 30 years - the Southern Combination Cup.

Together Eede and Mayne are still the driving forces behind the club and last season Tony Dunne was appointed as Team Manager, quickly taking the club to the Loctite Cup (Now Full Members Cup) semi-final, which co-incidentally included a win over Enfield - strange how history repeated itself this season.

The club now has a commercial manager (Ray Best) who is determined that the club should be accepted by the local community. He has been helped in this direction by Nick De Felice proprietor of the local De Felice's Wine Bar.

The clubs sponsors are Ivy Express whom it is hoped will continue with the club for a third season next term.

The Molesey Players

DAVID BRACE (Goalkeeper) Previously with Walton Casuals and Fulham. Member of the side promoted from Division Two in 1990. Has now made over 200 appearances for the club.

ROBBIE WINTERHALTER (Defender) Classy player who is at home anywhere along the back four. Previously at Hampton, Walton & Hersham and Epsom & Ewell. Has scored more than 25 times during his 170 plus appearances. Rejoined the club in August 1992.

TONY BOORMAN (Defender) Ex Grays Athletic, Whyteleafe and Croydon. Experienced player with a great left foot. Has added vital balance to the back four since joining this season. His passing ability is matched by few at the club.

ROGER WORRALL (Defender) Team skipper and a great asset to any side. Has excellent aerial power for one so small. Supporters Player of the Year for 91/2. Ex Croydon player.

DAVE PATULLO (Defender) Promising player who has settled in well after being "found" in junior football. Has been one of Tony Dunne's inspired signings.

SEAN RICE (Midfield or Striker) Strong lad who shows great strength on the ball. Capable of scoring vital goals wherever he plays. Has made over 100 appearances for the club and has previously played for Ditton and Hampton.

DAVE RATTUE (Midfield) Tough tackling ball winner who has played in the past for Hampton and Whyteleafe. Generally found in the centre of midfield where he has a creative role. Now in his second spell at the club where he has played over 100 times.

MICKY ROSE (Striker) The club's record goalscorer with over 120 goals in 300 appearances. Joined Molesey in 1986 and has twice broken the seasonal goal scoring record set by the legendary Cyrille Regis in 1974/5. This ex- Leatherhead, Crawley and Carshalton player is currently averaging a goal every two games this season.

NEIL PEARSON (Striker) One of the club's outstanding players this season where at this level he has struck over 20 goals and forged a good partnership with Rose. Scored on his full debut and has a good all round game.

CLIVE GARTELL (Midfield) Now in his second spell at the club, he is a skilful player with two good feet. His tackling has improved this season and is a great creator. Has also played for Epsom and Dulwich and in a previous spell at the club was the team skipper.

PAUL ADAMS (Midfield) Ex Sutton player who joined the club at the start of the season. Now fully recovered after a nasty injury he will again be able to display the class that was beginning to blossom prior to it. Is pushing strongly for a first team spot.

BEN PENFOLD (Midfield) Local lad who has proved to be a vital part of the clubs successes this season. Has made over 50 appearances for Molesey and is powerful in aspects of the game. Can shoot with either foot and progressed to the first team via the clubs social and reserve teams.

STEVE BARWICK (Midfield or Striker) Another of the reserve team who has performed well in first team matches. This former Epsom & Ewell player is very well built with good skills and a good character.

GARY WILGOSS (Midfield) ex-Dulwich hamlet and Carshalton Athletic player who has a great passing ability. Joined the club in January 1993 and scored on his debut at Chalfont St. Peter.

NEIL HOPKINS (Defender) Ex-Sutton United player who lost his place at Molesey due to injury. Has shown lots of character in the reserve team and remains a vital member of the squad. Has played Conference football and is a dominating figure both on the ground and in the air.

PAUL MCKAY (Midfield or Striker) Talented young left sided player who has performed well on the occasions he has been selected. A bright prospect for the future.

TREVOR MCCOY (Midfield or Striker) Tricky player who loves to take opponents on. Has scored eight times for the first team this season, but injuries have restricted his opportunities.
