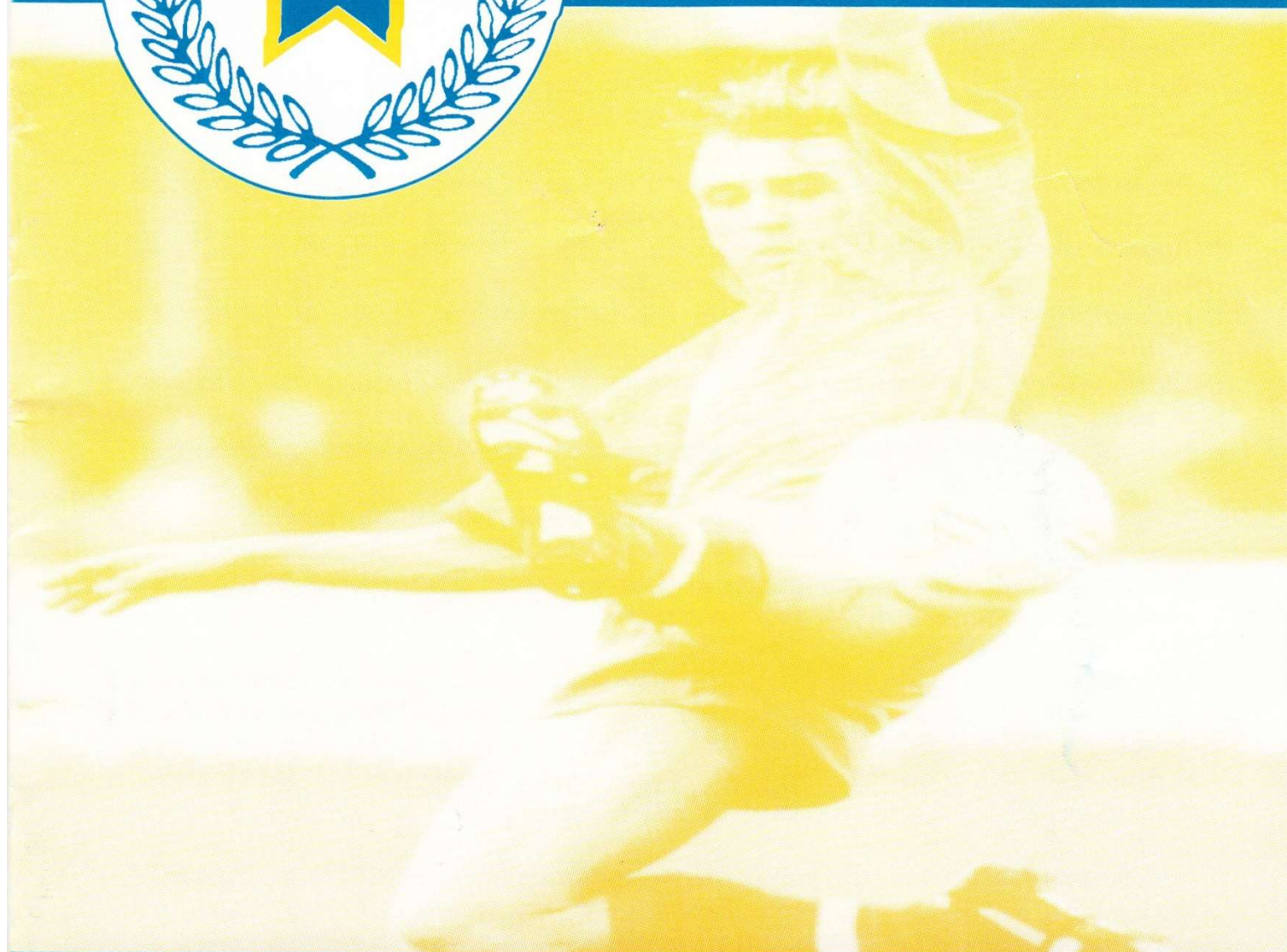

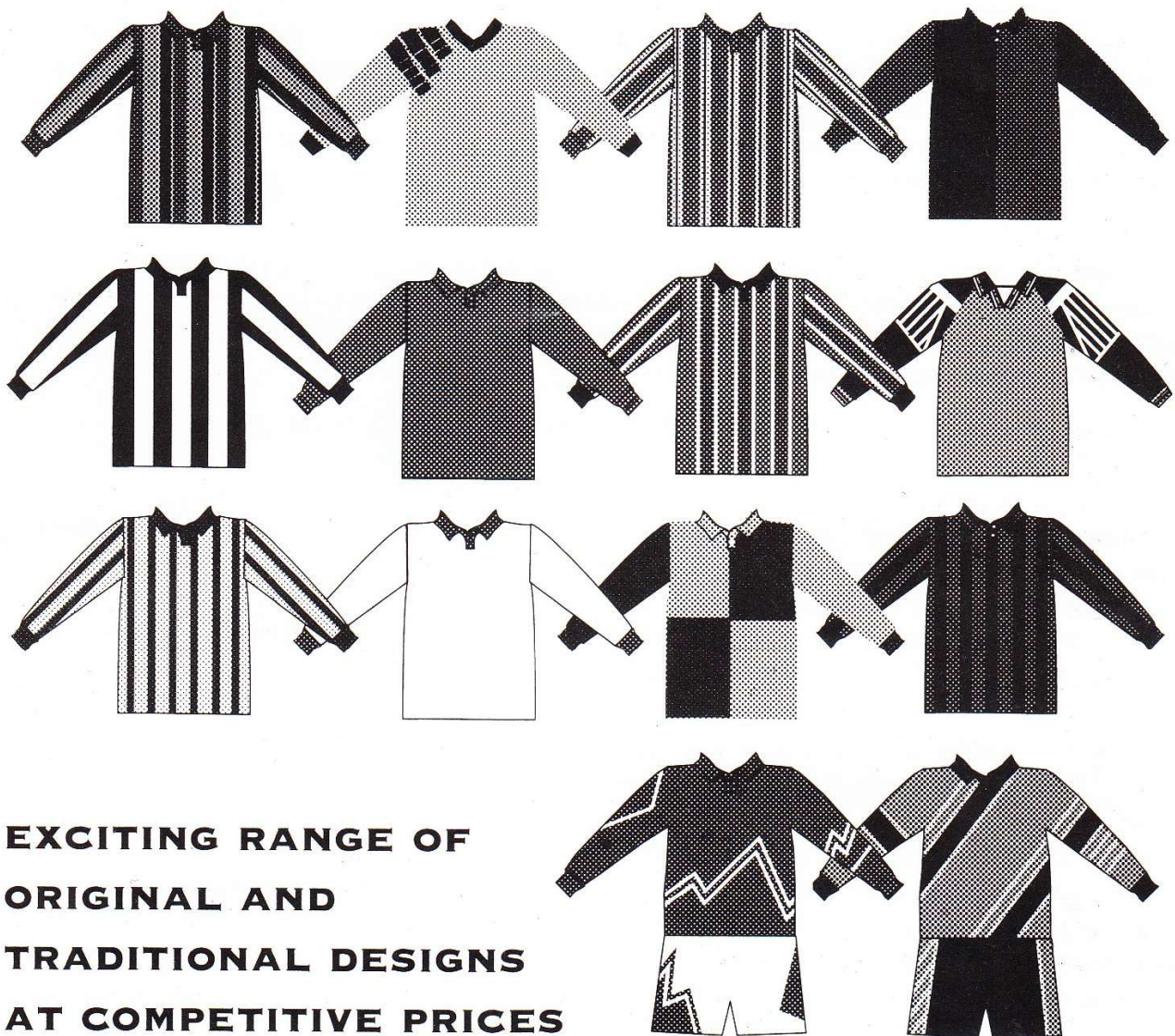

THE ICIS FOOTBALL LEAGUE

This is the Ninety-first season of The ICIS Football League as we know it today and although it cannot claim to be the oldest competitive competition in the land it certainly can claim to be one of the most innovative. Originally formed for the 1905/6 season, three men of vision saw the need in the London area for a really strong amateur league. Those men, Tom Kirkup, for many years Secretary of the London F.A., George Clarke, Hon. Treasurer of Ilford F.C. and Frank Evans, Hon. Secretary of Clapton F.C. met and sent out invitations to six clubs to attend a meeting at the Winchester Hotel in Old Broad Street to informally discuss the subject.

The meeting met with enthusiasm and soon the representatives of the six clubs present - London Caledonians, Clapton, The Casuals, Civil Service, Ealing and Ilford had persuaded their committees of the value of such a competition. The late Harry Huband was approached to become Hon. Secretary and the Isthmian League was officially formed on March 8th. 1905 with Lord Kinnaid as President and Percy Timbs as Chairman.

Much had been made in those far off days of the re-birth of the modern Olympics in Athens in 1896 and as such Greek names were very much the "in thing", thus Isthmian with its Greek connotations became the name of what was to become the senior amateur league in the South of England. London Caledonians were the first winners and Clapton were runners-up. It wasn't long before the League started an expansion programme which in due course led to the 87 club set-up of the present season in four separate divisions. The latest clubs to be welcomed is Wealdstone although it is more a case of welcoming them back. Having been members in the sixties they became professional, when there was still a distinction between amateur and professional and progressed to the top of the Conference and completing a double by also winning the FA Trophy - they turned to the ICIS League this season to assist them in re-building their future after a difficult period and have had a successful season in Division Three, whether or not they gained promotion would have been determined after these notes were penned.

The League can boast of three clubs who have gone on to Football League membership. Wimbledon now in fact a Carling Premiership club joined the Isthmian ranks in 1921 and stayed until 1964. The former Maidstone United were also members between 1959 and 1971 and of course Wycombe Wanderers are now in the Football League Division Two only eight years after leaving our ranks. Many clubs who leave this competition also find that they have had a sounding grounding within our ranks for development as witnessed this season, with Stevenage Borough and Woking heading the Vauxhall Conference, in both cases but for different reasons so close yet so far from the Endsleigh League.

Professionalism and sponsorship was first embraced in the early 70's and we were the first league to award three points for a win. During the 1980's the present management structure under the guiding hand of present Chairman and Managing Director Alan Turvey transformed the League from two to four divisions and the highly successful sponsorship of Vauxhall Motors was obtained. The league enjoyed six years of that sponsorship agreements That was followed by four seasons of sponsorship by Diadora UK. Now we have completed the first season of our term with ICIS and with Guardian Insurance as our League Cup sponsors Carlton UK Television have also sponsored our two subsidiary cups to be played later this week. We trust that our new sponsors have been suitably impressed so far.

ALDERSHOT TOWN

Aldershot Town began life in the third division of the Diadora League in August 1992, a remarkable achievement considering that the Football League club, Aldershot F.C., were only wound up in the High Court with huge debts on the 25th. March of the same year.

Terry Owens now the clubs chairman together with the Supporters Club, and other individuals determined that Aldershot would keep senior football

in the town, reformed the club at its original home, The Recreation Ground.

The support the club received in the first season was remarkable, with an average home gate of well over 2,000 and a crowd of almost 6,000 for a Hampshire Senior Cup game against Farnborough Town. The first season saw the Third Division Championship won by eighteen points, and a further promotion followed in 1993/94 by finishing third in Division Two. In 1994/95 expectation was high as a terrific end of season run, saw the Shots miss out on goal difference on the last game of the season to Chertsey Town for promotion.

This season has given former Nottingham Forest winger Steve Wigley his first full season as Manager and once again the Shots have been challenging for the promotion places to bring Premier Division football to the Recreation Ground.

Today's Guardian Insurance Cup Final was reached by defeating four Premier Division clubs, Chertsey Town, Boreham Wood, Grays Athletic and Hitchin Town 3-0 on aggregate in the semi-final. Aldershot Town also operate a reserve team in the Suburban League Premier Division and they have reached the final of the Challenge Shield Cup against Slough Town.

Aldershot will be keen to end the season on a high note today to give their large following a major trophy, and to avenge a 4-0 defeat that Kingstonian enjoyed at the Recreation Ground in the 1993/94 season, which remains as the Club's record home defeat.

● **Mark Watson** (Goalkeeper) Signed from Camberley in November 1992 for £1,000. Mark regained his first team place under Steve Wigley and is now first choice. His previous clubs include Reading and Southampton

● **Tony Cleeve** (Defender/Midfield) Rejoined in July 1995 from Basingstoke Tn for £3,500 having left in 94/5 due to not having a regular slot. An attacking right sided player at home in defence or midfield.

● **Andy Nunn** (Defender/Midfield) Joined "The Shots" in October 1992 and quickly became a firm favourite with the Recreation Ground crowd. Returned to the side last season following injury. Previously with Farnham and Wokingham

● **Stuart Udall** (Defender) Versatile performer who established himself in the centre of defence last season where he won both supporters and players, Player of the Year awards. Joined in 1992 from Ash United.

● **Paul Chambers** (Defender) Signed from Basingstoke for a club record £5,000 at the start of 1994/95. Is currently the Club Captain. previously at Plymouth, Bristol R. and Torquay.

● **Andy Russell** (Defender) Dominating player who joined at the start of 94/5 from Kingstonian for £1,500. Was a member of the Woking side in the early 1990's.

● **Simon Turner** (Defender) Signed from Oxford Utd at the start of 94/5. Originally a central defender, he made the right back slot his own at the end of last season.

● **Jason Chewins** (Defender) Competent player who missed the start of the season through injury. Former Basingstoke and Wealdstone players who recently completed 50 appearances for "The Shots"

● **Dave Osgood** (Midfield) Played in Aldershot Town's first game in August 1992, Dave has made his name with his tough tackling and weighing in with some vital goals from midfield. Previously with Farnborough, Windsor & Eton, Burnham and Maidenhead.

● **Nick Burton** (Defender/Midfield) Signed

in February from Yeovil Town. A transfer target of the Manager for over a year. A former apprentice who went on to make 16 League appearances for Torquay. A versatile player who can play anywhere in defence or midfield.

● **Danny Holmes** (Midfield) Energetic player who started at Middlesborough on a two year YTS course where he appeared in an FA Youth Cup Final. Moves to Bournemouth and Farnborough followed before joining "The Shots" in 1993.

● **Jamie Horton** (Midfield) Skilful player signed last December from Farnborough where he played 350 times for the Conference club. Previously played in local league football.

● **Andy Parr** (Midfield) Former England Schoolboy and West Ham apprentice. Joined from Newbury Town last September. Also had spells at Farnborough, Marlow, Woking and Kingstonian.

● **Neil Musgrove** (Forward) Young player who regularly scored for the reserves after being released by Northampton last year.

● **Asa Head** (Midfield) Forced his way into the first team last season after impressing in the reserves. Local lad who joined from Ash United.

● **Mark Butler** (Forward) Has been at Aldershot since playing in their first match in 1992 where he scored in that match. Has been a consistent striker ever since and last scorer notched 33. A big favourite with supporters, he has previously played for Egham, Wycombe Wanderers and Chesham United.

● **Roy Young** (Forward) Joined from Poole Town for £2,000 last season. Also appeared last season for Stockport County after being released by Portsmouth. Pacey young player who scored eight times in eight appearances.

● **Jeff Wood** (Forward) Signed from Barking in November 1995. Has been a prolific scorer throughout his career and scored 46 for Barking in 1994/95. Previously with West Ham, Crawley, Bishop's Stortford, Harlow and Purfleet. Now a firm favourite with fans at "The Rec".

Not always a regular.....

It is quite possible that this afternoons attendance at the Guardian Insurance Cup Final will attract the best "gate" of the season, not only here at The Recreation Ground, but in the ICIS League as a whole, not bad for a competition that before the 1974/75 season did not even exist. In that now seemingly far off age, the Isthmian League existed purely on its League fixtures, and in fact they had only just gone from one division to two. It was this expansion of the Isthmian League that in fact brought about the birth of the then "Subsidiary Cup" for teams in Division Two (Now Division One) as there were only eighteen sides in the division at the time. Division One (Premier) clubs did not enter the competition. As can be seen from the list of finalists elsewhere, Tilbury were the first winners.

The following season the competition was opened up to all clubs, and a year later, became compulsory. Hendon were the first winners on that basis beating a Barking side that under Eddie McCluskey would a couple of years later be League Champions with, amongst others, current Boreham Wood boss Bob Makin and the legendary Noel Ashford amongst their ranks.

Moving into the 1980's and Kingstonian's only previous appearance in the Final. K's came up against Leytonstone Ilford in the 1981/82 season. From Kingstonian's point of view they could have wished for any any of the other clubs in the League rather than John Still's side who had just been "crowned league champions" and were also in the process of winning both the Essex and London Senior Cups. That side was a who's who of football and Kingstonian did extremely well to keep the score down to 0-2.

The eighties were very much the time of the "super clubs" Sutton United won the competition three times and Wycombe Wanderers once. Sutton's first win co-incided with the final being played on a two legged basis. By the end of Sutton's dominance, the cup had become the AC Delco Cup and was back to a single match.

Yeovil Town completed a league and cup "double" in 1988 whilst a couple of years later the first big upset occurred with then Division Two South side, Aveley beating St. Albans at Dagenham.

Aldershot's first involvement with the Final was in 1993 when they staged the Final here at the Recreation Ground with almost 1,000 watching Marlow beat Molesey. Chertsey Town now a Premier Division side were the next club to complete a major upset. In the 1993/94 Final played at Hayes they ran rings around Enfield and finished up winning 3-0 - they were terrific value for their win as well, the result probably went a long way towards E's manager Graham Roberts parting company with the club at the end of the season.

Last year we had high drama of penalties with Aylesbury United running out 7-6 winners after the shoot out against Conference bound Slough Town. 90 minutes and extra time had only managed to produce a 1-1 draw

Kingstonian FC can trace their history back to 1885 when Kingston & Surbiton YMCA FC was formed. Having then called themselves "Saxons FC" they then adopted the title Kingston Wanderers in 1891. By the time honours first arrived at the club in the form of the championship of the local league, they were known as Kingston-Upon-Thames.

The "split" in amateur football in 1908 led to two clubs serving the area - Kingston Town, and Old Kingstonians, of

which the latter was the more successful, winning the County Cup in 1910/11 and 1913/14.

Due to the efforts of local sportsman Pat Sheehy the two clubs merged on 28th. May 1919 to become Kingstonian F.C. playing the 1919/20 season in the Athenian League. After finishing eighth, they had two poor seasons, but did entertain the FA Cup holders Huddersfield Town in a friendly with the professionals fielding eight of the winning side - Kingstonians won 1-0 in front of 8,000 on the old Richmond Road ground.

Fortunes soon turned for Kingstonian with the Athenian League championship won in 1923/24 and two years later the success was repeated. In 1926/27 they finished runners-up and accepted an invitation to join the Isthmian ranks two years later.

Kingstonian started off their Isthmian career on 31st. August 1929 with a 3-1 home win over Nunhead and finished the season in third spot. Their first isthmian title came in 1933/34, a feat they repeated in 1936/7. That however, has been the sum total of championship victories for the Surrey club to date, but they did come near in 1947/48 when the late Ted Croker (former FA Secretary) played as a half back and they finished as runners-up. At the other end of the table, relegation which was introduced at the end of the 1973/74 season overtook "K's" in 1978/79. They spent six years at the lower level but since being promoted at the end of 1984/85 have remained in the top level of the league ever since.

The FA Cup was first entered in 1926/27, but it was not until 1932/33 that they faced Football League opposition with a visit to Luton Town. Sixty years later Peterborough United visited the new Kingsmeadow Stadium and in front of 3,826 spectators, Kingstonian's drew 1-1. K's eventually lost the tie in a replayed match behind closed doors at London Road, Peterborough 1-0 - the first replay had been declared void with "Posh" having won 9-1 - a missile had hit 'keeper Adrian Blake and the FA ordered a replay.

There were 30,000 however, watching Kingstonian as they played their first Amateur Cup semi-final against Dulwich at Selhurst park in 1931/32 - they lost 0-1 but gained revenge the following season, as Dulwich were one of the sides beaten on their way to the final. In that final Kingstonian met Stockton and the match resulted in a 1-1 draw. The replay at Darlington was won 4-1. The biggest crowd ever to watch at Kingstonian match was the 1960 Amateur Cup Final at Wembley against Hendon when 60,000 saw K's go down 2-1, despite leading three minutes from time.

A Football League side was beaten in the FA Cup last season - the club was Brighton & Hove Albion and the season was to prove to be a quite successful for the club in cups with the club having a good run in the FA Trophy before going out to the eventual finalists Kidderminster Harriers

Eddie Akuamoah Recently graduated , with a degree in Politics and Economics. Signed from Carshalton in 1993, a fast and tricky forward equally at home on the wing or down the middle. He has a number of Endsleigh League sides constantly watching him.

Phil Barton Experienced full back, signed two seasons ago from Sutton United. Previous clubs include Everton and Bath City.

Jimmy Bolton A prolific goalscorer, who joined the club from Carshalton Athletic where he played for several seasons. Has been one of the league's leading scorers on several occasions and has previously played for Farnborough Town. Was a Youth Team player at Spurs and is an England Semi-Pro. International.

Danny Brooker A gifted young midfielder signed from Sutton in the middle of last season. Danny is an asset to the side and shows great potential

Colin Luckett Young full back released by Millwall. A good defender who likes to get forward and join in with attacks.

John Finch Signed from Fulham. A central defender who has outstanding pace and likes to bring the ball out from the back. Has made over 140 appearances with the Club.

Andy Fisher A defender who joined from Carshalton Athletic where he spent one season. He was previously Captain at Dulwich Hamlet and has also played for Molesey, Dorking and Leatherhead.

Dale Jasper An experienced midfielder who has played for Chelsea, Brighton and Crewe, gaining promotion with each of them. More recently Dale was with Crawley Town.

Darren Annon Skilful winger signed from Brentford this season. Previously with Carshalton Athletic.

Richard Morgan Young goalkeeper who has progressed through the Reserves and Youth team at Carshalton where he also played in a number of first team games.

Matt Elverson A Defender or Midfield player who progressed through the Youth and Reserve ranks at Walton & Hersham to make a number of first team appearances. A new signing to the K's this season.

Gavin Nebbeling Central Defender with a wealth of experience having played for Preston, Fulham and Crystal Palace. Gavin's ability has added greatly to the side. He is now player/coach

Andy Riley Defender recently signed from Carshalton where he was Club captain. Previously with Leatherhead and Whyteleafe.

Dave Root Goalkeeper signed last season from Hendon. Dave has played for Launceston, Barking and Walthamstow Avenue and has represented the League.

David Stevens Another signing from Carshalton, David is a former England Youth International who has captained the England Under 19 side. He plays at right back.

Jon Warden Very experienced player who is a midfielder and was one of Carshalton's longest serving players. Jon has also played for Croydon and Tooting & Mitcham.

Curtis Warmington This defender is a former West Ham youth team player who joined K's from Walton & Hersham where he spent the 1994/95 season. Has previously played for Hendon, Thames Polytechnic, Dulwich Hamlet, Yeovil Town, Carshalton Athletic and Enfield.

David Jones Strong running midfield player signed from Sutton United this season. His previous clubs include Walton & Hersham and Epsom & Ewell.
