Croydon Amateurs FC was founded on 17th April 1953 to provide senior amateur football in the then County Borough at the newly built Croydon Sports Arena in South Norwood. Whilst the idea for a senior club carrying the town's name had been mooted prior to the war, nothing had become of the suggestion and the catalyst proved to be the laying of the running track and the need for the football pitch to be used.

The Club's founder Chairman was Jack Milsted and he retained the position until retiring in 1990. At the time of its inception, the club had nothing but goodwill and its initial funding was by way of public donations. The Surrey Senior League was specially extended to enable the fledgling club to have somewhere to compete and ten years were spent in that competition. The official ground opening was against Pegasus, the FA Amateur Cup holders, and during that maiden season, the Club reached both the County League Cup and Charity Cup finals playing against Dorking in both games. Dorking won the League Cup, but the Charity Cup was shared in front of a record 1600 crowd at the Arena. During the next nine seasons, the Club won both League and Charity Cups, and also finished runners-up in the League on a number of occasions, but they were unable to win the Championship.

1963/64 saw the Club elected to the Spartan League where they were destined to spend just a single season. But what a season it turned out to be! They won their first League Championship, winning 29 of their 34 League fixtures, and scoring 134 goals in the process. The original clubhouse was also erected during this campaign having been obtained from a local building site and rebuilt at the Arena.

Amateur football was undergoing changes during this period and the opportunity came for further advancement at the end of that campaign to the Athenian League. Within two seasons, the Second Division Championship had been won and promotion gained to the First Division where four seasons were spent. Unfortunately, the momentum that had sustained the clubs since its formation was lost, and relegation back to Division Two came in 1969-70.

Summer 1970 saw the installation of floodlights and the arrival of South London bookmaker Jimmy Rose as team manager, which proved to be a watershed in the Club's fortunes. Two successive promotions saw the Amateurs rise to the Athenian League Premier Division but at the end of the 1971-72 campaign, Rose announced that he would be taking over as team manager of Dulwich Hamlet inevitably, a season of struggle ensued in the Premier Division, with the majority of the previous season's first team departing to either Dulwich or Tooting.

With the impending end of amateur status, the club dropped its suffix during the summer of 1975 - it was only due to a Surrey Intermediate League side having the title Croydon FC back in 1953 that it had to be added in the first place. The end of October 1975 and with the club in the neither regions of the reorganised Athenian League First Division - the Tedsians had introduced a second division that year - Ted Shepherd took over as manager, introduced a much more professional attitude and thus began one of the most successful periods in the Club's history.

After struggling early in the first two months of the season, Croydon revived and finished sixth, ending it by

being elected to the Isthmian League Second Division. Founder Secretary George Burrows decided to call it a day at this point being replaced by former first team captain Jim Overall.

Their maiden season at the higher level started poorly, but the team gradually evolved and results picked up, culminating in an appearance in the inaugural Isthmian League Cup Final. However, at this stage, it was restricted to Second Division clubs - Tilbury winning the two-legged final.

1975-76 proved to be a history making season as the Club went the whole season undefeated in the League. Forty-two games and yet, Tilbury piped them for the championship. It was only the second time in the

believed to be arson for which the culprits were never caught.

The departure of Ted Shepherd came during a period when the team appeared to have lost its way and he was succeeded by Barry Webb for the 1984-85 campaign and then Adrian Hill (1985-87) who took the club to its highest ever League position - fourth in the Premier Division - in his first season in charge.

It was at this time that things took a turn for the worse. Like many football clubs, money - or rather the lack of it - was the root of the problem and seven seasons of struggle ensued.

During this period, the local authority decided to redevelop the Arena, replacing the eight lane kinder

track with a larger, tartan track - unfortunately, this meant that the pitch was further away from the stand thereby further decreasing the match day atmosphere. It also meant a large number of home fixtures being played away from the Arena with the corresponding loss in revenue.

Founder Chairman Milsted, together with two of the Club's other elder statesmen, Alf Haylock (who had also been involved since 1953) and Club President Charles Walters retired in 1990, and the years that followed under new management culminated in the Club's name being dragged through the gutter and becoming synonymous with all that was bad.

There was little stability either on or off the field. Five Chairmen and eleven team managers, mounting debts and threats of closure are ample evidence of that. It could not have been a happy time to play for the Club. Perhaps the disciplinary record - partly due to the inadequate leadership at the time - is evidence of that.

The nadir was 1993-94 when broken promises concerning money saw the early season team walk out. Joe Fashole took over as manager and produced a team who performed for nothing but fought hard. Again, the mismanagement of the Club caused these players to walk out in frustration. In stepped the current Chairman, Ken Jarvie at the eleventh hour with the players of his Thornton Heath League side, Phoenix Sun, who stepped up nine levels of football to keep the Club's name alive. Not surprisingly, some very heavy defeats followed but the Club survived and gained another place in the annals of the Isthmian League, this time for the most goals conceded.

Summer 1994 saw the fortunes take a turn for the better - and Dickson Gill was appointed to work alongside Ken Jarvie. The initial aim was to put together a team that was capable of holding its own in the Isthmian League Second Division and it finished not too far away from the promotion positions. The Club also reached the Fourth Round of the FA Vase in its maiden season in the competition.

1995-96 saw the Club regain its position back in Division One as runners-up to Canvey Island - a tremendous late run of 13 wins and 2 draws in the last 16 league games sealing the promotion place.

The first two and a half seasons back in the First Division were battles against relegation, but then a 12 match unbeaten run starting in March 1999 saw the club surge up to a final position of 8th, including a new club record of 885 minutes without conceding a goal.

The foundations had been laid and 1999-2000 saw Ken Jarvie's plans come to fruition. Always in contention near the top of the table, a 19 match unbeaten run (another club record) at the beginning of the New Millennium saw Croydon storm to their first league title for 34 years, finishing 9 points ahead of Grays Athletic in 2nd place. In addition, Croydon reached 2 cup finals, for the first time since 1962. Inclement weather meant that both finals had to be played at the end of the season on consecutive nights, and both on the opponents' grounds. A narrow defeat against Conference side Woking in the Surrey Senior Cup Final, was forgotten about the following night as Croydon beat Fulham 2-0 to win the Isthmian League Full Members Cup.

Off the field, a lot of hard work was done to ensure that the Sports Arena gained an A grading, including the building of 2 covered areas of standing accommodation. The social club, run with great efficiency by Club Secretary, Sally Jarvie, is proving popular for local functions, and bringing in vital income. With a well-balanced squad of players, and a great team spirit, everything appears to be in place for a successful return to top-flight Isthmian League football.

The Club also has took one of the county's leading ladies clubs under its wing in 1994 and, not to be outdone by the men, they also completed a FA Women's Premier League, FA Cup and Surrey County Cup treble in 1999-2000, a feat they also achieved in 1995-96.

The youth set-up, too, has been revived - orphaning in the seventies, it had several good runs in the FA Youth Cup, reaching the Fourth Round (last 16) in 1977-78 - only to lose to Peterborough. Many more than usual Isthmian League players have come through this set up and it is again producing a string of players capable of challenging for first team places. Success has been gained in both the Southern Youth League and League Cup over the last five seasons.

Kingsley Banks (Goalkeeper) Now in his sixth season at Scraley Road, Kingsley is the club captain. Began his career as an apprentice at Tottenham Hotspur, before moving into the non-league scene with Dartford. Widely regarded as one of the top keepers outside the Football League, he has also played for Barking, Enfield and Witham Town, as well as a brief spell at Swindon.

Mark Cranfield (Defender) Made his debut in August 1995 against Aldershot Town and since then has been the club's regular right back. Signed from local neighbours Braintree Town, he began his career with Colchester United, before moving on to play for Brightingsea. Can also play in the centre of defence or midfield.

Gary Waters (Defender) Gary joined the Swifts in last September from Canvey Island after two spells with Billerica Town. His first at Billerica ended when he signed for West Ham United but after a couple of years he returned to New Lodge. He is still only 28 and commands a regular place in the side. Only just returned from injury that kept him out of football for 6 weeks.

John Pollard (Midfielder) The return of the local lad this season after two seasons with St. Albans City. John remarks that he has had only two home games in two years (Heybridge v St. Albans) just completed his 3000th game in the Heybridge colours.

Ian Wiles (Defender) Former Colchester youngster who is a solid defender. Ian joined the club at the start of the upturn in results last season. Was one of Liam Cuthbush's/Tony Adcock first signings. Another young player who now commands a regular place in the team.

Adam Gillespie (Midfielder) Has been a loyal player over the last few seasons, has come up through the second team and breaking into the first eleven but unable to command a regular position under previous manager Gary Hill. Since his departure and the departure of Mitchell Springett, Adam has made the centre of midfield position his own.

Dave Streetley (Midfielder) Signed by the club at the start of 1998/99 season and after starting as a striker soon adapted and won a place in the centre of midfield. Almost signed for Colchester United during Roy McDonough spell in charge at Layer Road, he soon became Big Roy's first signing at Scraley Road.

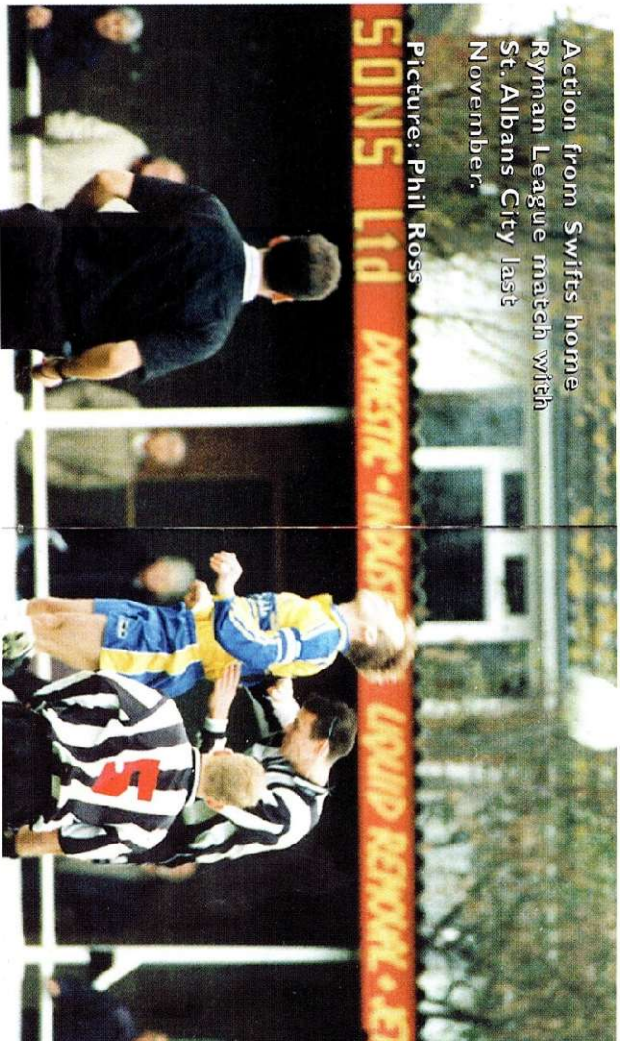
Dave Keyling (Striker) Joined the Swifts from Billerica Town last season. Dave was unfortunate to miss half the last season with a severe throat and chest infection with a long spell in hospital, which he also had his tonsils removed. Dave came back at the

later part of last season and proved he is another talented youngster who is on the brink of challenging for first team squad position this season.

Terry Warwick (Striker) The other half of the Jam Makers goal getters of the 1998/99 season. Started junior football and represented East Anglia at that level, Terry is hoping that he can continue to produce the goods as he did at Tiptree in his last season where he was top scorer in Division One of the Jewson League. Noted game so far is a hat trick in the league cup at Farnborough Town.

Kris Lee (Striker) Highly rated young player who joined the Swifts at the beginning of last season along with Terry Warwick who created and scored so many goals for Tiptree United in his last season at Tiptree. On moving to Heybridge last season was a bit of a disaster for Kris who broke a bone in his foot in a pre-season game at Wivenhoe and suffered the same injury again in November 1999. However Kris was able to get back into the run of things at the latter part of the season. This season has seen Kris return to his known scoring ability and is leading goal scorer this season for Heybridge first eleven.

Simon Parker (Striker) Fast and exciting young striker who joined Heybridge from Stowmarket Town in February 1999 having been the "Jewson League"

top scorer with 26 goals. Despite Simon on netting 1 goal in 15 appearances in his first season at Scraley Road, however last season at the half way stage he was one of the top scorers but alas his scoring rate left him until the latter part of the season. Several Nationwide teams have shown interest in him.

Chris Payne (Forward) Signed from Canvey Island last season. In his second spell at Heybridge. In his travels he has had spells with Dagenham, Billerica and Brentwood. His first touch of the ball on his return was the equalising goal against Dulwich.

Andrew Tomlinson (Midfield) Joined Heybridge from Enfield this season and has already proved popular with the locals. A young player who is a natural ball player as well as a human dynamo. Maybe the smallest person in the side but has been known as one of the noisiest.

Andrew Potter (Midfield) Joined the Heybridge Club from near neighbours Maldon Town this season. Spent the summer down under and performed for Doncaster Football Club (Melbourne). One of the squad players who has recently performed in Ryman League Cup Matches

Matt Greenley (Goalkeeper) 17 year old youngster who joined the Heybridge youth set up from Colchester United and although his first team appearances has been limited he has never let the lads down when the occasions have arisen.

Liam Cuthbush (Manager) Liam took over control of manager of the club with Tony Adcock after the resignation of Robbie Nihill as caretaker managers and then took on the job as Manager. Liam signed for the Heybridge Club as a defender in October 1990 and departed to have two spells with Braintree Town, Dartford, Grays, Chelmsford City, Witham Town and Saffron Walden. Liam returned to the Swifts in 1995 and was forced to miss a year through a knee injury. When the caretaker pair took over Heybridge had 6 points and were holding the rest of the league up this was in December 1999. By the middle of February 2000, The Swifts has risen to 13th in the league and were the soul survivor of the Ryman league left in the FA Trophy last 16.

Robbie Nihill (Assistant Manager) Robbie returned to the affray at the request of Liam after a short spell away from football and is also one of the executive officers of the club on the money raising side. Robbie is one of the personnel who was able to bring Rod Stewart and his vagabond team to Heybridge Swifts in July for a match to raise monies in funds for Heybridge and also their chosen charity of Essex Air Ambulance. A crowd of about 2250 attended this function.

Keith Hull (Coach) Former Heybridge Swifts and Maldon Town manager. Keith was in charge when Heybridge sold Simon Royce to Southend United for £35,000. He has also managed the club reserve team and is another loyal member in the Swifts set up.

Glen Churchett (Physio) Formerly with Leyton Orient, Glen joined the Swifts in November 1998 to become the club's fourth physio in two years. Now a permanent member who is in charge of the treatment of the Heybridge players and has also introduced two further members to take charge of the second team and the under 18s.

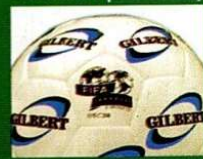
