AWARDS

The Directors have confirmed the sponsorship monies that will be available for payment to Clubs for the current Season. The details of the Awards are as follows:

Premier Division Champions - £3,000 Runners-Up - £2,000 The 3 other Clubs involved in play-off places -£1,000 each

Division One Winners - £2,000 Runners-Up - £1,250 The 4 other Clubs involved in play-off places -£750 each

> Division Two Winners - £1,250 Runners-Up - £750

In addition to the cash awards referred to above, the Directors are also considering ways in which all Member Clubs may receive some financial benefit and details will be announced when the various schemes have been finalised.

Ryman also assist the League and ultimately all Member Clubs in the provision of stationery equipment, which does help keep subscriptions reduced to the minimum. All Member Clubs are also entitled to receive a Ryman Group discount card allowing very generous discounts of products purchased from Ryman Retail Stationery outlets as well as La Senza and Contessa outlets.

The Directors have also agreed the following Awards from the sponsorship of the Westview Cup and Westview Youth Cup competitions. The Awards for both competitions will be based on a sliding scale according to the progress made by clubs through the rounds of the two competitions, thus enabling us to spread the distribution of awards to clubs throughout the League. The details of the Awards are as follows:

> Westview Cup First Round Winners (19) - £50 Second Round Winners (10) - £75 Third Round winners (16) - £100 Fourth Round winners (8) - £1500 Fifth Round winners (4) - £250 Semi-Final winners (2) - £500 Runners-up (1) - £500 Winners (1) - £1,000

Westview Youth Cup First Round Winners (16) - £25 Second Round Winners (8) - £50 Third Round winners (4) - £100 Fourth Round winners (2) - £200 Winners (1) - £400 In addition, a further sum of money has been set aside for goods and services to be made available to all clubs in the League.

PLAY-OFFS

The Play-off Dates for the Ryman Football League have been agreed by the Board of Directors as follows:

Step 3 - Premier Division Semi Finals - One Game (Monday, 1st May 2006) Club in 2nd place vs. Club in 5th place Club in 3rd place vs. Club in 4th place Final - One Game (Saturday, 6th May 2006) Highest placed club will play at home.

Step 4 (First Division) Semi Finals - One Game (Monday, 1st May 2006) Club in 3rd place v Club in 6th place Club in 4th place v Club in 5th place Final - One Game (Saturday, 6th May 2006) Highest placed club will play at home

In the event a team having a match which takes precedence on 1st May, such as the County FA Senior Cup Final, then the playoff will be rescheduled.

END OF SEASON

PROMOTION & RELEGATION The Football Association have confirmed they will shortly be writing to all Steps 1 to 4 clubs confirming the end of season promotion and relegation procedures. These have been slightly revised from those issued before the commencement of the season in that one less Step 4 club will be relegated at that level as a result of the impact of increasing the size of the Football Conference's national division from 22 to 24 clubs. The parts particularly applicable to the Ryman Football League are:

Step 2 and Step 3

The clubs in the bottom two places in each of the two divisions at Step 2 at the end of season 2005/2006 (this will revert to three clubs with effect 2006/2007) will be relegated to a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 3. They will be replaced by the clubs finishing in 1st position in each of the divisions at Step 3 together with a further three clubs determined by a series of play off matches involving those clubs finishing in positions 2 to 5 in each of the divisions at Step 3. The promoted clubs will also be placed in a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 2.

Step 3 and Step 4

The clubs in the bottom three places in each of the three divisions at Step 3 at the end of season 2005/2006 (this will revert to four clubs with effect 2006/2007) will be relegated to a feeder pool and placed in the most geographical appropriate division at Step 4. These nine clubs will be joined by an additional club, this being the club finishing fourth from bottom in the three divisions at Step 3 with the lowest points gained per game played. This club will also be allocated to a feeder pool.

They will be replaced by the clubs finishing in 1st and 2nd position in each of the divisions at Step 4 together with a further four clubs to be determined by a series of play off matches involving those clubs finishing in positions 3 to 6 in each of the divisions at Step 4. The promoted clubs will also be placed in a feeder pool and placed in the most geographically appropriate division at Step 3.

Step 4 and Step 5

The clubs in the bottom places in each of the four divisions at Step 4 will be relegated and placed into a feeder pool. These four clubs will be joined by an additional three clubs, these being the three clubs finishing second from bottom in the four divisions at Step 4 with the lowest points gained per game played. These clubs also be allocated to a feeder pool and placed into the most geographically appropriate league at Step 5.

WESTVIEW YOUTH CUP

This competition has now reached the semifinal stages. Dulwich Hamlet will entertain Chalfont St. Peter on Wednesday, 12th April. In the second semi-final, Redbridge entertain Worthing on Thursday, 20th April.

The date of the Final has still to be fixed.

the isthmian league

Prior to the turn of the century, the only competitive games for amateur clubs in the South of England were various cup competitions. The majority of other fixtures were friendly.

At the suggestion of Mr T.H.Kirkup, secretary of the London Football Association, Mr George Clark, honorary treasurer of Ilford and Frank Evans honorary Secretary of Clapton FC a meeting was held at Winchester House, Old Broad Street with representatives of the Casuals, Civil Service, Clapton, Ealing Association, Ilford, and London Caledonians had been invited to consider the formation of a strong amateur league. The representatives were all in favour and the Isthmian League was formed on 8 March 1905. The league's motto has always been 'honour sufficit'. Consequently, no cup was awarded to the champions nor were there any medals for players. Honour was the only reward.

In the first three seasons of the League there were just six member clubs and of these three clubs resigned after the first two seasons to be replaced by three new clubs.

Membership of the League had always been by invitation. Membership increased to 10 clubs in 1908 and 11 clubs in 1911. After the First World War there were just 5 clubs but this soon went back to 12 clubs in 1919.

1921 saw an increase to 14 clubs and membership stayed at this level until 1952 when an increase was made to 15 clubs and in 1956 a more even number of 16 clubs formed the basis of membership of the League

In 1963 membership was increased to 20 with the addition of the 4 strongest clubs from the Athenian League namely, Enfield, Hendon, Hitchin Town and Sutton United. Membership remained then fairly static until 1971 when Maidstone United and Wealdstone turned professional to join the Southern League and were replaced by 3 more clubs from the Athenian League and then in 1972 Leatherhead were admitted to increase membership to 22 clubs.

In 1973 a second Division was formed and in 1979 saw a third Division added. With the final demise of the Athenian League in 1984 the League saw itself with the highest number of clubs it had had with the ability to have a total of 88 clubs. It only achieved this on a few occasions but, nevertheless, saw its position as the premier league in the south of the country maintained.

The League has been innovators in many ways. The League was the first league to have sponsorship when Rothman's of Pall Mall selected the Isthmian League with a number of other leagues around the country to lead the way with sponsorship. Prize money was offered to promote more goals and to encourage fair play. Any clubs which went over a certain number of penalty points for bookings and send offs during a season lost any money at all it earned by position in the League. Following on from this Berger Paints, Servowarm, Vauxhall, Diadora, ICIS and current sponsors Ryman have been the title sponsors. The League Cup has seen Hitachi, AC Delco and Bryco amongst

its sponsors. The League was the first league to adopt 3 points for a win, the first to use goal difference instead of goal average and was the first league outside the Football League to become a limited company with a full time administration.

To return to this history of the Isthmian League, one finds that it was soon involved in dispute, which lasted eight years. The Surrey, Middlesex and Football Association Council forced these associations to take over the government of the professional clubs as well. There was opposition to take this motion and in March 1906, the Amateur Football Association was formed to protect what the amateur clubs considered their rights. The Amateur Football Association was split from the other county associations and member clubs were not allowed to play professional clubs or any other amateur club that remained affiliated to the Football Association. As a result of this the Casuals, Civil Service FC and Ealing, who had joined the Amateur Football Association resigned from the Isthmian League and their places were taken by Dulwich Hamlet, Oxford City and West Norwood.

Membership to the Isthmian League had always been by invitation. In 1908-09, Bromley, Leytonstone, Nunhead and Shepherds Bush were invited to join, thus increasing the membership to 10 clubs. Bromley were champions during the first two seasons, but resigned at the end of their third season in the Isthmian League. They were replaced in 1911-12 by Tunbridge Wells and Woking, thus increasing the membership to 11 clubs. New Crusaders replaced Tunbridge Wells for the 1913-14 season and the Isthmian League closed down during the First World War, London Caledonians were champions in three successive seasons, 1911-14.

When the Isthmian League resumed in 1919-20, the membership was increased to 12 clubs. The Casuals and Civil Service FC were accepted back into the Isthmian League as the Amateur Football Association's dispute with the Football Association had been resolved in 1914. Tufnell Park was also accepted into the Isthmian League, but New Crusaders and Shepherds Bush did not take their place after the war. In 1921-22, the Isthmian League was increased to 14 clubs with the addition of Wimbledon and Wycombe Wanderers. St. Albans City replaced West Norwood in 1923-24 and Kingstonian replaced Civil Service FC in 1929-30. There was no further changes in membership until just before the Second World War, which bought the Isthmian League to a close shortly after the start of the 1939-40 season. Casuals had amalgamated with the Corinthians in 1939 and London Caledonians and Nunhead were absentees after having had their grounds requisitioned. As neither club were able to find alternative accommodation, they had no option but to resign and their places were taken by Romford and Walthamstow Avenue from the Athenian League. At the time of their resignation, London Caledonians had won their first

Isthmian League championship a record 6 times, including the first hat-trick between 1911-1914.

At the end of the 1951-52 season, Tufnell Park was not re-elected. Their place was taken by Barking. Bromley also returned to the Isthmian League, and even though there have been subsequent occasions when clubs playing records have been below that of the rest of the clubs in the league, it is unusual that a club is not re-elected at the Annual General Meeting. Tufnell Park, after several name changes, have since returned to the Isthmian League as Haringey Borough. Also in 1951-52, Leytonstone completed a hat-trick of championship wins, the first since London Caledonians effort between 1911-14. Wimbledon (1961-64) and Enfield (1967-70 and 1975-78) have since emulated this feat.

Tooting & Mitcham United were elected to the Isthmian League in 1956-57 extending the membership to more manageable 16 clubs Romford turned professional at the end of the 1959-60 season and joined the Southern League. They were replaced by Maidstone United.

For some time, the top Athenian League clubs had claimed to be better than the poorer Isthmian league clubs but because membership of the Isthmian League was invitation only, and as the Isthmian League was reluctant to elect new clubs in place of the bottom clubs, the Athenian League clubs were not given the opportunity to prove their claim. Efforts to operate a system of promotion and relegation between the two leagues had always been rejected by the Isthmian League and so progressive clubs could reach the top of the Athenian League and no further. In 1963-64 the Isthmian League increased its membership to 20 clubs by admitting Enfield, Hendon, Hitchin Town and Sutton United from the Athenian League and, with the addition of Wealdstone in 1964-65 as replacements for Wimbledon, who had decided to turn professional after several seasons as the recognised top amateur club in the country, the Isthmian League had gone some way to meeting the objectives of the Athenian League clubs. After the admission to the Isthmian League, Enfield won the Isthmian League championship 7 times and finished second on 4 occasions before moving on to the Alliance Premier League in 1981.

There were no further changes in membership until 1971-72, when Maidstone United and Wealdstone turned professional and joined the Southern League. They were replaced by Bishop's Stortford, Hayes and Walton and Hersham. Leatherhead was admitted for the 1972-73 season to increase the membership to 22 clubs.

In addition to sponsorship, the Isthmian League intruded three points for a win and accepted promotion and relegation in 1973-74. Fifteen clubs from the Athenian League and Hertford Town from the Eastern Counties League formed the Isthmian League Division

Two. Dagenham and Slough Town were promoted at the end of the season in place of Corinthian Casuals and St. Albans City. Boreham Wood and Croydon were admitted to Division Two increasing membership of that Division to 18 clubs. Division Two was further increased to 22 clubs in 1975-76 with the inclusion of Harrow Borough, Hornchurch, Ware and Wembley from the Athenian League

Ware and Wembley from the Athenian League. A third Division was added in 1977-78. The divisions were named Premier, Division One and Division Two. The Athenian League was provided with the bulk of the 17 new clubs. Metropolitan Police from the Southern League being the exception. At the end of that season, Epsom & Ewell and Metropolitan Police were promoted from Division Two to Division One, with Corinthian Casuals and Hornchurch making the reverse journey. Membership of Division Two was increased to 18 clubs in 1978-79 with the addition of Hungerford Town from the Hellenic League.

At the end of the 1978-79 season, the Isthmian League lost one of its founder members, Ilford, who had lost their ground, amalgamated with Leytonstone as Leytonstone and Ilford. At that time, Ilford were one of the only two clubs to have competed in the Isthmian League in every season since its foundation. The sole survivor is Clapton. During their spell in the Isthmian League, Ilford won their championship three times, the last instance being in 1921-22. Leytonstone had 9 championship wins to their credit. In their initial season after amalgamation, the club competed in Division One. They obtained promotion straight away to Division One champions in 1979-80 and then went onto win the Premier Division championship in 1981-82.

To compensate for the loss, the Isthmian League accepted Barton Rovers and Billericay into Division Two. Billericay Town were Athenian League champions in the previous two seasons following successes in the Essex Senior League and the FA Challenge Vase. They reached the Premier Division in the shortest possible time by winning the Division Two championship in 1979-80 and finishing runners up in Division One in 1980-81. Barton Rovers had been champions of the South Midlands League in eight of their previous nine seasons.

Enfield and Dagenham both left the Isthmian League at the end of the 1980-81 season. Both clubs accepted an invitation to join the Alliance Premier League, Bognor Regis Town were accepted into Division One from the Southern League and justified this by gaining promotion to the Premier Division in their first season in the Isthmian League, 1981-82. Basildon United and Windsor and Eton from their Athenian League also joined the Isthmian League in 1981-82. At the end that season, Camberley Town failed to be re-elected and returned to the Athenian League. The Isthmian added former Athenian League clubs, Leyton-Wingate and Uxbridge in 1982-83. It was also agreed that with effect from 1982-83, the Isthmian League champions would be promoted to the Alliance Premier League and that the bottom two clubs in Division Two would, subject to

facilities, be replaced by the top two Athenian League clubs. However, at the end of the 1982-83 season, Wycombe Wanderers, the Isthmian League champions decided not to move to the Alliance Premier League and no other Isthmian League club sought election in their place. At the bottom end of the league, Harwich and Parkston became the first Isthmian League club to be relegated to the Athenian League. As there was a vacancy in the league only one club was relegated from Division One. Newbury Town and Grays Athletic were promoted from the Athenian League at the end of the 1982-83 season.

The arrangement with the Athenian League did not last for long. The Isthmian League decided to expand further in 1984-85 by regionalising its second division. 20 clubs were added, the bulk of them again coming from the Athenian League, which was forced to disband. The Isthmian League also added several clubs from county league football: Heybridge Swifts and Saffron Walden Town from the Essex Senior League, and Petersfield United from the Hampshire League. A number of Athenian clubs, including champions Redhill, could not be accepted as their grounds were not up to required standard. Staines Town were demoted from the Premier Division at the end of the 1983-84 season because they failed to carry out the requisite improvements, thus saving Tooting & Mitcham United from relegation. Corinthian Casuals who had existed for over 100 years. with out having their own ground, finally obtained one at Wimbledon Park. However, as they were unable to obtain planning permission to carry out necessary improvements, they were forced to resign from the Isthmian League, and were accepted, at short notice into the London Spartan League.

At the end of the 1984 season, the Isthmian League took up their option of promotion to the Gola League (now known as Football Conference). Champions, Sutton United decided not to apply, leaving the way open to Wycombe Wanderers to compete in the Gola League in 1985-86. Yeovil Town were relegated from the Gola League.

The Isthmian League has accepted the Combined Counties, Essex Senior, London Spartan and South Midlands Leagues as feeder leagues to its two second divisions. Changes at the bottom in 1985-86 are the relegation of Chertsey Town to the Combined Counties' League, the expulsion of Epping Town and election of Southwick and Vauxhall Motors. Prior to the end of 'amateur football' the

Prior to the end of 'amateur football' the Isthmian League was without doubt to top amateur league in the south, although Northern League laid claim to being top amateur league in England. The claim being made on the basis of performances in the FA Amateur Cup. Nevertheless, the Isthmian League can look back on 30 occasions when its member clubs won the FA Amateur Cup. The most successful clubs are Clapton with

The most successful clubs are Clapton with 5 wins and Dulwich Hamlet with 4. Neither clubs won the FA Amateur Cup after the Second World War. Of the 22 clubs in membership of the Isthmian League Division One in 1973-74, the last season of the FA Amateur Cup, 15 clubs had at least one win in the FA Amateur Cup. In addition, London Caledonians, Wealdstone and Wimbledon all had their names inscribed on the FA Amateur Cup before leaving the Isthmian League.

Initially, Isthmian League Clubs did not have a great deal of success in the FA Challenge Trophy. It was not until 1975-76, the seventh competition, that Enfield became the first Isthmian League club to reach the semi-finals. Since then Dagenham (1979-80), Leatherhead (1977-78), Sutton United (1980-81), Dagenham & Redbridge (1996-97) have been beaten finalists. Most Isthmian League clubs compete in the FA Challenge Trophy but below the top two divisions compete in the FA Challenge Vase. Yeading being the first Isthmian League club to win the FA Vase in 1989/90, whilst Southall (1985/86), Oxford City (1994/95) and Berkhamsted Town 2000/01 have been finalists.

There have been too many occasions when the Isthmian League clubs have toppled Football League Clubs in the FA Cup to record them all. In 1952-53, Walthamstow Avenue were drawn away to Manchester United in the Fourth Round of the FA Cup. They managed a draw at Old Trafford before losing a replay 5-2, which was played at Highbury. In the earlier rounds they had beaten Wimbledon, Watford and Stockport County. These are not the only occasions that Walthamstow Avenue have beaten Football League clubs in the FA Cup. They have also beaten Gillingham and Queens Park Rangers and also held Ipswich Town to a draw. In 1958-59, Tooting and Mitcham United beat Bournemouth 3-1 and Northampton Town 2-0 before being drawn at home to Nottingham Forest who won the FA Cup that season and they claimed that the nearest they came to a defeat throughout the competition was when they played Tooting and Mitcham United. In 1975-76, Tooting and Mitcham United reached the Fourth Round of the FA Cup following wins over Romford, Leatherhead, Swindon Town before losing to Bradford City. Sutton United were hosts to Leeds United in the Fourth Round of the FA Cup in 1969-70, but there was no fairy tail ending as they lost 6-0. In 1979-80, Harlow Town beat Leytonstone and Ilford, Southend United, after a replay, and Leicester City after a replay before going to Watford and losing 4-3. Enfield reached the Fourth Round in 1980-81, beating Wembley, Hereford United, Port Vale, in a replay, before losing to Barnsley in a replay held at White Hart Lane in front of over 35,000 spectators. The Isthmian League clubs also have an extremely good record in the various County Cup Competitions. Since 1974-5, the Isthmian League has run

Since 1974-5, the Isthmian League has run its own cup competition. In the first season, entry was restricted to Division Two clubs, Tilbury beat Croydon Amateurs in the final over two legs. FOLKESTONE INVICTA FC

The widow of Paul Sykes - the Folkestone Invicta striker who tragically collapsed and died during a Kent Senior Cup match a year ago this month - says she hopes the special memorial match to be held in his honour will prove a fitting farewell to her husband.

Dozens of famous faces from the Kent footballing scene will take part in a special match - the Syko Challenge - which takes place at Margate's Hartsdown Park on Sunday, 30th April.

Among those expected to play a role during the game are the likes of Martin Buglione and former Gills stars Mark Saunders and Andy Pennock, as well as a possible rare return to action for the former goal-machine this is Invicta boss Neil Cugley.

Speaking in a special onterview on last weekend's Kent on Sunday, Carly Sykes said, "This memorial game will be a nice finishing point for everyone to celebrate and then move on.

"It is a way of not only celebrating his life but saying goodbye as well in a really good, positive way. I just know it will be fantastic."

Sykes was just 28 when he died of a rare heart condition leaving behind wife Carly and nine-month old son Thomas.

Folkestone pulled out of the Kent Senior Cup following the tragedy and although the Final was dedicated to his memory and attended by more than 2,000 fans, it was clear there was a hugh demand from his former team-mates to play a part in a more dedicated tribute.

High drama followed in the fourth round at Bristol City, in front of nearly 15,000 spectators, when Kingstonian led through a Phil Wingfield goal going into injury time... A meeting with Leicester City in the final 16 was not to be, however, as an injury time equaliser and then a late winner in the replay proved to be the end of a fine relationship between Chapple, Kingstonian and the FA Cup.

"The tournament takes place at the end of the league season and falls perfectly before the start of the World Cup, when football fever will be at its peak.

"It would be great to think that we'll see big crowds at all the games, including those at Worthing and Bognor Regis Town, with the final round of games staggered to enable supporters over the Bank Holiday weekend to get to both games and create a carnival atmosphere."

"It is good to see that a local club wants to get involved with its surrounding community," continued Simon, "a number of our player are fans already and I'm sure that many more will be after Saturday."

Before Saturday's game, Wealdstone manager Gordon Bartlett presented Scott Powling from Shaftesbury School on Headstone Lane, and Divyesh Jarni from the Brember Centre in South Harrow with tickets for a future England game at Wembley after they won a competition to design the team's new badge and name. At half time, some members of the team took part in a penalty competition.

The Club was formed in 1880 making it the 11th. oldest club in Essex and moved into the Romford & District League in 1890 - competing in this league until 1914. After the 1st. World War, the Mid-Essex League was entered and they remained in that competition until 1947.

That year they joined the Southern Essex Combination remaining there until 1966 when they became founder-members of the Essex Olympian League.

Five years later, Billericay Town became founder-members of the Essex Senior League and the club's six-year stay in that competition saw them win the Championship three times and were Runners-Up twice (and third the other season). The League Cup was won four times and they were Finalists once. In addition they won the League Challenge Cup the only time that it was competed for.

Progressing to the Athenian League in 1977, Billericay won the Championship and the League Cup in the first season. The became Champions again in 1978/79 and after two seasons were elected into the Isthmian League.

Whilst members of the Essex Senior League, the club won the F.A. Vase in 1976 when Stamford were beaten 1-0 after extra-time at Wembley Stadium.

The following season, 1976/77, saw the club go to Wembley again and - after a 1-1 draw there - played at Nottingham Forest F.C. in the re-play and emerged victorious with a 2-1 victory over Sheffield, the oldest club in the world.

Billericay Town became the first [and so far the only] club to win the F.A. Vase for a third time in 1979 when they defeated Almondsbury Greenway 4-1. This match was notable for a hattrick by Doug Young - the first hat-trick in a Cup Final at Wembley Stadium since Geoff Hurst's in the 1966 World Cup Final.

The Club then competed in the F.A. Trophy until 1989/90 when the F.A. Vase was again entered and the Quarter-Final was reached, losing 0-1 to the eventual Finalists, Bridlington.

After their success in the Athenian League, Billericay's league successes continued in the Isthmian League when in their first season they easily won the Division 2 title with a winning margin of 17 points, and scoring 100 goals in their 36 league matches. The following season, in Division 1, they finished as Runners-Up to Bishops Stortford - the first time in the history of the Isthmian League that a club had won promotion in two successive seasons on entry into the League.

Billericay then had five seasons in the Premier Division until being relegated in 1986. They then spent two years in Division One before again being relegated - this time into Division Two North.

Following re-organisation of the League, Billericay finished in third place in the newly formed Division Two and so gained promotion to Division One. That season, 1991/2, they finished the season with an unbeaten run of 15 games, including winning the Essex Thames-Side Trophy. Promotion back to the Premier Division was obtained in 1998 and 12th. position was obtained in the first season back. In season 1999/2000 they obtained their highest-ever league position in the Pyramid structure - 7th. place. In the following three seasons they finished in 8th., 9th. and 12th. places in the League.

Following the resignation of Gary Calder as Manager at the end of the 2002/03 season the Club moved away from the usual list of local managers and appointed ex-Tottenham Hotspur player Justin Edinburgh as Manager – his first venture into football management following his early retirement from the game after being injured playing for Portsmouth, where he spent two seasons.

In January 2004, a local business-man, Steve Kent, acquired the controlling interest in the Club by buying the shares of the major shareholders and also settling the club's debts. Since his arrival Steve has set about renovating some of the clubs facilities, overseeing the resurfacing of the car park, the building of new boardroom and office facilities and commencing work on a refit and extension of the clubhouse.

Unfortunately the 2003/04 season ended in disappointment for Billericay as they were unable to escape the bottom four and failed to earn a place in the new Nationwide South league. Many changes have occurred on the playing side of the club over the summer, with a lot of new players arriving at New Lodge as Billericay became the latest non-league club to move towards having a full-time squad. The following season Billericay finished as runners up in the Ryman premier division, but failed to obtain promotion via the play-offs. They also reached the first round of the FA Cup for only the second time in the clubs history.

Midway through the 2005/06 season, manager Justin Edinburgh left on the club, however Matt Jones quickly took over the reins and set about putting his own stamp on the team and leading them to their first cup final for ten years.

Full Membership of the Football Association was achieved in 1993, twelve years after obtaining Associate Membership in 1981.

Billericay Town also became the first Non-League club to win the Rothmans Merit Award in 1978 for "having made a worth-while contribution to the wide spectrum of the game in 1977/78" - the only CLUB previously to have won this Award was LIVERPOOL, the previous season, when they were the EUROPEAN CHAMPIONS!

Meet Billericay ...

Matt Jones - Manager - Matt Jones took over as Billericay Town manager in January 2006 after the departure of Justin Edinburgh. Matt had previously been Edinburgh's assistant, since the departure of Andy Polsten in the 2004 close season. A hugely experienced campaigner in non-league football, Matt includes Dagenham (with whom he won the Isthmian premier league), St. Albans City and Heybridge Swifts amongst his former clubs. A former England Schoolboy international, Matt started out at Southend United where he played alongside manager, Justin Edinburgh. Most recently Matt was at Chelmsford City where he was player / coach.

Jason Broom – Assistant / Coach – Jason was appointed to the Billericay Town backroom staff soon after Matt Jones took over as boss in 2006. A former Blues, Jason made over 100 appearances for Town, progressing through the youth set-up and into the first team. A move to Dagenham followed, with over 300 appearances for the Victoria Road outfit. A short spell at Grays later, Jason joined Thurrock as player coach.

Grant Gordon – Assistant / Coach – Another appointment by Matt Jones, Grant is an experienced hand whose knowledge of the local non-league scene will be invaluable to Billericay. Before joining the Blues, Grant was on the staff at Thurrock.

Mike Cole – Sports Therapist – The third member of Matt Jones' backroom staff is Mike Cole who joined Billericay as sports therapist after leaving QPR where he worked in their academy set-up. Mike is another with a Dagenham connection.

Dagenham connection. **Ricky Millard -** Ricky joined on initially on loan from Cambridge City in November 2005 before later making his move permanent. A talented keeper who started out at Barnet Ricky also had a short spell at Hemel Hempstead.

Dale Brightley - A young keeper signed as cover for Mel Capleton, Dale arrived at New Lodge in the Summer of 2005. Previous clubs include Concorde Rangers. Dale made his debut in October 2005, keeping a clean sheet in a win at East Thurrock.

Gary Henty - A versatile player with two good feet, Gary Henty joined Billericay in the summer of 1999, making his debut as a substitute in the opening game of the season. Prior to joining Billericay Gary was at Wimbledon where he progressed through the youth team ranks to reach reserve team status. Gary is now by some way the longest serving Billericay player, having stayed with the club throughout the entirety of Gary Calder's reign as manager as well as all of Justin Edinburgh's to date.

Danny Brown - A young centre back who joined Billericay in March, Danny was previously with Basingstoke and Woking, and has experience of playing in Australia. Danny achieved the notable feat of scoring on his debut, against Bromley.

Rob Swaine - Captain of the under 18s, Rob is the latest of the youngsters to be given a chance at first team level, making his league debut in the 3-1 win at Leyton in April 2006.

Pat Sappleton - Pat arrived at New Lodge at the beginning of December 2003, making his debut in the 1-1 draw at Grays. Initially on loan from Farnborough Town, Pat subsequently signed for us on a permanent basis. Prior to joining Farnborough, Pat played for Hendon and Boreham Wood, and also represented Jamaica at Youth International level. After an series of

excellent performances in the 2004/5 season, Pat received the supporters player of the year trophy.

Dave McSweeney - Dave McSweeney arrived at Billericay in the summer of 2004 after leaving Southend United. Whilest at Southend Dave played a good number of first team games, and that experience stood him in good stead as he immediately settled into the first choice XI. One of the most consistent players at the club, Dave has played at both right back and in the centre of defence.

Danny Kerrigan – A popular player with the fans, Danny is now in his second stint with the club, having played under previous manager Gary Calder in 2002/03. A tough tackling left back, Danny started out with Southend United. In between his two spells at New Lodge, Danny played for Grays and Hornchurch.

Jamie Dormer - Jamie Dormer arrived at New Lodge in the summer of 2003, being one of Justin Edinburgh's first signings. He quickly established himself in the side, despite being asked to fill a number of roles at various times, including centre back and midfield. Since the start of the 2004/05 season, Jamie has made the left midfield role his own. Jamie took over the captaincy of the side mid-way through his first season and went on to win both the Players' and TJs' (Town Juniors) player of the season awards at the 2003/04 prizegiving.

Matthew Game - A young player signed in the summer of 2004 Matty was one of the most improved players over the season. A tenacious midfielder whose tackling belies his diminutive size, Matt made his debut in the away game at Northwood in September. Unfortunately injury has disrupted much of his first season at Billericay Town, however he scored his first goal for the Blues at Leyton on New Years Day.

Leon Hunter - Another player to have arrived early on in Justin Edinburgh's reign as manager, Leon has been a regular in the centre of midfield throughout. A player with a good engine, Leon has the capability to boss the midfield. The 2004/05 season saw him walk off with the players' player of the year award. Leon has also been selected for the Ryman representative side.

George Lay - A young winger who arrived at Billericay in June 2005, George was a product of the Chelmsford City youth scheme. A brief spell at Welling followed before he returned to City in October 2004. Unfortunately George's first season at New Lodge has been curtailed by a badly broken leg.

Dave Collins - A left sided midfielder, Dave joined Billericay from Redbridge in the Autumn of 2005. An excellent crosser of the ball Dave quickly made a name for himself with his expertise at dead ball situations.

Warren Ryan - Warren joined the Billericay squad in November, making his debut against Bromley. His former clubs include Waltham Forest and Margate.

John Simmons - A product of the recently formed Under 18 squad, John broke into first team reckoning during the 2004/05 season, making a couple of league starts. A good passer of the ball, John will be pushing for a regular starting berth before too long. **Scott Forbes -** Matt Jones' first signing as

Scott Forbes – Matt Jones' first signing as manager, Scott is an experienced player who can operate anywhere in the midfield. Perhaps best known for his spell at Southend, Scott has also played for Canvey and Bishops Stortford amongst others.

Lee Hodges - Lee is an experienced midfielder who joined Billericay from Thurrock in February, making his debut in the impressive win at Worthing. Lee has plenty of league experience, having turned out for West Ham and Bristol Rovers amongst others.

In 1908, Mr Michael Culiton, headmaster at Dockland School, announced that a club was to be set up to provide sporting facilities for underpriviledged youths of Bermondsey, London. The club was named after the martyr, Blessed John Fisher.

The football team competed in various district leagues before moving to the Parthenon League where they stayed until 1965. At this time the original club folded and reformed as Fisher Athletic FC. Based in Mitcham, they initially played in the West Kent League. A second successive promotion coincided with a move to their present home, the purpose built stadium at Surrey Docks.

Once in the Southern League, Fisher wasted no time winning it at the first attempt and two seasons later they made it to the Vauxhall Conference, the pinnacle of non-league football. Fisher were now being hailed as the next Wimbledon, filling their trophy cabinet with various cups and shields as they went.

Fisher's success came to an end in 1992 when they were relegated back to the Southern League and then to the Southern Division where they remained, generally finishing in midtable. It was during the 1997-8 season that a new limited company was formed and the club was rewarded with a long-term lease on their stadium.

The 1999-2000 season saw the arrival of Alan Walker as manger. Walker assembled a fine squad of players to launch a serious promotion challenge. Promotion was secured two weeks before the end of the campaign, but the battle to go up as champions was left to the final day of the season however, when Fisher beat Newport IOW 2-0 to be crowned Eastern Division Champions.

Fisher's success was short-lived, after just one season in the Dr Martens Premier Division they were relegated back into the Eastern Division. This was despite the arrival mid-season of

the ex-Millwall manager Keith "Rhino" Stevens.

Season 2001-2 saw a good run in the FA Cup, reaching the 4th Qualifying Round before losing 3-1 at home to Forest Green Rovers. The Quarter Final of the London Senior Cup was lost to local rivals Dulwich Hamlet and the club reached the 3rd round of the FA Trophy before losing 5-0 to Barnet. The semi-final of the Kent Senior Cup was also reached before a home-defeat against eventual winners Gravesend and Northfleet.

Sadly losing league games that should have been won saw the club finish in 6th place, 23 points behind the promoted clubs.

During the close season, Rhino left the club to concentrate on business affairs, and former Director of Football Bob Davies took over as Manager. He departed October 2003 to be replaced by non-league scoring legend Gary Abbott. Regrettably Abbo's nose for scoring did not extend to management and he quickly departed.

In February 2004 Wayne Burnett came in to take over team affairs. Off the field planning permission has been granted for a major redevelopment of the Surrey Docks Stadium and new chairman Sami Mudghola signalled his intentions with a raft of top signings to push Fisher back towards the heady heights of the Conference and this paid instant dividends in 2004-5 with the Southern League Divison 1 East title and the London Senior Cup. Currently in the middle of a two-year ground share at Champion Hill (home of Dulwich Hamlet) before they return to Rotherhithe, the Fish are hoping that when they do it will be with a side worthy of their redeveloped facilities.

Meet Fisher ...

Steve Watts - Big, strong centre forward who joined Conference side Shrewsbury Town in the summer of 2003 from Leyton Orient but then returned to east London in October 2003 by joining rivals Dagenham & Redbridge, with whom he had enjoyed a previous loan spell. Started his career with Dulwich Hamlet and then joined Fisher Athletic in the summer of 1998. However, his stay with them was brief as he was snapped up by Orient two months later. Played over 130 times for the O's and also had loan spells with Welling United, Margate, Dagenham & Redbridge and Lincoln City. Looked like heading for Singapore in February 2004 but when that deal fell through he signed for Ryman Leaguers St Albans City. Moved onto Fisher Athletic in June last year where he grabbed 48 goals in their double-winning campaign of 2004-5.

Hamid Barr - A latecomer into the full professional game when the attacking midfielder was signed by QPR in the summer of 2001 from Fisher Athletic. Hamid had been on the books at Millwall and Crystal Palace as a youngster but then had spells with Welling United, Sutton United, Crockenhill and Erith & Belvedere before joining Fisher in October 1999 via a second stint at Crockenhill. Things did not quite work out at QPR, and he was released at the end of the 2001/2 season. Signed for Ryman Premier side St Albans City in August 2002, switched back to Fisher Athletic in early October and then joined Conference outfit Gravesend just a week or so later. Signed for Tonbridge in December 2002. Returned to Fisher in February 2004 after resigning as joint manager at Tonbridge.

Leroy Griffiths - Striker who started out with the likes of Sutton United, Banstead Athletic and Corinthian Casuals before signing for Hampton & Richmond Borough in February 2000. Had barely a season with the Beavers before making a surprise switch to Queen's Park Rangers in June 2001. Played 23 times for the Rangers before being released at the end of the 2001/02 season and joined Farnborough Town in August 2002. Switched to Grays Athletic in the summer of 2004, where his 16 goals helped the Essex men to the Nationwide Conference South title.

Will Packham - Will is a promising young keeper who signed for Conference side Farnborough Town from Brighton during the summer of 2003. Made four league appearances for the Seagulls, having started out at the Southampton Academy. Returned to the south coast by joining Ryman Division One South side Worthing in December 2003. Joined Fisher on a month's loan in March 2003, initially as cover for Jerome John but in June the move became permanent.

Chris Piper - Chris arrived at Farnborough Town from St Albans City in January 2001 and then followed brother Lenny to Dagenham & Redbridge in June 2003. A forward who is more than capable of performing in midfield, he began his career at Charlton Athletic. Re-joined Lenny, this time at Fisher Athletic in June 2004. An injury sustained in preseason kept him out of action until October but he returned to play an integral role in Fisher's success last term.

Francis Duku - Joined the Fish from Conference South side Lewes during the summer, having joined the Rooks from Conference team Gravesend & Northfleet in July 2004. Four successful years at Stonebridge Road saw the uncompromising and highly influential defender reach the pinnacle of the Non League game with Duku attracting a considerable interest from Football League clubs during his career. He began his career with Reading as a youngster before moving to Collier Row, Romford and Maidenhead United. A successful spell at Dulwich Hamlet followed but frozen out by then manager Dave Garland, Duku moved to the 'Fleet in July 2000

Mark Warren - Mark signed for Fisher Athletic in the summer of 2004 from Southend United for whom he made 270 League appearances the previous season, bringing his total number of Football League games to 270 with 8 goals. The rock on which Fisher's defence was built last season, Mark's career started at Leyton Orient taking in Oxford, Notts County and Colchester before arriving by the seaside in June 2003 where he commanded the number five shirt

Michael Smith - Talented midfielder previously at Arsenal for nine years and Millwall for a season. Bags of tricks and a level head on his shoulders. Signed for Fisher Athletic in March 2003. Unlucky with injury in 2004/5 and will be hoping for a more consistent season this time around.

Lenny Piper - A former England Youth international midfielder who started his career with Wimbledon. Failed to make the breakthrough with the Dons and moved to Gillingham, where he made around 20 League appearances. Was released at the end of 1997/98 season and initially joined Welling United before moving on to St Albans City a couple of months into the new campaign. Proved a hit at Clarence Park, scoring a number of goals, before switching to Borough in July 2000. Transferred to Dagenham & Redbridge in June 2003 but failed to settle at Victoria Road and, after a loan spell with Margate, joined Fisher in March 2004

Anthony Riviere - Anthony first came to prominence at Faversham Town, but it was at Welling United where his career really took off after signing in 1998, eventually leading to international honours and being proclaimed at the best Wings No.7 of all time. A local lad born in Brockley, Rivs is a pacey right-sided midfielder, who was voted Welling's player of the season in 2001-2. His move to Fisher in the summer of 2004 was met with shock by Wings fans, but proved the ambition of the Fish.

Nick Davis - Exciting young defender who signed for Fisher in June 2004 from Kent Leaguers Maidstone United. Helped VCD Athletic to the Kent League double before signing for the Stones where he became a firstteam regular during the 2003/4 season.
